

Low Income Transit Pass Current Status

- 68,000 applicants, 465,000 pass sales projected in 2019
- Sustainable funding model required for \$6.5 million funding gap

Direct Customer Benefits

Percent of LITP customers who experience benefits related to:

- Employment = 74%
- Maintaining social supports = 78%
- Medical and other appointments = 84%
- Saving household money = 91%

Societal Benefits

- Improved labour mobility and supply
- Improved economic and community participation
- Reduced use of costly health and emergency services



Funding Gap Scenarios

Scenario	Description	Funding Gap
A	Government of Alberta provides \$11 million in annual funding for LITP program from 2020 onward	-
В	Government of Alberta renews pilot annual funding of \$4.5 million for LITP program from 2020 onward	\$6.5 million
C	Government of Alberta discontinues funding for LITP program beyond 2019	\$11 million



1. Maintain a Three Band Sliding Scale

- Varying income levels below Low Income Cut-Off
- Operationally efficient to deliver and easy to communicate to customer
- Returning to single rate evaluated as part of sub-service review
- More equitable than single rate, while being financially-sustainable

2. Reflect Equity among Bands

- Align household's ability to pay with pass price
- Keep proportional price of pass similar among Bands
- Continue providing greatest advantage to those earning the least

Recommended – Option 3

- Most financially-sustainable
- Maintains equitable LITP rates aligned with ability to pay
- Aligned with original sliding scale recommendation
- Self-sustaining and stable funding model

Motion Arising to TT2019-0637 RouteAhead Update

"Direct Administration to report back to Council on 2019 September 30 on the following financial impacts in order to inform potential provincial advocacy:

- a. Eliminating the user fees charged for residents 70 years of age or older for the Senior Regular and the Senior Low Income passes, thereby allowing anyone 70 years of age or older to ride Transit at no charge without the need to produce a pass or fare;
- b. Reducing the cost of Youth fares and monthly passes, over several scenarios, up to the total elimination of these charges; and
- c. Enhancing the Low Income Transit Pass to provide free transit to individuals under 18 years of age on weekends and public holidays."





Additional Discounts for Seniors and Youth

Recommendations

That the SPC on Transportation & Transit recommend that Council direct Administration to:

- Direct Administration to continue advocacy with the Government of Alberta for permanent funding for the sliding scale Low Income Transit Pass program.
- 2. Direct Administration to address the sliding scale Low Income Transit Pass program funding gap at the 2019 November budget adjustments with a sliding scale fare structure and budget request that reflects the recommended options in this report, based on the outcome of Provincial funding decisions.
- 3. Receive for information Options 3 and 4 under Scenario C, as Administration's final submission for sub-service review of the sliding scale Low Income Transit Pass program.
