**Calgary Current State** 

- Prostitution is referred to as "indoor" or "outdoor".
- > Indoor represents 70-95 per cent of all prostitution.
- > Outdoor tends to involve vulnerable populations.
- Estimates place the total number of prostitutes in Calgary at anywhere between 1000-3000.

#### Calgary Current State – Continuum of Community Social Service Agencies

Calgary has a number of community-based social service organizations and programs that provide services to those in the sex trade, including:

- The Servants Anonymous Society of Calgary (SAS)
- HIV Community Links' Support Services for People in the Sex Industry Program (SHIFT)
- The United Way of Calgary
- Family & Community Support Services (FCSS) agencies

This system of agencies addresses a continuum of needs from prevention and early intervention to harm reduction and assistance exiting the sex trade







### Public Submission Summary


Respondents identified four key categories of community impacts:
