

- Fund Balance after this transfer will be approximately \$2,311,000

Project Background

- City-owned park space, co-located with the historic McHugh House,
- In April 2018 BNA received Conceptual Drawing Grant from the Parks Foundation Calgary to create initial concept.
- In July 2019, the BCIF Committee approved the funding request for the full project cost of \$1,230,386.00
- Calgary Parks Project Manager appointed, and project included within Parks work program (pending final approval)




- Meets eligibility requirements of BCIF Terms of Reference
- Aligned with the Beltline ARP
- Aligned with Calgary's Comeback and the Downtown Strategy
- Supports investment along 17 Avenue SW



- Beltline is deficient in park space according to City of Calgary community targets
- Supports the BNAs ongoing efforts in making the McHugh House and this space into a community hub by providing complementary outdoor space that can be used for community activities.
- Provides a better active edge to complement the upgrades along 17th Avenue S




Current Park – looking north from 17 AV S


Preliminary Concept from applicant submission






That Priorities and Finance Committee recommend that Council:

- For the purposes of capital construction of Humpy Hollow Park, approve the request for funding of \$1,230,386 from the Beltline Community Investment Fund (BCIF);
- Approve a capital budget increase of \$1,230,286 to Parks Budget ID P500_006 (\$200,000 in 2020 and \$1,030,386 in 2021) funded by the transfer of \$1,230,386 from the Beltline Community Investment Fund (BCIF).
