Rebalancing the Property Tax



Definitions:



- Provincial Property Tax¹ the tax paid to the province. The City bills and collects this for the province.
- City of Calgary Property Tax¹ taxes paid to the City, used to fund City services. This presentation will focus on this portion of the property tax bill.
- Property Assessment² the estimated value of a property, determined by the City using assumptions set forth by the Municipal Government Act
- Residential Property Tax² the property tax paid by owners of residential property, including houses and condos
- Non-residential Property Tax² the property tax
 paid by owners of non-residential properties including
 offices, retail, recreation facilities

Definitions:



- Business Tax Consolidation³ the rolling in of Business Tax into non-residential property tax from 2014-2019.
- Mill Rate⁴ amount of property tax owed per \$1,000 of assessed value
- Phased Tax Program (PTP)⁵ a program implemented in 2017, 2018 and 2019 to reduced the municipal non-residential property tax for eligible nonresidential owners
- Residential vs Non-Residential Tax Ratio a
 comparison of the amount of taxes paid by each group




City of Calgary Expected Revenue and Expenditure (2022) Funding the City's Operating Budget






PTP and the Bow Wave - A visual Guide



Chamber position on Non-Residential Property Taxes

CALGARY – The Calgary Chamber is, once again, calling on City Council to restructure property taxes in the next municipal budget. The Chamber released a property tax proposal aimed at relieving the tax burden on businesses that would see a significant shift in property tax allocation, which they are urging City Council adopt as part of their budget deliberations.

"The property tax issue in Calgary needs to be fixed now to avoid significant business disruption and closure," Chamber CEO Sandip Lalli warned. "The Chamber has been advocating for a property tax shift for over a year and it's time for Council to act."

Property taxes on businesses in Calgary have seen the largest hikes among major cities in Canada for the last four years. The tax increases are a result of a substantial reduction in assessed value in the downtown core due to high vacancy rates. These vacancies have shifted the tax burden to businesses in other parts of the city, leading to tax rates that have become unsustainable.

Council has ignored the non-residential property tax issue by creating band-aid solutions that have cost over one hundred and fifty million dollars but have not solved the problem. Taxes have continued to increase and, with no money left to create temporary solutions going forward, non-residential property taxes will skyrocket by 2020. The Calgary business community will not survive under the current non-residential tax system.

Calgary currently has the highest tax ratio of non-residential to residential property tax (4.2-1) in Canada. This means that Calgary businesses pay a significantly higher portion of municipal tax compared to residential properties in the City. Lowering the non-residential to residential property tax ratio will increase Calgary's competitiveness, encourage new business to develop here and will allow existing businesses to flourish.

The proposal that the Chamber will be submitting to Council recommends a redistribution of property taxes in the city and move the non-residential to residential property tax ratio to 3.1:1 by 2021 with a tax split of 52 per cent residential to 48 per cent non-residential. The current tax split is 49 per cent residential to 51 per cent non-residential.

The proposed shift better represents the use of services provided by municipal tax dollars. Under this proposal, the typical family home (valued at\$455,000) would see a property tax increase of \$136 annually or an additional \$11/month. This ratio shift was one of the options in



the final report of the Tax Shift Assessment Working Group, which was given to the City's Priorities and Finance Committee in early October 2019.

This ratio inversion coupled with a oper cent spending increase, will be a massive step toward relieving the burden on businesses and creating a business environment that can support the businesses Calgarians love and rely on.

Along with reducing the ratio from its current state, the Chamber recommends the City practice fiscal restraint and continue to find operational efficiencies. As well, the Chamber recommends that they also sell non-revenue generating city owned land.



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

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

I have heard the proposals regarding the Calgary City Budget. I would like to submit my comments.

I worked in the O&G business for 33 years before I was let go in 2014. Many others have been let go or are working for a much reduced salary. At that time many companies were in dire need of financial cuts. Some companies offered a 10% cut in staff or a 10% cut in salary. Many of these companies have had to go back and either cut again or have left Canada for more business friendly countries. Given the situation we have with a hostile Federal Government we should be prepared for prolonged downturn in the economy. The actions of the Federal Government targeting "western O&G" were deliberate and for the sole purpose of curtailing development and penalizing current production. This is not focused on the drop on oil prices, as investment and development in the USA and elsewhere around the globe is strong. Investors need a long term business friendly environment, so they won't be back any time soon. Provincially and at the municipal level we need to budget on the basis that it will take decades to recover from the current downturn.

I support a minimum 10 % cut across the board for all City services, salaries and benefits. Proposal that have been tabled to date are not adequate!!

We should also delay or cancel portions of the capital spending planned.

In addition, if it was possible I would cancel the Arena agreement that was pushed through Council with little opportunity for consultation. I understand that more than half the comments received were opposed to the Arena deal. I know many residents in my neighborhood think this was a very poor decision. Calgary residents gave Mayor Nenshi and Council a message of needed austerity, fiscal responsibility and only spend when there is good value for money spent. We were ignored.

I know that currently there is discussion about a freeze or a 5% cut. This is not enough!! This is especially true when you set the budget and then do the needed shift from business to residential. These are not separate. They both hurt the residents.

However, from a resident's perspective, my increase in taxes is just as painful whether it is because of increased spending or the shift. I agree that some shift is needed. This means you need to cut deeper into the City budget and not hit the residents with a double whammy on taxes.

The Calgary City Council acts as if they are immune to the challenges the residents and business are facing. The City Council and the public service need to be in step with the economic reality of the City and its residents and businesses. Unemployment, salary cuts and loss of business revenue are happening all over Calgary. This should be reflected in lower taxes and the accompanying reduced services, reduced salaries and workforce and reduced benefits across all City operations, personnel and Council. This is not happening. Instead we see more tax and spend. I see public servants and Councillors with the highest salaries in the country and benefits that far exceeds what is the norm.

With a 10% budget cut we should be targeting a net zero tax increase for residents and a net tax reduction for businesses.

You made a big deal of a \$60M cut a while back. This is just a start as to what is needed. We need to be closer to a \$600M budget reduction.

The Province is rightfully scaling back health and education costs. I support their budget. I am not out to get police, fire fighters and other city personnel and programs, but the reality is that the economic pain needs to be share fairly and that is not happening. Taxpayers and businesses are at the breaking point.

What is the City's record?

- When Calgary residents rejected the Olympics this was to send a message to City Council. We need to spend according to the means of our economy, businesses, residents and the prospects for recovery. Only the highest value items are justified.
- It was ignored as you proceeded to make an Arena deal to the benefit of millionaire hockey players, owners and entertainers with little return for the City.
- Now you are faced with a budget decision that will require leadership and not a political cop out.

The residents and the businesses in Calgary are not happy with the Mayor, Council and you know it. Do the right thing for Calgary.

I live in Ward 1. I was born and raised here in Calgary and I very much love this town; so much so that whenever I leave it (no matter for how long) I am excited when I am back inside the City limits.

The recent discussions surrounding the Provincial Budget and comments from Council are quite concerning. Look, I get it that decisions like this are tough; I work in the Oil & Gas Industry. In 2015, as a Manager at an International Service company, I was asked to reduce my team headcount by 20%, reduce salaries by 10% through a furlough program, and further reduce compensation 13% by taking away bonuses. My salary and bonuses were reduced and/or taken away completely as well. If you are keeping score, that is a 23% reduction in earnings if you weren't the 1 out of 5 that lost your job. It sucked. At the same time, every one of my customers called us in to a meeting room and asked for a minimum of 30% reduction in pricing to "help keep the lights on".

City of Calgary Inefficiencies Compared to Other Municipalities

The City of Calgary is much less cost-efficient than other municipalities in delivering certain programs and services. Here are a few highlights from the recently published Municipal Benchmarking Network Canada report, which compared the performance of 16¹ municipalities across Canada.

- Information Technology: Calgary spends \$7,701 annually on IT per full-time employee, <u>79%</u> <u>higher</u> than the median cost of \$4,310 per FTE reported by other municipalities. Calgary employees each have an average of 1.27 personal devices (e.g., desktops, tablets, smart phones) whereas the benchmark median is 1.0 devices per person. Time to get off the leading edge and focus on the basics.
- **Police Services**: Calgary spends \$420 per capita, <u>8% more</u> than the median of \$389. What makes this astonishing is that Calgary actually has <u>9.5% fewer police staff per capita</u> than the median. Either wages are way above the norm, or the police service has structural inefficiencies.
- Recreation Programs and Facilities: In Calgary it costs on average \$25.58 per participant visit,
 77% higher than the median cost of \$14.44. The City should shut down more low-usage programs, and/or outsource some delivery to more efficient private-sector operators.
- **Solid Waste Disposal**: Calgary's cost per tonne of solid waste diversion is \$389, <u>53.6% higher</u> than the median cost of \$252. Some members of City council have recently proposed privatizing this service, and these numbers support the need for finding substantial efficiency improvements.

The full report, "2018 MBNCanada Performance Measurement Report", was published in November 2019 and can be found on their website at http://mbncanada.ca/. The City of Calgary does comparatively well in many areas, but those listed above (and others) need intervention.

Municipalities participating in the benchmark report include: Calgary, Toronto, Montreal, York, Winnipeg, Durham, Waterloo, Halton Region, Hamilton, Niagara, Halifax, London, Regina, Windsor, Greater Sudbury, and Thunder Bay.

I wanted to submit my input on the ongoing conversation regarding the upcoming city plan and budget. My points are as follow:

- 1. I believe and recommend that the city plan their budgets based on affordability and usability. This means that taxes are allocated based on what people and business can afford and also what they use.
- a. Affordability: just like when people are taking out a mortgage and the bank does a "stress test" on what a person can afford hypothetically if the interest rates went up, the city should do an opposite 'stress test'. So if peoples income or the number of employment dropped, would the city taxes and services be a burden or still be affordable? Likewise, if a certain number of business went bankrupt or they made less money, can they still afford their taxes? A bench mark should be legislated so that taxes can't be implemented past a 'stress test point'. The city has historical numbers for what employment numbers are and business profit/losses are in Calgary over the years. It should be pretty easy to look at those numbers and identify a limit of what taxes people and business can afford and create a 'stress test' limit based on current populations and business revenues. I am guessing that we aren't even close to people's limits, but too close or past the limit for businesses. (I base this on the number of companies complaining they are closing shop because taxes are too much. Where as I haven't hear a single person complain they had to leave their home because they can't afford taxes.)
- b. Usability: services that aren't used or have lower use should be cut. this will reduce taxes. For example, should soooo much money go into the green line construction when downtown vacancy rate is so high? Or maybe that money should go into increasing bus services to industrial areas that are booming with business? Whereas the police are used every day and should be funded however some of their services could be sold as a revenue stream. (AKA protection services for concerts and sport games should cost the venues more.)
- 2. I also believe and recommend that the city needs to live within their means. This means that we should not go forward with the 14 new communities, we already have a surplus of available housing and housing under construction. Do not compromise city service response time, and the cost of city services for these new communities. There were reasons that we restricted the number of communities several years ago; now the city seems to have forgotten those reasons. Lets use the land we already have serviced to make the city more efficient before we keep expanding.

- 3. City servants should be given bonuses for finding areas of inefficiencies and solutions to improve them. This would help the city prevent waste.
- 4. The city needs to do some better negotiating with Rocky View and the other surrounding communities. Calgary is losing tax dollars when people and business move out of the city to these communities because they are cheaper. Shouldn't a larger city cost less because it is more efficient to provide a service in bulk. So why are these smaller communities cheaper to live and work in? Calgary needs to get them to raise their taxes to help pay for regional infrastructure; or Calgary needs to lower rates in line with their "competition".

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

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

These comments pertain to all City operations other than Fire, Police and/or Transit. Spending pertaining to all other functions of City operations must be brought under control. This will require a lot of political will and some tough love. Here are some suggests:

- 1) Wages for all City employees must be cut by a minimum of 25%, or, in the alternative, there must be a minimum 25% reduction in City staffing levels; and
- 2) The only spending that should be undertaken should be for the maintenance of current infrastructure, completion of projects that already have shovels in the ground and/ or where actual, written contracts to proceed have already been entered into; and
- 3) Any and all spending for feel good, warm and fuzzy projects, and/or pet projects of members of City Council must be placed on hold until such time as the economy improves to at least the level it was prior to 2015; and
- 4) Except to finance emergency situations Debt financing of any kind must be avoided. If it can't be paid for out of the current tax stream and/or the various reserve funds held by the City then the City cannot afford it and whatever the project may be it must be put off to a future date when the economy has improve to a state where we can afford it; and
- 5) Pensions, retirement 'bonuses', and other gold plated perks available to City employees, including the elected few and appointees, should be reviewed and/or eliminated with exception of the former which should be limited to 1 pensions for all comparable to what is offered to employee in the private sector.

You heard the heartaches that your families are undergoing in Calgary by the medical and dental folks that showed up in huge numbers at the last meeting. These folks poured their hearts out to you to reveal the harm that has occurred to children, adults, the mentally and physically challenged, and the aged and infirmed. We all have two families in our lives. Like you, one is my family at home. The other is my family of patients.

I beg of you, please vote to move the restart of water fluoridation forward tonight when you meet. It will go a long way in showing your families in Calgary that you care deeply about their health, pain, and suffering. They have been hurting more and more since water fluoridation was ceased in 2011. If the money is not in the budget to pay for it now, and I realize that it isn't, please vote it back in tonight to make the statement to your families that you care deeply about their health and well-being. Additionally, make the statement that you will seek ways to fund it when the money becomes available. At that point, it will be

implemented. Many of the groups in Calgary and elsewhere are exploring ways in which to help raise these monies to help. They are completely committed to seeing it restarted. Perhaps together, they and you will be able to come up with the monies to fund this project sooner rather than later.

One last thing. I did offer my own personal money of \$14,000 dollars to the private groups (or directly to you) that are working on funding opportunities. I haven't worked in 10 years (totally disabled to practice dentistry). My check is to go directly into restarting fluoridation in Calgary. This is a lot of money to me. But God has been great to my family and me over my lifetime. It's my time in life to give back to those that don't have the one widespread preventive dental treatment that some will ever receive. Please join me in this effort to make them whole and healthy again by voting to restart fluoridation.

Thank you for your time in reading this email. And thank you for your public service to your families in Calgary. Please do not hesitate to contact me if I may be of any assistance to you.

Is is abundantly clear that the divisions within City Councillors are growing vs shrinking. In this time of economic adversity, I am appalled by our council. The grandstanding by our Mayor and the complete lack of maturity by many on council is pathetic.

Our City CFO strongly recommended against going ahead with BMO, Arena ("Event Center") and Arts Commons, saying it would leave us economically strained.

With the exception of Evan Woolley, Farkas, Demon and Farrell, the motion passed anyways.

Here we are 6 months later essentially broke. We are facing increased property taxes yet again. I understand that the UCP is keeping a larger portion of tax revenue. However, it is on us for continuing to spend on the margins.

My suggestions:

- 1. Look at privatizing where possible: Garbage, Parks, non-essential services like golf courses.
- 2. Cancel the arena deal NOW
- 3. Force council and city staff to have a wage freeze or take a pay cut. For public workers we are not in a position to offer wage security and job security. The private sector has seen thousands of layoffs, but even proposing reducing through attrition to city staff seems to be a non-starter.
- 4. Stop worrying about things like residential speed limits. This needs to be a low priority. Everything council does should first have the question: "What is the economic benefit to this decision"
- 5. Stop claiming to have a balanced budget. Constantly increases taxes does not mean balanced. It means increased spending
- 6. Have a \$0.00 starting budget. What are the must haves vs nice to have.

	Calgary and Alberta are going through tough economic times. It is time that City Council gets real and pays attention to the current economic times. We need to cut costs, trim the fat and stop raising taxes like no tomorrow.

Annual pension costs at the city have exploded by 459% between 2002 and 2017. Even more frustrating than the total cost of compensation is the outlandish city employee perks.

More than 200 employees are set to receive three pensions, hundreds more receive two pensions and many employees receive good-bye cheques that average nearly \$11,000 each. This is absurd when most working Albertans outside of government don't even receive a workplace pension! That means no more frivolous spending on gifts such as the time Coun. Druh Farrell expensed a \$195 Japanese knife as a gift to an employee while giving another employee \$243 in gifts. City workers have received 15% pay raises since 2014. Where is that happening in the private sector? This is outrageous spending on taxpayers' dimes.

Instead of cutting back during the downturn, the city's operating budget grew by over \$500 million from 2015 to 2018. This increase followed years of runaway spending.

According to the city's annual reports, the cost of "salaries, wages and benefits" has increased by nearly 20% from 2013 to 2017. The job situation outside of government

isn't as pretty. At nearly 8%, Calgary's unemployment rate remains the highest of Canada's major cities and total workers' pay in the province has declined by 9% since 2014 highs.

City Councillors are also eligable to receive golden parachute pensions that are unheard of in the private sector. Between 2007 and 2016, Calgary council's pensions cost taxpayers more than Vancouver, Edmonton and Ottawa combined. The big issue with Calgary's defined benefit plan is that taxpayers are required to cover pension plan shortfalls. Between 2011 and 2013, taxpayers had to contribute \$1.6 million towards council pensions.

Kudos to Councillors Farkas and Chu for being voices of fiscal restraint.

I drive by 17th Ave SW and Kensington and see more and more small businesses closed up, boarded up and for lease. The tax base is shrinking.

Calgary City Council has a spending problem, not a revenue problem. Please do not bury your heads in the sand. This is a serious problem requiring serious attention to address these problems.



This unsustainable; it is not growth at a reasonable price by any measure. Continued planning of similar increases in the op budget that the City has enjoyed for 10 years is absurd given the loss of tax revenues from downtown buildings.

I do understand the economics of keeping a low revenue pool open however, there are a handful of people who genuinely need a less populated pool and I am one of them. I have been athletic all of my life and always turned to swimming as an aid to recovery when I was injured. I learned to swim as a child (albeit not well) and while I would rather continue with my sports, I am no longer able to do so due to permanent and chronic pain. I'm sure my story is not unusual. I started attending the Inglewood Pool roughly six months ago, and it's perfect for me in the early mornings. Nobody swims too fast, nor are the lanes ridiculously crowded. Not being a great swimmer and being in pain, it is important to me to keep moving in any way I can, and this is my best option. I go in the least busy hours so that I don't put myself at further risk of jostling swimmers and if that pool is no longer available, my health will decline more rapidly, as the risk is too great for me to swim in a busy pool. In short, I would rather be at a less busy, old school pool than in the hospital, and circling back to economics, it's a smaller cost to the taxpayer. I'm not exaggerating, as surgery is my next option...

The back story provides more broadly-reaching justifications. The reason I didn't learn to swim well as a child is that it wasn't convenient for me to get to a pool, nor was it affordable to my parents who had immigrated to Canada not long before I was born. I am grateful for the lessons I received and swimming is an activity that anyone can do, any time and place in the world. It is an invaluable life skill. Other activities, such as hockey, are wonderful for life skills as well, but don't offer the same world-wide acces-

I am a Sunnyside resident living one block north of Memorial Drive and five houses up from 7th Avenue NW at an elevation equivalent to current berm height. In 2013, given an hour to evacuate, I, and all my neighbours, were flooded in 2013. I walk the berm into the downtown.

Here we are, six- and one-half years since the 21st June 2013 flood event from the Bow River.

I saw the initial flood warning in 2005 when Memorial Drive was flooded. That event only halted traffic on Memorial Drive for a short while. I wrongly presumed those responsible would take actions to prevent an even worse flood. That warning, an initial engineering study to the City of Calgary in 1985 and further warnings was not acted upon by City, Province, nor Nationally.

In 2013, being warned on the evening of Thursday 20th June to evacuate, my property basement was flooded through the sewer system. Even though the Sunnyside flood waters were close to my basement walls, penetration came not overland, but through the city managed sewer system.

I have participated in the HSCA efforts toward understanding and developing strategies to mitigate further flooding in Sunnyside.

To date, action on the sewer pump station, storm water pump stations, and a planned commencement on the upper plateau storm water line are all good efforts to rectify faulty designs based on limited or poor assumptions. Now, after Sunnyside sustaining numerous upper plateau floods in 2013, action is ongoing. I do hope that current budget cuts do not halt progress!

However, the elephant in the room is a government responsibility to Sunnyside citizens to ensure the Bow River Berm is of sufficient height and effectively robust to withstand a flood such as that in 2013 as well as a possible (and some say probable) greater flood in the near future due to climate change.

This elephant, however, has been allowed to wander around gathering engineering studies, used to justify an upstream Bow River dam, pay off a TransAlta through the City agreement to do what they ethically should have done to mitigate the 2013 flood, and so on.

Just as the animals at the zoo were provided with an immediate increase to their flood protection within two years of the flood, just as the downtown was protected, so too should the tax paying citizens of Sunnyside be protected.


The historical map shows a 1 in 200 event occurred prior to the 1900's when measurements commenced. Who knows what flows went down the Bow in pre-measurement history?

The current berm was constructed in short order after flooding in the early 1930's. Are we going to see this type of weather again? Climate alarmists believe that to be the case.

Two attached photos show that the goal of providing at the very least a utilitarian consistency for flood mitigation has been lost by the City of Calgary.

- a. 2019 Sunnyside Berm Walk along the berm near work being done on Pump Station #2 (the force main). Observe the condition of the berm facing the Bow River (and the unkept island). Admittedly, failure was not seen at this portion of the berm, however, the slope is near vertical, while the slope on the Memorial Drive is not so. Walk further west, or east, and observe the slope is no longer vertical, and where visible to the south shore has riprap protection.
- b. 2019 Sunnyside Berm Low Point at Peace Bridge Please observe the low point in the Sunnyside berm at storm sewer outlet B49. The berm, prior to installation of the multimillion Peace Bridge used to be higher at this point. Overflow at this location ran along Memorial Drive in 2013. Why was the berm lowered at this location??? Why is it still lower 6-1/2 years later???

I could have included more photos to demonstrate that the City has lost focus on the purpose of the Sunnyside Berm. One of which is the ramp at the pedestrian bridge with a porous drainage system well below the height of the original berm.

Everything else other than the **UTILITARIAN PURPOSE** is window dressing. Nice to look at, nice to have, nice to ride bikes and scooters on, nice to walk on, etc.

The north shore landing at the Peace Bridge (1:200 effectiveness) should be used as the design height of the berm along the length through Sunnyside. Anything less might result in a near future flood, and all the experts scrambling for excuses.

Build a utilitarian berm immediately, and then deliver the nice to have items subsequently.



I am a Sunnyside resident living one block north of Memorial Drive and five houses up from 7th Avenue NW at an elevation equivalent to current berm height. In 2013, given an hour to evacuate, I, and all my neighbours, were flooded.

Here we are, six- and one-half years since the 21st June 2014 flood event from the Bow River and of course, other community flooding due to rainfall in Calgary.

I saw the initial flood warning in 2005 when Memorial Drive was flooded. That event only halted traffic on Memorial Drive for a short while. That warning, along with an initial engineering study provided to the City of Calgary in 1985, along with further warnings, was not acted upon by City, Province, nor Nationally.

In 2013, being warned on Thursday 20th June to evacuate, my property basement was flooded through the sewer system. Even though the Sunnyside flood waters were close to my basement walls, penetration came not overland, but through the city managed sewer system.

The Canadian Building Code was changed by 2000 to require Backwater Valves on the home sewer system. No effort at that time by the City, Province, or Federal governments and Insurance Companies was made to notify property tax paying citizens of this requirement, nor was any attempt to mobilize a cost effective solution to protect homeowner (at little to no cost to government or insurers) to implement the solution, and no guidance. Homeowners, like me, were left on their own to suffer the consequences of ignorance in this area.

After the flood, I scrambled to obtain information on why homeowners were left exposed to sewer system flooding. I did have my insurance payout held up to the tune of \$40,000 until I completed the installation of a backwater valve on my sewer system and provided proof of the installation.

Through personal investigation, I installed the following:

Interestingly, plumbing contractors in 2013 were offering to install such a device for upwards of \$3,000 or more. That was criminal.

The unit cost me \$200 in 2013. I found an honest plumber who installed it for \$300 which included breaking concrete, hauling away debris, installing valve, and recementing. A plumber today can likely obtain a significantly reduced price if ordering 100, which is likely just a small number of those required to ensure the health and safety of all Calgarians.

This Mainline Fullport Backwater Valve was designed by an Edmonton plumber, and has been available in All of North America since 2010. I had to find this out for myself. I know for a fact that my father before me, and I, never received any information regarding the importance of installing one in a home built prior to 2000. Why is this the case?

Calgary had and still has an opportunity to offer this information to all Calgarians.

It would be an opportunity for Water Works to not just install and monitor the water inflow valve, but also ensure all Calgarians are protected from sewer. At the same time, perform a camera inspection of the sewer line running to the City provided sewer line tie in.

Interestingly, one neighbor found out that their 1963 installed line to the main sewer was asphalt coated cardboard which had collapsed during the flood event. Also, the 1990 installed Backwater Valve (Not the Mainline Design) was destroyed by the sewer water backflow.

It does no good to change codes and not inform or support those living in homes/accommodations that put them at risk of sewer backup.

It does no good to initiate Engineering Studies when what is required is Action.

It does no good to have a Resiliency Group missing this opportunity.

It does no good to have Water Works ignore what happens to their water supply after use by a Calgarian.

This is a sanitation and health issue which is not being addressed by Calgary (and likely many municipalities in Canada).

City of Calgary

We are residents of Sunnyside who were badly affected by the terrible 2013 floods.

We are writing to ask that the city budget for 2020 include funding of up to \$10 million to pay for the raising of the Sunnyside berm along the Bow River by 1 meter.

Raising the berm by 1 meter will give Sunnyside at least 1:100 year flood protection, which is the minimum required by the provincial government and is also an agreed on minimum by city council.

Downtown is being protected by new berms in Eau Claire along the south side of the Bow River just east of the Peace Bridge which give 1:200 year flood protection.

All we are asking for is something similar for Sunnyside.

Sunnyside is just 100 meters away from Eau Claire, but on the north side of the Bow River.

The province will not be providing funding for a raised berm for Sunnyside due to cutbacks in funding.

Flood protection has been clearly identified as a top priority for the City of Calgary.

Therefore we are writing to plead for City of Calgary to provide funding for a higher Sunnyside Bow River berm, such funding to be included in the 2020 city budget.

The amount required is \$7 to \$10 million to protect \$1 billion in Sunnyside infrastructure, a very good return on investment.

Please put this issue on the agenda for city council to discuss during the upcoming CIty of Calgary 2020 budget discussions.

Dear Councillor:

It has come to my attention that the City Council is considering a variety of measures to reduce services and hence employment to a number of people in the light of significantly reduced income. Additionally a huge number of small businesses have been suffering significant hardship as a consequence of increased tax bills in an effort to raise municipal income. Finally the emergency services (Police and fire) are also looking at budgetary restrictions. There may be a way to resolve all these issues in one fair swoop.

The idea would be to introduce a municipal gas or fuel tax.

Currently the Coop gas stations (Including those in Airdrie, Strathmore and Cochrane) pump in the order of 2 billion litres of gas a year. In addition to the Coop there are Esso, Shell, Centex, Fas Gas plus other providers. Between them all they would pump in the order of (I'm guessing) 5-6 billion litres a year. A fuel tax of 2 .5 cents /litre would provide an income of about \$100 million, a nickel /litre would be in the order of \$250 million. In the former instance for a 60 litre fill this translates to less than a \$2.00 premium at the pump (2 postage stamps worth) while the nickel /litre is \$3.00 about the same price as a regular coffee at the coffee shop. In either instance it would be quite affordable at the local level, given that gas prices are currently hovering around 95cents/litre and have been as high as \$1.25/litre and higher for premium grade.

As I recall the same idea has been used in Vancouver to pay for and promote their skytrain or LRT. Additionally I would point out that the City of Calgary pays an enormous amount of its resources on its roads – building them, maintaining them, curbing and guttering, salting and snow ploughing, sweeping them off in the spring and finally of course policing them with additional emergency services as required. Could this be used as sales pitch?

I also understand that to introduce such a tax would require regulatory approval from the provincial government .This is too valuable a commodity to be ignored, particularly in the light of recent defaults from Edmonton and the need for an alternative source of municipal

revenue; it should be pursued with the utmost vigour. While seeking provincial approval a claim for an adjustment to the small business taxation could also be made - should it be deemed necessary - to bring the current legislation more in line with that found in other provinces , e.g. BC, where small business is in a different category from big business and hence comes in at a different rate.

In summary such a scheme could be a win-win all round and resolve quite quickly a number of serious problems without creating additional issues with the passage of time or the furor of the public. Finally it has the advantage of being very simple to administer.

I would urge you to give this your consideration.

I work in the Beltline area and live in Glendale SW. I am a single mother of 3 and have had an annual membership at the Beltline pool for the past 10 plus years. I regularly attend the noon hour fitness classes and occasionally attend the noon hour aquafit classes or the weight room. This physical fitness regime has helped me stay physically fit and mentally stable. Since I needed to get my kids to school in the mornings and to their extra-curricular activities after school, the noon hour was the only time I could get to the gym. I also find that breaking up my day with physical exercise has made me more productive in the afternoons at work. The noon hour workouts at the Beltline pool have been well instructed and have offered me the opportunity to challenge myself not only to maintain my fitness level but also to push myself to improve. In the past three summers, I have participated in a Gran Fondo cycling event and have increased the distance each year. I look forward to the Beltline fitness classes, where I have made friends with the instructors and the other people attending the classes. I don't know where I will find a replacement to the convenient, high quality and relatively low cost fitness classes and find a replacement to the community I have found there.

I have regularly filled out the questionnaire regarding the Beltline Pool. And I always state that they should keep things the same. Regardless, the City has closed the beltline twice in the past 4 years for renovations. This has been difficult for me each time, but usually the closures have been in the summer when there are fitness alternatives such as biking to work. If the attendance levels have declined, it may be as a result of the closures which forced people to look elsewhere. Now that the renovations are complete and the gym has a new floor and the change rooms are beautiful, I find it hard to understand why the city would close the facility after investing so much money into it. The beltline pool is a hidden gem in the inner city and if more people knew about, I'm sure it would attract a higher attendance, given the increase in apartments being built in the area.

I urge the City to reconsider closing the Beltline pool.



SUBJECT: IN SUPPORT OF KEEPING THE INGLEWOOD POOL OPEN AND OPERATING

I am writing in support of keeping the Inglewood Pool open and operating.

WHAT THE POOL MEANS TO ME

Swimming, as a form of regular weekly exercise, quite literally, saved my life.

Back in 1984, at the age of 44, I suffered a prolonged, debilitating clinical depression, due to burnout. I learned that, in addition to medication and psychotherapy, regular physical exercise was the third and necessary component in the long slow recovery of my mental and physical well-being. So I took up swim lessons, and began swimming 30 lengths, weekly at Inglewood Pool. I can attest to the fact that this form of exercise played an essential role in overcoming my depression and restoring my mental health.

Physically, I discovered that swimming not only makes me feel good, it always energizes me and my body feels "tuned up" for the day ahead! Now, at the age of 79, 35 years later, I am still swimming at Inglewood pool, and it still has the same effects on me, and I continue to swim lengths (now slightly reduced to 20 lengths, as I now have a bit of arthritis in my hips, and, in my lower back, some osteoarthritis, and a couple of deteriorating discs. Despite these conditions, I find weekly swimming definitely keeps me feeling better and and still energizes me and keeps me physically fit and active, and contributes to my over-all well-being.

If and when I get too busy and don't swim for over two weeks, stiffness and pain return and remind me to, literally, "get back into the swim.'

Over these years, I have met many other women who swim, or do various forms of aquacize at Inglewood Pool as a form of therapy for various conditions such as arthritis, in their backs, knees, or hips, or recuperating from surgeries in various joints. Two retired teachers live across the street from the pool; one swims, 7 days a week (and has done so for years!). The other has severe problems with her feet and knees, and has to walk with a cane, but she still swims almost every day of the week as well!

As a senior on a limited income, swimming is also very affordable for me! My \$79 polyester swim suit has lasted me <u>over seven years</u>, and is still in use! (No need for expensive clothing and equipment!)

LOSS OF THIS POOL -

This would mean I would lose the benefits of swimming that I have mentioned above. Because swimming is a non-weight bearing form of exercise, it is the best form of exercise for my hips and back. I know that if I could not swim, my hip and back conditions would become worse and deteriorate very quickly; consequently, my overall health and quality of life would be considerably reduced. And, I dare say, closing the pool would also have a detrimental effect on the health and fitness of many others--young and old--who regularly swim or exercise there.

IDEAS FOR KEEPING THE POOL RUNNING

- 1. Keep the length swims and various forms of aquacize
- 2. Keep the "learn to swim" programs with the schools
- 3. Establish and/or keep the "birthday swim party" program
- 4. I think there used to be an after-school program, was there not? if so restore it these are very important
- 5. Summer "camps";
- 6. NEW RESIDENTS IN THE AREA COULD USE THIS POOL!

The new YWCA is just across the street - it has no pool.

There are several new buildings presently going up on 9th Avenue--all with apartments above the retail spaces on the ground floor.

Advertise that the Inglewood pool is just down the street!

Early evening / after-work swim and length-swim hours could be very welcome for those who live in Inglewood and/or work so close to downtown.

A community is more than just buildings! It needs recreational facilities that can keep its residents in a state of well-being.

The pool is already there!

Keep some of the programs that worked in the past;

Be creative and introduce new ones.

The community building that occurs during our weekend swimming will also be affected. Everytime we attend, there are other families from the neighbourhood. The sense of community and socialization continues to be built over our weekend swimming.

City run facilities provide affordable options for citizens for physical and social activity. These facilities are vital to ensuring inner cities continue to house growing families. Continuing to build and develop suburban communities with brand new rec centres is contributing the many challenges of a sprawling city. Families move farther out of the

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

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

Dear Mayor Nenshi and City Councillors,

As you know, the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB) is a non–partisan, not–for–profit political advocacy organization representing the interests of small and medium–sized businesses in Canada. We represent 110,000 members across Canada, including approximately 10,000 in Alberta and 2,500 in Calgary.

As you begin consulting the public and finalizing budget adjustments, CFIB respectfully submits the 10^{th} Edition of our Alberta Municipal Spending Watch Report for your consideration. The report analyzes operating spending habits of Alberta's 17 largest municipalities between 2007 – 2017, and once again determines that municipalities across Alberta are increasing their spending at unsustainable rates. While CFIB recognizes that over the past two years, council has been able to control spending, we believe more can be done to better protect taxpayers, especially small businesses.

With added 2008–2018 data, Calgary does improve on the municipal ranking list and moves up from 11th place to 9th place out of Alberta's 17 largest municipalities. Calgary's real operating spending growth increased 42.2 per cent, while population grew by 21.5 per cent – nearly double the rate of population growth. We recognize the need to balance population growth and ensure essential services. However, additional revenues to meet this demand, especially in economic downturns, should not be placed on the backs of small business owners in the form of higher property taxes.

Small business owners made it clear this past June that they were done picking up the tab for council's spending. Some owners saw increases of at least 10 per cent, while the remaining one–third saw an increase of over 30 per cent. There are three lessons to be learned from Calgary's ongoing property tax disaster. First, its an example of the consequences associated with years of uncontrolled municipal spending. Second, it shows that with a concerted effort, municipal governments can control spending. Third, it highlights the risk of relying too heavily on local business owners to pay for municipal government spending increases.

We understand council has tough decisions to make and are looking at ways to change the property tax split between residential and non-residential owners and attract more businesses to the downtown core. Our members are very concerned as council finalizes its budget adjustments that they may once again be burdened with increased costs they cannot afford given the current economic climate.

CFIB also recognizes the Alberta government's recently released budget has forced the council to find greater efficiencies. In our recent Alberta Post-Budget Survey, 89 per cent of Calgary small businesses said they are concerned changes to municipal finding will result in higher municipal taxes. To grapple with the funding changes 79 per cent of our small businesses in Calgary said they oppose increasing municipal taxes, including property taxes. These results are indicative of the worries small business owners are facing as council continues to place the burden of additional revenue squarely on the backs of small business owners. For years small businesses have been forced because of higher taxes and economic uncertainties to find internal efficiencies and are asking council to do the same. In fact, 93 per cent of small businesses in Calgary support municipalities finding cost savings and internal efficiencies to make up for the funding gap.

Included in CFIB's Municipal Spending Watch Report are recommendations for council that we are asking you to consider in order to mitigate the property tax burden on small business. In June, council was able to find efficiencies of \$60 million, and we believe they can do the same in this budget.

On behalf of our members, we recommend the following:

- Limit operating spending growth to not exceed inflation plus population growth.
- ▶ Engage in sustainable spending practises. This includes adopting strategies such as reviewing core services and contracting services to the private sector, to ensure that services are being delivered in an efficient way.
- ▶ **Better control the number of municipal employees.** A lower ratio of full-time municipal employees to population growth ensures that real operating spending is more in line with population growth and inflation.
- ▶ Pursue reforms to employee compensation systems. Municipalities should cooperate on collective bargaining best practices to ensure settlements on wages and benefits are affordable for local taxpayers, including small businesses. Municipal governments should implement sustainable compensation systems and wage growth policies and call for reforms to collective bargaining and arbitration systems.

These recommendations are not exclusive to Calgary, we are urging all municipalities across Alberta to adopt these recommendations to better protect small businesses from higher property taxes.

Executive Summary

This year's edition of the Alberta Municipal Spending Watch Report marks the 10-year anniversary of the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB) tracking and analyzing spending trends of Alberta's municipalities.

After a decade of examining municipal spending, there are some trends which have remained constant. For instance, real operating spending growth has consistently remained above the sustainable level of population growth.

This edition of the Alberta Municipal Spending Watch Report also places municipal spending trends in context with another trend that has emerged —that of municipal hiring. Municipal spending and hiring are intertwined, and therefore reviewing municipal hiring as an area for improvement is an effective way to review overall municipal operating spending.

For the past 10 years, CFIB has seen how municipal operating spending has decreased, stagnated or increased. This report acknowledges some of Alberta's municipalities that are worthy of recognition for reducing spending growth, while also highlighting a large number of municipalities that must improve operating spending to protect taxpayers from future tax hikes.

1. Introduction


Municipal governments provide many services that benefit citizens and create an economic environment that supports small and medium-sized businesses (SMEs). When local governments have unsustainable spending SMEs often feel the most impact because the disproportionate share of property taxes they pay.¹

This report analyzes operating spending of Alberta municipalities, with a focus on the 17 largest by population (containing at least 25,000 people in 2017). These 17 largest municipalities are ranked according to their operating spending between 2007 and 2017 and by 2017 per capita spending. Operating spending refers to municipal expenses associated with day-to-day functions, including things such as: employee salaries and benefits, utilities, and interest on long-term debt. Operating expenditures excludes capital expenditures and amortization.

On average, real municipal operating spending across all Alberta municipalities, and within the 17 largest ones, more than double the rate of population growth from 2007-2017 (see Figures 1.1 and 1.2).

2. Key Findings — 17 Largest Alberta Municipalities Spending, 2007 to 2017

- In Alberta's 17 largest municipalities, unsustainable municipal spending cost an additional \$4,400 per resident over the 2007-2017 period.
- For Alberta's 17 largest municipalities, population increased by 26.8 per cent from 2007-2017, while real municipal operating expenditure grew by 66.6 per cent.
- Cochrane, Okotoks, and Lloydminster were the three best performing municipalities in terms of sustainable spending patterns.
- Of Alberta's 17 largest municipalities, Cochrane was the only one to keep real operating spending growth at a sustainable level below the rate of population growth, from 2007-2017.
- The Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo (Fort McMurray), Strathcona County, and Grande Prairie are the worst performing in terms of apending patterns.
- Edmonton and Calgary ranked as 10th and 11th worst, respectively.
- In 2017, the cumulative operating spending per capita for Alberta's 17 largest municipalities was \$2,596. Operating spending in the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo was the highest at \$5,002 per capita. Operating spending in Cochrane was the lowest at \$1,538 per capita.
- For many municipalities, part of their over-spending problem is the result of expanding the municipal workforce much faster than population growth and increasing municipal wages well beyond the private sector average.

The Benchmark: Inflation and Population Growth

Why compare inflation-adjusted operating spending to population growth?

In order to analyze the trends in a municipality's operating spending, the expenditures must first be adjusted for inflation to account for any increases in prices that occur over time. While there are a number of different ways to measure to inflation, this report uses the most common one: The Consumer Price Index (CPI). Unlike alternative inflation measures, CPI reflects the prices that consumers pay and does not place an emphasis on factors that municipalities have a greater degree of control over, such as employee wages and salaries.

This inflation-adjusted operating spending is then compared to population growth. If a municipality's population grows, it is reasonable for municipalities to increase their operating spending by an incremental amount so that they can provide the same services to a greater number of people. Small business owners accept municipal governments may need to increase their spending over time — but only if it does not increase beyond the sustainable spending threshold of inflation plus population growth.³

3. Ranking Alberta's 17 Largest Municipalities

Alberta's largest 17 municipalities were ranked according to the sustainability patterns of their spending from 2007-2017.⁴ The rankings assigned to each municipality are based equally and entirely on two distinct metrics: real operating spending per capita growth from 2007-2017, and 2017 operating spending per capita. These rankings are relative rather than absolute—they represent how spending tendencies in each of Alberta's 17 largest municipalities compare to one another and are not representative of how sustainable a municipality's spending might be in general.

⁴ The 10th edition of the Alberta Municipal Spending Watch Report differs in its analysis from previous editions of the report, and rankings from this report are not necessary directly comparable to those of previous reports (see Appendix A: Methodology).

Table 1.1 lists Alberta's 17 largest municipalities according to their rank, from best (most sustainable spending) to worst (least sustainable spending). Cumulative operating spending per capita growth from 2007-2017 for Alberta's 17 largest municipalities was 31.4 per cent, while the operating spending per capita in 2017 was \$2,596. The three best performing municipalities were Cochrane, Okotoks, and Lloydminster, respectively. The three worst performing municipalities were the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo (Fort McMurray), Strathcona County, and Grande Prairie.

The Best

Cochrane was found to be the best-ranked municipality, and its operating spending patterns have a few unique characteristics that distinguish it from the other municipalities. With a 2007-2017 real operating spending growth per capita of negative 9.6 per cent, Cochrane is the only municipality to experience a decrease in 2007-2017 real operating spending growth per capita. Cochrane also had the lowest 2017 operating spending per capita, at \$1,538. Additionally, Cochrane was the only municipality examined to have a 2007-2017 real operating spending growth that is at a sustainable level, significantly lower than population growth. Cochrane's 2007-2017 real operating spending growth was 72.9 per cent, while it experienced a 91.3 per cent growth in population during that same period.

The second-best performing municipality was Okotoks, which experienced a 6.3 per cent growth in real operating spending per capita from 2007-2017 and an operating spending per capita of \$1,591 in 2017. Lloydminster, the third best performing municipality, also only increased real operating spending per capita by 6.3 per cent but had a higher per capita spending level of \$1,818 in 2017.

The Worst

The worst-ranked municipality was the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo (which includes the city of Fort McMurray), which also exhibited unique spending patterns that differentiated it from other municipalities. From 2007-2017, the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo grew its real operating spending per capita by 147.4 per cent, which is much higher than any of the other municipalities examined. Additionally, the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo had a substantially higher operating spending per capita in 2017 at \$5,002—the next highest for this metric was Strathcona County, at \$2,902.

The second worst performing municipality was Strathcona County, which experienced a 37.5 per cent growth in real operating spending per capita from 2007-2017 and operating spending per capita of \$2,902 in 2017.

The third worst performing municipality of Grande Prairie experienced a 50.0 per cent growth in real operating spending per capita from 2007-2017, and operating spending per capita of \$2,470 in 2017.

The Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo

The Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo has faced a bevy of extenuating circumstances in recent years that have undoubtedly affected its ability to keep operating spending under control. Most notably, the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo was devastated by the 2016 Fort McMurray wildfire. This was a big factor as to why the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo is the worst-ranked municipality.

However, just how big a factor is not as clear. Prior to this event, the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo's operating spending trends were far from sustainable. The 5th edition of the Alberta Spending Report, released in 2014, examines municipal spending trends from 2000-2012. In that report, the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo is ranked as third worst (179 out of 171 municipalities).⁵ For more information on the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo's operating spending trends over time, refer to Appendix B.

Calgary and Edmonton

Alberta's two biggest metropolitan centres, Calgary and Edmonton, ranked similarly to one another and are 11th and 10th out of 17, respectively. Calgary's real operating spending per capita grew by 28.6 per cent from 2007-2017, and Calgary had operating spending per capita of \$2,561 in 2017. Edmonton's real operating spending per capita grew by 23.4 per cent from 2007-2017, and Edmonton had operating spending per capita of \$2,573.

Calgary's Property Tax-astrophe: Lessons for Alberta

This past June, businesses in Calgary were shocked when they received their property tax bills for 2019: two-thirds of commercial property tax owners saw an increase of at least 10%, while the remaining one-third saw an increase of over 30 per cent. The small business community voiced their outrage over these property tax increases, culminating in a rally on the steps of City Hall. In response, Calgary's city council put together a plan: use \$131 million to reduce non-residential property tax bills by 10 per cent, with \$60 million of this coming from cuts to the 2019 city budget.

There are a few lessons to be learned from Calgary's tax disaster. First, its an example of the consequences associated with years of uncontrolled municipal spending. Second, it shows with a concerted effort municipal government can control spending. Third, it highlights the risk of relying too heavily on local business owners to pay for municipal government spending increases.

4. Municipal Hiring

The budget item that forms the largest percentage of municipal operating spending is, by far, the category of "wages, salaries, and benefits". If municipalities reduce their spending in this category it would have a significant effect on its overall operating spending level.

Compensation

Employee wages are generally determined by collective bargaining and arbitration systems, which constrains a municipality's ability to determine wages and compensation for its

unionized employees. Current collective bargaining methods lead to situations where a municipality might not be able to control compensation costs.

Municipalities often encounter situations where they do not have complete decision-making authority. For instance, if a municipality is negotiating salaries and benefits with a union and no agreement can be reached, then they enter arbitration. In this case, a third-party arbitrator will make the decision independently and the municipality is bound to it. These arbitrators may not consider a municipality's (i.e. the taxpayers') ability to fund wage and compensation increases. Furthermore, little transparency and ability to access information regarding wages and benefits, negotiations, and arbitrations make it difficult to hold municipalities accountable.

Once an arborator's decision has been made regarding wages, salaries, and benefits for one municipality, a precedent is set for other municipalities to do the same. The current arbitration system appears broken and work needs to be done to better balance the needs of municipal employees with that of local taxpayers.

Municipal Hiring

While municipalities might be somewhat constrained in their decision-making abilities surrounding the level of compensation that they pay to unionized employees, they do have more freedom when it comes to the other half of the equation—the number of employees. The problem of overspending is further compounded by municipalities engaging in unsustainable levels of hiring.

Figure 4.1 shows how many residents each municipality had per full-time municipal worker employed in 2017, with Alberta's largest 17 municipalities ordered by rank. This figure reveals a strong connection between a municipality's ranking and the number of full-time employees it has relative to its population. Generally, municipalities that have a lower resident per municipal worker ratio have much higher operating spending. The best ranked municipality of Cochrane had one full-time municipal worker for approximately every 162 people, while the worst ranked Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo had one full-time municipal worker for approximately every 85 people.

Airdrie had the highest population to full-time municipal worker ratio in 2017, and therefore employed the fewest amount of full-time municipal workers relative to its population. Airdrie, ranked 4th best at sustainable spending, employed one full-time municipal worker for approximately every 167 people. In contrast, the municipality that had the lowest population to full-time municipal worker ratio in 2017 was Strathcona County. That municipality, which was ranked as second worst in this report, employed one full-time municipal worker for every 61 people.

This shows that while municipal governments might not be able to control every aspect of their employee compensation system, they are able to mitigate problems by limiting the number of municipal workers employed.

Inconsistent Definitions – Full-time Equivalents

The Ministry of Municipal Affairs requires municipalities to provide information on the number of full-time equivalents (FTEs) employed by the city on an annual basis. This data is reflected in Figure 4.1.

However, there is a mismatch between how some municipalities define FTEs and how the province defines FTEs for reporting purposes. This can make comparisons difficult, as the number of FTEs may differ between how a municipality reports it and how the province reports it.

Further, directly comparing provincial data is difficult as some FTEs may not be counted. For example, the employee count published by Municipal Affairs for Edmonton is much lower than their own count. This is because Edmonton defines and analyses FTEs differently, focusing more on employees captured by their collective bargaining agreement.

CFIB strongly believes the Alberta government should work with municipalities to establish a single definition of full-time equivalents.

5. Top Performers

In honour of the 10th anniversary of the Alberta Municipal Spending Report, CFIB would like to recognize some municipalities that have consistent sustainable municipal spending. Out of Alberta's largest 17 municipalities, the following three are recognized as top performers.

MOST CONSISTENT: AIRDRIE

Airdrie has consistently done well in the rankings year after year. In the 4th edition of the Alberta Municipal Spending Report released in 2013, Airdrie ranked at 26 out of 181 municipalities for the 2000-2011 period.7 While this doesn't seem impressive in comparison to the 10th edition that only examines the 17 largest municipalities, this ranking of 26 means that out of the 17 municipalities analyzed in this report, only two of them (Okotoks and Lloydminster) ranked better than Airdrie.8 For every subsequent report, Airdrie is ranked in the top three municipalities examined in the 10th edition report.



Figure 5.1 shows Airdrie's real operating spending and population growth have remained consistent over time. The two measures remain roughly parallel to one another from 2007-2017, with a relatively narrow gap between them.

MOST IMPROVED: COCHRANE

Throughout the years, many municipalities have changed where they place in municipal rankings. It is important to acknowledge and congratulate municipalities that have improved

their operational spending and climbed in the rankings. The municipality of Cochrane has successfully been able to do this.

In the 4th edition of the Alberta Municipal Spending Report released in 2013, Cochrane was ranked 122 out of 171 municipalities for the 2000-2011 period. Since then, Cochrane has improved in the rankings in every new edition of the report. In the 9th edition of the report, released in 2018, Cochrane ranked third out of 182 municipalities for the 2006-2016 period. 10 In the 10th edition, Cochrane is the best out of Alberta's 17 biggest municipalities for the 2007-2017 period, and is the only municipality examined that kept 2007-2017 real operating spending growth at a sustainable level.



Figure 5.2 shows Cochrane's real operating spending habits over time. While population growth has increased over the years, with a sharp increase beginning in 2011, real operating spending has become flatter relative to population growth. This means that Cochrane was able to gradually decrease the gap between real operating expenditure growth and population growth, eventually achieving sustainable levels of real operating spending growth after 2015. Additionally, over time Cochrane has managed to improve their full-time municipal worker to population ratio. In 2009, Cochrane employed one full-time municipal worker for approximately every 123 people. In 2017, there was one full-time municipal worker for every 162 people.

MOST RESILIANT: OKOTOKS

There are some factors that influence a municipality's operating spending that are outside their control. Natural disasters can often force municipalities to spend more than they planned to,

especially when they are destructive such as, the 2013 floods which devastated much of southern Alberta.

The 6th edition of the Alberta Municipal Spending Watch Report released in 2015 examines operating spending trends of Alberta's municipalities from 2003-2013. That edition of the report lists municipalities that saw a significant spike in spending because of the 2013 Alberta floods. 11 Okotoks, saw real operating expenditure increase 38 per cent in six years from 2007-2012. In the year following the 2013 floods operating expenditures spiked up 75 per cent as the city put resources towards clean-up and reconstruction efforts.



Figure 5.3 shows just how severely Okotoks' real operating spending was affected by the 2013 floods—real operating expenditure growth increased at a relatively stable level until 2012, where it spiked significantly until 2014. However, in 2014, Okotoks experienced a decrease in real operating expenditure growth which brought it closer in line with population growth. There was another minor spike in 2015, followed by another subsequent decrease in real operating expenditure growth. Okotoks is an example of how municipalities over time can control real operating expenditure growth a natural disaster.

6. Conclusion

From 2007-2017, the majority of Alberta's 17 largest municipalities grew operating spending well above the sustainable benchmark of inflation and population growth. Cochrane was the only municipality that kept operating spending growth at a sustainable level in this period. Although some municipal governments have made substantial efforts to reduce operating spending, much more needs to be done to rein in spending. Excessively high municipal

operating spending leads to a combination of lower infrastructure spending and/or increased taxation, both of which dampen economic development and job creation. If municipalities do not control their operating spending, taxpayers bear higher costs. For small businesses owners, this reduces the ability to expand, thrive, and create jobs. Small businesses are particularly impacted by property tax increases because as they are taxed at a rate two to four times higher than residents with the same property valuation.¹²

7. Recommendations

CFIB makes the following recommendations to municipal governments:

- **Limit operating spending** growth to not exceed inflation plus population growth.
- ▶ Engage in sustainable spending practises. This includes adopting strategies such as reviewing core services and contracting services to the private sector, to ensure that services are being delivered in an efficient way.
- ▶ Implement appropriate contingency funds in case of natural disasters. Alberta's municipalities are at risk of being impacted by natural disasters and often forced to increase operating spending following the event. Emergency natural disaster funds should be assessed regularly to ensure they are available for clean-up and reconstruction efforts.
- ▶ Pursue reforms to employee compensation systems. Municipalities should cooperate on collective bargaining best practices to ensure settlements on wages and benefits are affordable for local taxpayers, including small business. Municipal governments should implement sustainable compensation systems and wage growth policies and call for reforms to collective bargaining and arbitration systems.
- ▶ **Better control the number of municipal employees.** A lower ratio of full-time municipal employees to population growth ensures that real operating spending is more in line with population growth and inflation.
- ▶ **Develop consistent definitions of full-time municipal workers.** The province mandates municipalities provide information on their full-time municipal staffing levels. However, the definition differs because of how some municipalities calculate their staffing levels, which leads to inconsistent reporting. The province should work with municipalities to establish a single method of counting full-time municipal employees.

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Appendix A: Methodology

This report analyzes Alberta municipal operating spending from 2007 to 2017. A ten-year rolling average for operational spending analysis is used because elected municipal officials serving consecutive terms have control over budgets during that time period.

The 10th edition of the Alberta Municipal Spending Watch Report differs in its analysis from previous editions of the report. Previous editions included a comprehensive provincial ranking of all municipalities with populations greater than 1,000 and included a subsidiary analysis of Alberta's 17 most densely populated areas. The 10th edition of the Alberta Municipal Spending Watch Report only analyzes 17 Alberta municipalities with a population greater than 25,000 in 2017. Therefore, the municipality rankings in this year's report cannot be directly compared to the rankings in previous editions of this report.

Unless otherwise indicated, the data in this report on municipal revenues, expenditures, and population was obtained from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs, and the Alberta government. To calculate inflation, Statistics Canada CPI measures were used. This report used city-specific measures where available (i.e. Calgary and Edmonton), while the provincial figure was used for all other municipalities.

The City of Lloydminster is uniquely located along the border of Alberta and Saskatchewan. As a result, their financial data was not available on the Alberta Municipal Affairs website, CFIB manually imputed the financial data from Lloydminster's audited financial statements and incorporated the numbers into this report. Although there were some line item classification differences in the financial statements, the overall final operational expenditure amount per year was comparable to the other municipalities.


To isolate operating spending, capital related costs were carefully subtracted from each municipality's spending totals. Prior to 2009, capital spending was reported separately from operating spending. However, from 2009 to 2013 there was an accounting change and capital costs were identified as amortization of capital assets. As only a few municipalities operate their own gas and electric utilities, any spending on these items after 2009 was also excluded from the operating spending calculations to allow for consistency.

Municipal rankings are based on two factors: real operating spending per capita growth from 2007-2017, and 2017 operating spending per capita which are equally weighted. Alberta's largest 17 municipalities were first ranked on each factor independently, then were given a score from 0 to 100 for each factor based on this ranking. These two scores are then equally weighted to create a total score that is ranked against the other municipalities and determines each municipality's ranking.


Previous editions of Alberta spending reports used real operating spending per capita for current year (i.e. adjusting 2017 per capita spending data for inflation). This year's report uses nominal per capita spending for current year (i.e. not adjusted for inflation) to better reflect what the actual cost per resident was for that year. Therefore, comparisons between this year's spending per capita in the current year and previous year's reports are not directly comparable.


Calgary Operating Expenditure Trends, 2007 to 2017 Ranked 12 out of the 17 largest AB Municipalities



Leduc Operating Expenditure Trends, 2007 to 2017 Ranked 13 out of the 17 largest AB Municipalities















Spruce Grove Operating Expenditure Trends, 2007 to 2017 Ranked 5 out of the 17 largest AB Municipalities





St. Albert Operating Expenditure Trends, 2007 to 2017 Ranked 11 out of the 17 largest AB Municipalities





Re: Calgary 2020 Budget Adjustments

Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback on the Calgary 2020 Budget Adjustments.

Vibrant Communities Calgary (VCC) is a City of Calgary Civic Partner that stewards the Council approved Enough for All Poverty Reduction Strategy. VCC would like to take this opportunity to share our recommendations for the budget adjustments with a special focus on the guiding principle of a least harm approach to citizens.

Calgary has led the way with a homelessness strategy and Enough for All, its poverty reduction strategy. These strategies have not only actively reduced poverty and homelessness in our city but aligned several organizations to work together on a scale not seen in most Canadian cities. These successes tell a story that Calgary will not ignore poverty and will actively work to reduce it.

VCC recommends that Council consider its prior commitments to poverty reduction, and to recognize how each scenario could negatively impact current levels of service that those with lower incomes depend on such as Transit, Fair Entry, and the Community Social Work program. Regarding the low-income transit pass, research commissioned by Enough for All stakeholder the Justice Sector Constellation in 2017-18 has shown that by far the most frequently reported bylaw offences were transit fines¹, and a majority of those who received them were low income. We are concerned that increasing the cost of the band A low income transit pass could result in several negative impacts including an increase in transit fines, followed by a higher incidence of nonpayment fines, followed by an inability to pay rent, missing work, and unnecessary stress.


Thank you again for the opportunity to provide a submission for this budget re-adjustment. We look forward to continuing to make progress and share responsibility on poverty reduction in our city.

- #82: establish monument / #83: create collaborative art that contributes to reconciliation

"Creative products, produced by creative industries, directly supported the employment of just under 24,000 people in Calgary in 2016, earning \$1.6 billion in labour income and directly contributed over \$2.1 billion in local GDP in the same year."

About 7.3 million volunteer hours by 49,500 people were generated for arts and cultural organizations in 2017. Equivalent to 3,670 full-time jobs and an economic value of \$204 million. Average labour productivity of the arts sector is considered high, at just over \$90,000 of GDP per job.

Tourists that are attracted by creative industries spent about \$71 million on arts and culture goods and services in 2016.

Creative Industries are seen as emerging & growth clusters for Calgary's economy going forward. Including things such as Film & Television, Interactive Digital Media, There are currently 4,424 creative industries businesses in Calgary, there are 24,000 people employed in the creative industries sector in Calgary, and there are 3,200 creative and film industries post-secondary graduates annually.

In 2016:

- Calgary's GDP impact from creative industries = \$2.1B (2016). \$3.8B when including indirect impact (e.g. supply chain linkages) and through the "re-spending of wages by workers in both the creative and supply chain industries".

Research conducted within our project proves that community-engaged arts programs promote the health, well-being and social inclusion of older adults (page 2).

At a time when the number of seniors is growing rapidly, and when isolation and marginalization amongst the elderly is increasing, this model of seniors' arts programming is of particular social, cultural and economic value (page 2).

The Arts & Health Project established a partnership with the University of British Columbia Schools of Nursing, Audiology and Speech Sciences to assess the health and well-being impacts on seniors participating in the project during its first 3 years. The data collected shows that a significant number of participants experienced improvement in their health, a reduction in their experience of chronic pain, and an increased sense of community (page 5).

• Increased social connections and belonging were recurring themes in focus group discussions and within quantitative measurements.

Of the total Calgarians surveyed, 80% of respondents say support for arts and culture are important to them and 85% of them are satisfied with the City's investment in this area with 24% wanting more investment vs 52% believe that the current level of investment is appropriate. (page 19)

Calgary Economic Development

Calgary Economic Development is a signatory to the Living a Creative Life strategy and Calgary Arts Development is a lead stakeholder and key contributor on the new Calgary Economic Development strategy. We are very aligned and supportive of CED's strategic priorities and the arts organizations and artists we invest in contribute greatly to their strategy.

Arts organizations and artists create vibrancy in the downtown core and in neighbourhoods across the city, helping make Calgary one of the most livable cities in the world. Centre city is a major focus of the CED strategy and Calgary Arts Development is an active participant in conversations around centre city, including engagement sessions about the Rivers and Entertainment District hosted by Calgary Municipal Land Corporation (CMLC). On an ongoing basis 40% of the activity generated by organizations we invest in take place in centre city.

Having a vibrant arts and culture scene helps make Calgary a magnet for talent—people want to live in a city that is vibrant and exciting, with lots of things to do. Being a centre for arts, culture and recreation contributes a strong sense of place, making Calgary an attractive place to live, work, play, and visit.

The arts promote well-being and belonging—important elements of shared prosperity. Fostering resilience and sustainability within the arts sector helps ensure arts organizations are able to provide access, affordability, and engagement through ticket discounts, free events, education and outreach programs.

In the new economy, creative industries have the potential to grow and help diversify the economy. A thriving arts scene contributes to the creation and development of content and talent—critical components of the creative industries.

As stated in the <u>Economic Impact of the Arts</u> study conducted by KPMG in 2018, the arts organizations that receive funding from Calgary Arts Development contributed \$134M in value added GDP activity for Canada in 2017, with the large majority (\$107M) occurring in Alberta; created 1,550 full-time equivalent jobs; and generated \$16.6M in revenues that contributed to the federal, provincial, and municipal governments.

Calgary Foundation

Calgary Foundation is a signatory to the *Living a Creative Life* strategy and they include "everyone lives a creative life" as one of the measurable dimensions of their annual Vital Signs report. In the 2018 report, 82% of respondents agreed that "the arts enrich local communities," but only 40% rated the "affordability of arts programs and events" as good or excellent.

We are raising three children in Inglewood. We continue to live through the densification of the neighbourhood and cannot believe with the aggressive development plans and no alternative recreation facilities our beloved pool is going to be closed. At this time more than ever we need to ensure our children have a place to be kids away from screens, with walkability and to encourage physical and mental health benefits. Pools are and should be a valued resource that bring communities together. I agree it has been difficult to use the pool at times of late due to the inconsistent schedule, and the lack of programming - however through all of that we continue to support the pool through weekly lessons (which reach beyond the Inglewood community) as well as the after school program. To highlight the impact this decision is having on our children our 9 year old has routinely asked how the city can choose to cut their pool, the heavily used mobile skatepark - "where will we go?" "what are we suppose to do?" "will they cut our parks next?" are questions she is asking. People with Down Syndrome do require more attention and less distractions to keep on task and focused on swimming.

The Inglewood Aquatic Center is a good venue/facility for the Calgary Dolphin Swim Club as it is a single use facility in a central area with good access as the membership is comprised of swimmers from all over Calgary, Cochrane and Ardrie. 




City of Calgary Expected Revenue and Expenditure (2022) Funding the City's Operating Budget






PTP and the Bow Wave - A visual Guide



Chamber position on Non-Residential Property Taxes

CALGARY – The Calgary Chamber is, once again, calling on City Council to restructure property taxes in the next municipal budget. The Chamber released a property tax proposal aimed at relieving the tax burden on businesses that would see a significant shift in property tax allocation, which they are urging City Council adopt as part of their budget deliberations.

"The property tax issue in Calgary needs to be fixed now to avoid significant business disruption and closure," Chamber CEO Sandip Lalli warned. "The Chamber has been advocating for a property tax shift for over a year and it's time for Council to act."

Property taxes on businesses in Calgary have seen the largest hikes among major cities in Canada for the last four years. The tax increases are a result of a substantial reduction in assessed value in the downtown core due to high vacancy rates. These vacancies have shifted the tax burden to businesses in other parts of the city, leading to tax rates that have become unsustainable.

Council has ignored the non-residential property tax issue by creating band-aid solutions that have cost over one hundred and fifty million dollars but have not solved the problem. Taxes have continued to increase and, with no money left to create temporary solutions going forward, non-residential property taxes will skyrocket by 2020. The Calgary business community will not survive under the current non-residential tax system.

Calgary currently has the highest tax ratio of non-residential to residential property tax (4.2-1) in Canada. This means that Calgary businesses pay a significantly higher portion of municipal tax compared to residential properties in the City. Lowering the non-residential to residential property tax ratio will increase Calgary's competitiveness, encourage new business to develop here and will allow existing businesses to flourish.

The proposal that the Chamber will be submitting to Council recommends a redistribution of property taxes in the city and move the non-residential to residential property tax ratio to 3.1:1 by 2021 with a tax split of 52 per cent residential to 48 per cent non-residential. The current tax split is 49 per cent residential to 51 per cent non-residential.

The proposed shift better represents the use of services provided by municipal tax dollars. Under this proposal, the typical family home (valued at\$455,000) would see a property tax increase of \$136 annually or an additional \$11/month. This ratio shift was one of the options in



the final report of the Tax Shift Assessment Working Group, which was given to the City's Priorities and Finance Committee in early October 2019.

This ratio inversion coupled with a oper cent spending increase, will be a massive step toward relieving the burden on businesses and creating a business environment that can support the businesses Calgarians love and rely on.

Along with reducing the ratio from its current state, the Chamber recommends the City practice fiscal restraint and continue to find operational efficiencies. As well, the Chamber recommends that they also sell non-revenue generating city owned land.



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

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
