Dear stakeholder,

I hope this message finds you well and healthy. Thank you for your interest and participation in the Heritage Conservation Tools and Incentives Review. Using your feedback, consultant research and technical analysis, we have created recommendations for policy and financial tools to support heritage conservation in Calgary in the coming years. We will be presenting our recommendations to the SPC on Planning and Urban Development on April 1, 2020.

The policy tools we are recommending are the following heritage area tools:

- Incentive Areas broadly incentivizes conservation of heritage assets in Calgary. May offer additional development potential or incentives to developments or projects that retain a heritage asset on site. Not intended to restrict or inhibit development.
- Discretionary Guideline Area incentivizes conservation of heritage assets in areas with moderate to high historical integrity. All uses in this area are discretionary and locally-specific heritage design guidelines are developed and applied.
- Direct Control Heritage Area Incentivizes conservation of heritage assets in areas with the highest historical integrity/significance. Establishes specific and thorough architectural controls and limits redevelopment potential.

The heritage area tools can be stacked or build upon each other. This results in increased specificity and control as the concentration and integrity of heritage areas increase. The financial tools we are recommending are a residential tax-back grant and a non-residential tax credit to be considered with the 2023-2026 Municipal Budget deliberations. Additionally, Council

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may consider increasing the city-wide grant program to \$2 million annually until 2023, commensurate with the City of Edmonton's program.
