



Expectations

COVID-19 is a dynamic and volatile international event. The situation is changing on a daily basis.

Alberta Health Services is the lead agency for public health response. As a City, we are responsible for our workforce, essential services, and supporting our stakeholders.

Our number one priority is the safety and wellbeing of Calgarians and our City staff.



COVID-19 Update:

- Current Status:
 - 8 Cases in Calgary since March 5th,
 14 total in the province.
 - All cases travel related
 - Risk to Albertans remains low (AHS).



Key Message for City Leadership

The safety and wellbeing of our Staff is our top priority.

- It is critical that we act responsibly, proactively, and collaboratively in a measured way.
- The City has an Infectious Disease Management Plan. We make decisions based upon that plan.
- We do not expect this to disappear. We are in this for the long-term.
- We are focused on mitigating the risk to the City and preparedness for our staff.



Prioritizing our Efforts

Provincial Role: Alberta Health

Alberta Health (AH)

- a) Lead and co-ordinate the provincial pandemic health planning, response, and recovery.
- b) Exercise legislative authority to protect the health of Albertans, including the declaration of a provincial public health emergency if required.
- c) Assess and communicate pandemic influenza severity and impact in Alberta.

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Provincial Role: Alberta Health Services

Alberta Health (AHS)

- a) Provide continuity of health services to Albertans;
- b) Review and implement pandemic operational health service response and recover plans;
- Prioritize delivery of critical health services and programs during a pandemic;
- d) Collaborate with Alberta Health on matters related to policy, resource acquisition and cross-government, and in the delivery of influenza-related public and education programs.



Local: The City of Calgary

Under the Municipal Government Act (MGA), the role of the local authorities is to ensure a safe and viable community through the <u>continuity</u> of local government and critical services and emergency response.

Other responsibilities of local authorities include:

- a) Reviewing and implementing response plans (Municipal Emergency Plans) and business continuity programs;
- b) Maintaining the continuity of critical municipal services;
- Liaising with AEMA, AHS and other stakeholders to align with broader provincial response and recovery.



Infectious Disease Management: Response

Response (MEP activated)

Business Continuity Taskforce

Implements HR policies
Implements health and safety policies
Confirms essential services
Additional emergency procurement
Service reduction decisions



Trigger: Novel virus impacting corporate workforce

Elevated Watch (current phase)

Infectious Disease Management Team

Coordinates corporate communications
Develops potential HR policies
Develops potential health and safety policies
Advises on essential services
Monitors situation



Trigger: Novel virus of concern detected globally

Normal Business

Infectious Disease Supply Group

Determine ID PPE requirements for corporation Procure and manage ID PPE stockpile

Business Continuity Coordinators

Lay groundwork for successful continuity planning Catalogue essential services



Mitigation and Prevention

- Staff feeling sick should not come in to work.
- Engage in proactive hygiene practices:
 - Wash your hands frequently with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
 - Avoid touching your face until you have washed your hands.
 - Cover your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze.
 - If you don't have a tissue, sneeze or cough in your sleeve.
- Practice social distancing when possible.
- Keep workspaces, vehicles, and personal items clean and disinfect regularly.
- Restrict entry of non-essential personnel to critical areas.

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
Expectations of The City of Calgary
