




One project: Tomorrow's Chinatown

The project budget was approved based on a multi year model through the following funding sources:


- Council Innovation Fund: \$250,000
- Planning & Development Reserve: \$150,000
- 2019-20 Planning & Development Base budget: \$100,000

- Minor refinements to specific budget items have taken place
- No changes are proposed to the overall consulting budget in the amount of \$500,000.
- Council Innovation Funding has enabled community stakeholders to be part of a creative process of sharing ideas and relationship-building



Factors that have shaped project timelines:

- Approval of the "finalized" project scope in Fall 2019
- Formalizing a governance structure to ensure transparency and responsible decision-making.
- A one-of-a-kind RFP to hire the Cultural Plan consultant by involving community stakeholders in the decision-making
- COVID-19 pandemic- community and City impacts

Launching a "lunch series" to initiate cultural conversations with topics targeting the youth, seniors and community advocates.








- Green Line Integration and Transit-Oriented Development
