On November 18, 2019 (CPS2019-0965) Council Directed administration to:

- Undertake a full cost analysis for the potential reintroduction of fluoride into the water system including ongoing projected operational cost,
- Provide clarity on The City's authority and jurisdiction with regard to fluoridation,
- Report on the potential impact to Utility Rates if fluoridation is reintroduced to the water treatment process.



Cost of Fluoride Reintroduction is influenced by

- Fluoride Selection and Dosing Requirements
- Regulations
- Capital and other Operational Costs





Fluoride Selection and Dosing Requirements

Alberta Environment and Parks standard and guidelines:

 Required to be certified for drinking water by the National Sanitation Foundation

Recommendation if Fluoridation is reintroduced:

The same fluoride additive that Calgary used historically

Health Canada's *Guidelines for Canadian Drinking Water Quality*

- Recommended dose is still 0.7 mg/L
- Maximum allowable concentration is still 1.5 mg/L





- Municipal Government Act
 - The introduction of fluoride no longer requires a plebiscite or authorization through a bylaw.
- Alberta Environment Parks
 - Would require an amendment of our operating approval to reflect water fluoridation.





Cost Estimates to Reintroduce Fluoridation

- Estimated Cost to reintroduce fluoridation:
 - Capital Costs \$10.1 M (-30% / + 50% estimate)
 - Annual Operating and Maintenance costs approximately \$1.0 M
- Current operating and capital budgets do not include the costs associated with drinking water fluoridation. Should Council direct this work in the future, a budget request will be prepared.
- The investment and expenditure due to the reintroduction of fluoride would not require an increase to Water Rates.
