Background

A Coal Development Policy for Alberta was issued in 1976 known as the "Coal Policy".

- On June 1, 2020, the Government of Alberta (GoA) rescinded the policy
- Public pressure put on the government from multiple groups including ranchers, environmental, First Nations, municipalities, and general public
- On February 8, 2021, the GoA reinstated the 1976 Coal Policy with a commitment that the government will consult with the public before making any changes to 'modernize' its coal policy



The policy in its entirety has been reinstated, including all restrictions in the coal categories identified in the 1976 policy

GoA has also issued 2 directives to Alberta Energy Regulator (AER):

- No mountain top removal will be permitted and full reinstatement of the 1976 policy including the category lands, and
- Indefinite pause on new leases and applications pending consultation on new policy

Category 2 lands are most impacted by the reinstatement.

The province will not cancel approvals already granted by AER before the reinstatement of the policy



MINING THE EASTERN SLOPES

Map shows the land classifications established in a 1976 coal-mining policy recently cancelled by the provincial government. Under the old policy, exploration in the blue zone was restricted and surface mining would 'not normally be considered."

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- Six coal exploration programs already approved and underway can still go ahead.
 - Four out of the six coal exploration permits were issued under the 1976 Coal Policy and two were issued after the May rescindment of the policy
 - The two exploration permits that were granted after the rescindment of the policy are both located in SW Alberta in the Crowsnest Pass area.
- There are at least two coal mining projects which are in the regulatory process including Grassy Mountain and Tent Mountain.
 - It would appear that these projects will not be impacted by the reinstatement of the policy, because they are proposed on Category 4 lands.



GoA has committed to a vigorous and lengthy consultation to hear from the public on modernizing the coal policy
