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### Background & Methodology

### **Background**

The City of Calgary surveys citizens about their opinions, preferences, and attitudes in order to help support data-driven City decision-making. The Citizen Perspectives Survey is one of the ways by which data are collected, and this survey is conducted multiple times throughout the year. Since April 2020, The City has used the Citizen Perspectives Survey to better understand Calgarians' opinions, beliefs, and concerns about the COVID-19 pandemic. This report presents the results of The City's twelfth COVID-19 Snapshot survey.

### Methodology

The survey was conducted by Leger from October 6 - 17, 2021 with 500 Calgarians (aged 18 years or older) via phone using random digit dialing (RDD). The survey was conducted using numbers from both landlines (17% of completed surveys) and cell phones (83%) to obtain a random and statistically representative sample of Calgarians. The survey averaged 15 minutes in duration. The margin of error (MOE) for the total sample of n=500 is  $\pm$  4.4 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

To ensure the data were gathered from a representative group of Calgarians, sample quotas were set by age, gender, and city quadrant of the general population aged 18 and older. Data were then weighted to the 2016 Civic Census for age and gender.

Where applicable, results from the previous ten Snapshots are shown for comparison purposes. Where a difference from the previous Snapshot is statistically significant, it is noted with an arrow:  $\checkmark$  or  $\land$

# **Key Findings**





### **Key Findings**

Support for the new Pandemic Face Covering Bylaw and the Vaccine Passport Bylaw is strong and the majority of Calgarians agree that mandatory face coverings in public indoor spaces make them more willing to be in public.

- The majority (82%) of Calgarians support (67% 'strongly' and 15% 'somewhat') the Pandemic Face Covering Bylaw that came into effect on September 4, 2021.
- Three-quarters (75%) support (62% 'strongly' and 13% 'somewhat') the Vaccine Passport Bylaw implemented by The City on September 23, 2021. Seniors (65 or older) are much more likely than younger Calgarians to support the bylaw (92% vs. 66% 18 to 34 and 76% 35 to 64).
- Among those who oppose the Vaccine Passport Bylaw, two-in-five (39%) support the Pandemic Face Covering Bylaw, suggesting that some who are opposed to the Vaccine Passport Bylaw see value in other measures to reduce the spread of COVID-19.
- Three-quarters (74%) of Calgarians agree (56% 'strongly' and 18% 'somewhat') that mandatory face coverings in public indoor spaces makes them more willing or confident to go shopping, visit restaurants, ride transit and do other activities in public. Females are more likely than males to agree with this (80% vs. 68%, respectively) and seniors are more likely than younger Calgarians to agree (89% 65 or older vs. 71% 18 to 34 and 71% 35 to 64).



### Key Findings – cont'd

# Satisfaction with The City's COVID-19 response and perceptions that it has been quick enough and helpful dropped in October.

Satisfaction with The City's COVID-19 response dropped to 68%, down from 78% in July. Agreement that The
City's response has been quick enough and helpful also slipped since July: from 75% to 63% and from 80% to
72%, respectively. There's a distinct pattern of slips in satisfaction and perceptions of the speed and helpfulness of
The City's response, with these measures dropping during the second, third and fourth waves of the pandemic.
These measures increased between the third and fourth waves before declining in the fourth wave.

### Key Findings – cont'd


Compared to this past summer, more Calgarians would be comfortable attending an outdoor or indoor event with a large crowd in attendance.

- Four-in-five Calgarians (59%) are or would be comfortable attending an outdoor event with a large crowd over the next couple of months, up from half (50%) in July.
- Nearly one-half (45%) are or would be comfortable attending an indoor event with a large crowd over the next couple of months, up from 36% in July.
- Comfort with attending an indoor event such as in-person public engagement or a research focus group for The City is stable at 56%.
- Calgarians aged 18 to 34 years are more likely than older Calgarians, particularly seniors (65 or older), to be comfortable attending any of these types of events.


Opinions about The City's COVID-19 Response and Information



### Awareness of The City's COVID-19 Response

Consistent with previous Snapshot surveys, the majority (88%) of Calgarians are aware of The City's current efforts to limit the spread of COVID-19. Seniors (65 or older) are more likely than younger Calgarians to agree (95% vs. 86% 18 to 34 and 87% 35 to 64).

#### I'm Aware of the Current Efforts by The City to Limit the Spread of COVID-19





#### I Have Enough Information about what The City is Doing to Respond to COVID-19





#### The Information Provided by The City has been Clear




Thinking about The City's COVID-19 response, do you strongly agree, somewhat agree, somewhat disagree, or strongly disagree with each of the following statements.



# Speed of The City's COVID-19 Response

Around three-in-five Calgarians (63%) agree The City's response has been quick enough, down from 75% in July but on par with results during the third wave of the pandemic in May. Perceptions that The City's response has been quick enough is down from a high of 85% in June 2020. Seniors (65 or older) are more likely than younger Calgarians to agree with this statement (75% vs. 54% 18 to 34 and 64% 35 to 64).

#### The City's Response has been Quick Enough




Thinking about The City's COVID-19 response, do you strongly agree, somewhat agree, somewhat disagree, or strongly disagree with each of the following statements.



# Helpfulness of The City's COVID-19 Response

Nearly three-quarters (72%) of Calgarians agree The City's response has been helpful, down from 80% in July but on par with results during the third wave of the pandemic in May. Perceptions that The City's response has been helpful is down from a high of 90% at the beginning of the pandemic. Seniors (65 or older) are more likely than others to agree with this statement (85% vs. 68% 18 to 34 and 70% 35 to 64).

#### The City's Response has been Helpful





#### I Understand what I'm Supposed to do to Limit the Spread of COVID-19





# Satisfaction with The City's COVID-19 Response

Around two-thirds (68%) of Calgarians are satisfied with The City's COVID-19 response, down from 78% in July but on par with results during the third wave of the pandemic in May. Satisfaction is 18 percentage points lower than the high of 86% in the fall of 2020. Seniors (65 or older) are more likely than other Calgarians to be satisfied with The City's pandemic response (84% vs. 61% 18 to 34 and 68% 35 to 64).

Overall, how satisfied are you with The City's COVID-19 response?



# Trust in The City's COVID-19 Response

Trust in the City's pandemic response remains stable since January, at 56%, but is down 13 percentage points since the beginning of the pandemic. Seniors (65 or older) are more likely than younger Calgarians to trust The City (68% vs. 53% 18 to 34 and 53% 35 to 64).

#### **Trust in The City Regarding COVID-19 Response**




Taking into account all the things you think are important about the COVID-19 response, how much do you trust or distrust The City of Calgary? Base: All respondents (n=500)



### City Services During the Pandemic

Seven-in-ten Calgarians (69%) agree they trust The City to make the right choices to re-open its services, down from 77% in July. Seniors (65 or older) are more likely than younger Calgarians to agree with this (79% vs. 66% 18 to 34 and 68% 35 to 64).

# City Services During the Pandemic

Three-quarters (73%) of Calgarians agree they trust The City to make the right decisions about providing its services safely during the pandemic, down from a high of 83% in July. Seniors (65 or older) are more likely than other Calgarians to agree with this (87% vs. 70% 18 to 34 and 71% 35 to 64), as are residents of the NE compared to those of the SW and NW (82% vs. 70% and 70%, respectively).






Concern about COVID-19 and the Pandemic



### Perceived Threat Level of COVID-19

The majority (80%) of Calgarians still think the pandemic is a major threat to Calgary's economy, up from 72% in July but down from a high of 92% at the beginning of the pandemic.




In your opinion, how much of a threat is the COVID-19 outbreak for . . .?

The pandemic continues to be perceived as a minor threat to one's personal financial situation by two-in-five Calgarians (41%). Those aged 18 to 34 and 35 to 64 more likely than seniors (65 or older) to hold this perception (31% and 30% vs. 17%, respectively). Calgarians with relatively lower household incomes are also more likely than others to say the pandemic is a major threat to their financial situation (46% < \$45,000 and 42% \$45,000 to < \$75,000 vs. 17% \$105,000 or more).




In your opinion, how much of a threat is the COVID-19 outbreak for . . .?

Around one-quarter (27%) of Calgarians say the pandemic is a major threat to their physical health, on par with previous Snapshot surveys, while half (52%) think it's a minor threat and a fifth (20%) don't see it as a threat to their physical health. Males are twice as likely as females to say the pandemic is no threat to their physical health (27% vs. 14%, respectively).




In your opinion, how much of a threat is the COVID-19 outbreak for . . .?

Nearly two-in-five Calgarians (36%) perceive the pandemic to be a major threat to their mental health and slightly less than half (46%) think it's a minor threat. Seniors (65 or older) are twice as likely as younger Calgarians to say the pandemic doesn't pose a threat to their mental health (29% vs. 12% 18 to 34 and 15% 35 to 64).




In your opinion, how much of a threat is the COVID-19 outbreak for . . .?

Three-in-five Calgarians (62%) perceive the pandemic to be a major threat to the health of Calgary's population overall, up from 52% in July. Three-in-ten (29%) think it's a minor threat, down from 38% in July. Females are more likely than males to think the pandemic is a major threat to the overall health of Calgary's population (70% vs. 53%, respectively).




In your opinion, how much of a threat is the COVID-19 outbreak for . . .?

Calgarians are split between thinking the pandemic is a major threat and a minor threat to day-to-day life in their community (40% vs. 46%, respectively). Those aged 35 years or older are more likely to say the pandemic is no threat to day-to-day life in their community (14% 35 to 64 and 17% 65 or older vs. 7% 18 to 34).



### Concern about Becoming III - cont'd

Two-in-five Calgarians (62%) are concerned about a household member becoming ill from COVID-19. Males are more likely than females to be unconcerned about this (37% vs. 26%, respectively).

### Concern about Becoming III - cont'd

Three-quarters (75%) of Calgarians are concerned about a family or friend outside of their household becoming ill from COVID-19, consistent with results from July but down 10 percentage points since the beginning of the pandemic. Residents of the SW are more likely than those of the SE and NW to be concerned about this (84% vs. 68% and 68%, respectively). Males are more likely than females to be unconcerned about this (28% vs. 18%, respectively).



### Have or Know Someone who has/had COVID-19


Seven-in-ten Calgarians (69%) have had, or know someone who has been confirmed to have, COVID-19. Calgarians aged 18 to 64 are much more likely than seniors to answer 'yes' (73% 18 to 34 and 73% 35 to 64 vs. 47% 65 or older).

### Changes in Physical Health

Around three-in-ten Calgarians (28%) say their physical health has worsened as a result of the pandemic, although this is down from 40% at the beginning of 2021.



### Changes in Mental Health

One-half (49%) of Calgarians say their mental health has worsened as a result of the pandemic. Females are more likely than males to report that the pandemic has worsened their mental health (58% vs. 40%, respectively), as are those aged 35 to 64 years compared to older Calgarians (53% vs. 37% 65 or older).

### Changes in Financial Situation

One-third (34%) of Calgarians say their personal financial situation has worsened as a result of the pandemic, down from 44% in May 2020. Younger Calgarians are more likely than seniors to say their personal financial situation has worsened (37% 18 to 34 and 35% 35 to 64 vs. 20% 65 or older). Those in lower income households are more likely than those in higher income households to say the pandemic has worsened their personal financial situation (48% < \$45,000 and 52% \$45,000 to < \$75,000 vs. 18% \$135,000 or more).




### Financial Impacts of the Pandemic

The pandemic has had a negative impact on capacity to pay bills on time for two-in-five Calgarians (39%), up from 31% in July and the highest to date. Those between the ages of 18 and 64 are more likely than seniors to be experiencing this (53% 18 to 34 and 36% 35 to 64 vs. 19% 65 or older). Those with lower household incomes are also more likely to say the pandemic is negatively impacting their capacity to pay bills on time (60% < \$45,000 and 56% \$45,000 to < \$75,000 vs. 35% \$75,000 to < \$105,000, 28% \$105,000 to < \$135,000, and 25% \$135,000 or more).




### Financial Impacts of the Pandemic – cont'd

Around two-in-five Calgarians (38%) say the pandemic is having a negative impact on their ability to pay their mortgage or rent. This is up 18 percentage points since the beginning of 2021. Those between the ages of 18 and 34 are more likely than older Calgarians to be experiencing this (55% 18 to 34 vs. 32% 35 to 64 and 24% 65 or older), as are residents of the NE compared to those of the SW and SE (53% vs. 33% and 25%, respectively). Those with lower household incomes are also more likely to say the pandemic is negatively impacting their capacity to pay their mortgage or rent (70% < \$45,000 vs. 48% \$45,000 to < \$75,000, 42% \$75,000 to < \$105,000%, 25% \$105,000 to < \$135,000 and 19% \$135,000 or more).




### Financial Impacts of the Pandemic – cont'd

Three-in-ten Calgarians (30%) say the pandemic is having a negative impact on their ability to pay their property taxes. This is up 16 percentage points since the beginning of 2021. Younger Calgarians (18 to 34) are more likely than seniors (65 or older) to be experiencing a negative impact of the pandemic on their capacity to pay property taxes (42% vs. 20%, respectively). Residents of the NW and NE are more likely to be experiencing this (37% NW and 53% NE vs. 19% SW and 15% SE). Those with lower household incomes are also more likely to say the pandemic is negatively impacting their capacity to pay their property taxes (57% < \$45,000 and 46% \$45,000 to < \$75,000 vs. 16% \$105,000 to < \$135,000 and 17% \$135,000 or more).




# Stress Level When in Public During Pandemic

During this pandemic, when you have to leave your house and be out in public, to what extent do you find it stressful? Base: All respondents (n=500)







# Support for the Pandemic Face Covering Bylaw

The majority (82%) of Calgarians support the Pandemic Face Covering Bylaw that came into effect on September 4, 2021. Females are more likely than males to support the bylaw (87% vs. 77%, respectively). Seniors (65 or older) are more likely than younger Calgarians to support the new bylaw (90% vs. 78% 18 to 34 and 82% 35 to 64).





# Comfort with Attending Outdoor Events with Large Crowds in the Next Couple of Months

Three-in-five Calgarians (59%) say that over the next couple of months, they are or would be comfortable attending an outdoor event with a large crowd in attendance, up from 50% who said they'd be comfortable doing so over the past summer. Those aged 18 to 34 years are more likely than older Calgarians to be comfortable with this (72% vs. 56% 35 to 64 and 43% 65 or older). Residents of the NE are less likely than those of the SE and NW to be comfortable attending an outside event with a large crowd (44% vs. 64% and 67%, respectively).

October 6 - 17, 2021: Over the next couple of months, how comfortable are you or would you be attending an <u>outside</u> event that has a large crowd in attendance?



Nearly one-half (45%) of Calgarians say that over the next couple of months, they are or would be comfortable attending an indoor event with a large crowd in attendance, up from 36% who said they'd be comfortable doing so over the past summer. Males are more likely than females to be comfortable with this (54% vs. 36%, respectively). Younger Calgarians are more likely than seniors to be comfortable attending an indoor event with a large crowd (55% 18 to 34 and 44% 35 to 64 vs. 29% 65 or older).

October 6 - 17, 2021: Over the next couple of months, how comfortable are you or would you be attending an <u>inside</u> event that has a large crowd in attendance?





## Prioritizing Public Health vs. Economy

Around two-thirds (63%) of Calgarians think government decision-makers should consider public health and the economy equally when making decisions about actions and restrictions to reduce the spread of COVID-19, while one-quarter (26%) think public health should be the priority. Residents of the SE and the NW are more likely than those of the NE to say the economy should be the priority (14% and 15% vs. 4%, respectively). 








#### **Quadrant of Residence**



### Own and/or Operate a Business in Calgary










### Senior (aged 65+ years) in the Household









### Understand How to Limit COVID-19 Spread
























