The Bowness Historical Society hereby applies to The City of Calgary for secondary road naming of some of the streets in our community. The previous names, as set out in the attached list, were those used from the beginning of Bowness until its amalgamation with The City of Calgary. In this regard, we enclose the following:1.

- 1. About the Bowness Historical Society;
- 2. A list of roadways, in order of preference, for which we wish to apply for dual naming;
- 3. Letters from our former Councilor, Ward Sutherland, our current Councilor, Sonya Sharp, the Bowness Community Association and Mainstreet Bowness BIA in support of this application;
- 4. A copy of page 9 of the November/December issue of our community newsletter, the Bowest'ner, which is distributed to approximately 6000 households in Bowness. This page contains a notice of our intention to pursue secondary road naming. The notice elicited one email which enthusiastically supported the idea and three telephone calls, two of which were supportive and the third in which the caller wanted to have Bowness Road re-named.:
- 5. Two Maps of Bowness, one showing streets we wish to have secondary naming marked in pink, and the second indicating the suggested intersections for installation of the signs;

With respect to the design of the proposed street signs, we would like the white on blue as used in Inglewood and Beltline-Mission but prefer the design of the sign which reads "Centre Street Salutes the Volunteer Way", also in Beltline-Mission. We envision our logo (seen at the top of this letter) in the rounded piece at the top centre of the sign.

As our current budget will not cover all the signs, we would ask that the requested names be approved and we be allowed to order signs as funds become available. We are able to pay for the installation of some signs now and believe that donations and grants will allow us to proceed with further signs in the future.

Please advise as to how we might provide you with the necessary fee of \$1,488.50.

About the Bowness Historical Society

The Bowness Historical Society was incorporated in 2001 by a group of predominantly Bowness residents with a plan to celebrate and keep alive the history of our community. This has been carried out in part by the following:

The publication of two history books, one in 2005 and the second in 2012, which chronicle our history from the 1880's to the present.

The compilation and sale of calendars featuring photographs from the past.

Interpretive signs installed at Baker Park to present the history and heritage of the Central Alberta Sanatorium.

Park-naming with signage to give our local parks the names of some noteworthy citizens from the past, e.g. John Hextall, George & Annie Wood, Tony Schmaltz and Bonnie Laing.

Marking historic buildings or their original sites with interpretive plaques.

Conducted walking tours of Bowness such as the historic home tour of Hextall houses, Main Street Bowness tour and the Bowness Park tour. These tours have been well attended and received very positive comments.

Have had a presence at many community events over the years engaging residents, a number of whom have been new to our community and are very interested in our history.

Re: Secondary naming for roads in Bowness

As councillor for Ward 1, I am pleased to support the Bowness Historical Society's proposal for secondary road names along certain streets in the community of Bowness. This initiative is a simple and meaningful way of connecting Calgarians with the history of the places they visit every day.

Bowness was a town in its own right prior to annexation by Calgary in 1964. Perhaps more than anywhere else in Calgary, it still has the feeling of a small town. This characteristic of Bowness well known to its long time residents, and a feature that continues to attract new people to the community.

The work done by the Bowness Historical Society and other community organizations to date is an important source of this unique feeling. Interpretive signs, preserved historical buildings and books and newsletters on the community's history all put Bowness among the best places in Calgary to see history on display. The addition of historical street signs would be an excellent additional step in this tradition.

The City of Calgary already recognizes historical street names alongside present-day names in several communities across Calgary including the Downtown Commercial Core, Mission, and Victoria Park.
