#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The ENMAX Legacy Parks Program (Program) has been instrumental in the acquisition and development of new regional parks as well as the lifecycle and upgrading of a number of existing regional parks across Calgary since the Program was created by Calgary City Council in 2003. Regional parks serve multiple communities, large catchment areas and tend to be multi-hour destinations for citizens. Unlike community open space, they are not acquired, funded or constructed through the development and subdivision process, subsequently requiring alternate funding sources.

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In 2014 March through report LPC2014-0172, Council approved three additional criteria in order to allow for local open space to be considered for ENMAX Legacy Parks Program funding. This aligns with the direction of the Municipal Development Plan (MDP) and will help to provide all Calgary communities with sufficient nature and vibrant open spaces as opportunity and feasibility permit. This report presents Administration's recommendations for the allocation of the remaining \$63 million of legacy funding.

# ADMINISTRATION RECOMMENDATION(S)

That the ENMAX Legacy Parks Fund Steering Committee recommends that Council:

- 1. Approve proposed projects (Attachment/1);
- 2. Receive for information the Legacy 3 projected cash flow (Attachment 2);
- 3. Receive for information the unfunded projects list (Attachment 3);and
- 4. Direct that the Report and Attachments remain confidential pursuant to Sections 24(1)(a) & (b) and 25(1)(c) of the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (Alberta)* until Council rises and reports on this matter.

## PREVIOUS COUNCIL DIRECTION / POLICY

On 2003 September 22, Council approved, "The Legacy Parks Steering Committee mandate as recommended in Executive Report to Council C2003-67".

At the 2012 November 20 meeting of the Legacy Parks Fund Steering Committee, the LPC2012-0808 Overview of Legacy Program – Legacy Parks Fund Steering Committee Terms of Reference was referred to Administration "to review the Legacy Parks Fund Steering Committee Terms of Reference, with a report back to Council no later than 2013 January".

On 2013 May 27 Council approved the Terms of Reference in LPC2013-0428 Proposed New ENMAX Legacy Parks Program Updates as outlined in corrected Attachment.

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At the 2014 March 10 meeting of Council, LPC2014-0172 was approved as follows: Approve the proposed additional program criteria to include local community open spaces and approve proposed new projects as outlined in revised attachments.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The ENMAX Legacy Parks Program Phase 3 is focused on upgrading existing regional parks, developing new regional parks and improving community parks in under serviced areas of the city. Project selection and timing considered potential efficiencies with other business unit projects and flood recovery, leveraging existing funding sources and the potential to phase the design and construction of regional parks projects over the 2015-2018 Action Plan and budget cycle.

#### INVESTIGATION: ALTERNATIVES AND ANALYSIS

Over the last four years the Culture, Parks and Recreation Infrastructure Investment Plan (CPRIIP) has identified new and existing park needs across Calgary on an unfunded list. Regional park projects are included in CPRIIP but are often a lower priority as they require planning and re-design exercises. Conversely, undertaking a planning and design exercise with citizen engagement without having a committed construction budget can create a multi-year time lag between plan completion and construction. Attachment 1 is a list of projects for consideration that include parks sites of various scales and complexities and with varying timelines in order to better access program funds over the 2015-2018 budget cycle.

In addition, with the 2013 flood damage to parks and the associated restoration requirements several of the projects in Attachment 1 have been identified in order to coordinate work with other business units such as Water Resources.

# Stakeholder Engagement, Research and Communication

New parks as well as the redevelopment of older parks will require both community and public stakeholder engagement and will be identified and initiated as part of the project planning, conceptual and detail design requirements.

## Strategic Alignment

This report aligns with Council's Fiscal Plan for Calgary for 2012-2014:

"Investing in great communities and a vibrant urban fabric."

Further, the report also aligns with the goals and objectives of the following documents:

Social, Environmental, Economic (External)

Social

Acquiring lands in communities that are underserviced in open space and park redevelopment will continue to support great public access to park opportunities and experiences including both active and passive recreation for all Calgarians. New regional sites will address current underserved areas and populations.

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#### Environmental

Additional regional open space provides for more sustainable communities as density increases and assists in maintaining, or in some cases, enhancing biodiversity. Enhanced biodiversity contributes to a healthy urban environment, in addition to providing carbon offset and mitigation of pollution associated with the urban environment.

#### **Economic**

High quality park space favourably impacts the image and economy of Calgary and is associated with indirect benefits including but not limited to increased land values and community desirability.

# **Financial Capacity**

## **Current and Future Operating Budget:**

New regional and new local community park developments will require growth in the Parks operating budget as sites become operational. Costs are mitigated through the use of sustainable design practices (LEED), technology improvements and current horticultural best practices through an asset management framework.

Operating budget requirements associated with current redevelopment of existing sites are already reflected in the upcoming operating budget. Renovating a park may result in lower operating costs for current infrastructure due to efficiencies gained through improvements such as lighting, building management technology, water management and site re-design. Budget adjustments may be required on some projects to address the new amenities and/or significant changes (i.e. fountain features, spray parks, etc) that have been incorporated as a result of the capital investment.

## **Current and Future Capital Budget:**

New park development generates future lifecycle costs associated with that development. Existing park redevelopment will deal with existing lifecycle requirements at the time of redevelopment and renew the life span of the sites selected. This may reduce the future site specific lifecycle costs depending upon the nature of the redevelopment.

#### Risk Assessment

A comprehensive risk analysis is required as part of the due diligence associated with all land acquisitions and capital projects and will be identified with mitigation strategies as part of the project plan.

Risks associated with redevelopment are similar. Risk assessment and mitigation plans are incorporated into the due diligence integral in the Design Development Plan. The risk assessment is project specific.

# **REASON(S) FOR RECOMMENDATION(S):**

Approval of the proposed projects list and the funding allocation for these projects is recommended to allow for the continuation of projects currently underway while also providing new park development and redevelopment opportunities. Approval of the funding allocation over the 2015-2018 Action Plan cycle is recommended so Parks can plan for and construct parks in accordance with the Action Plan.
