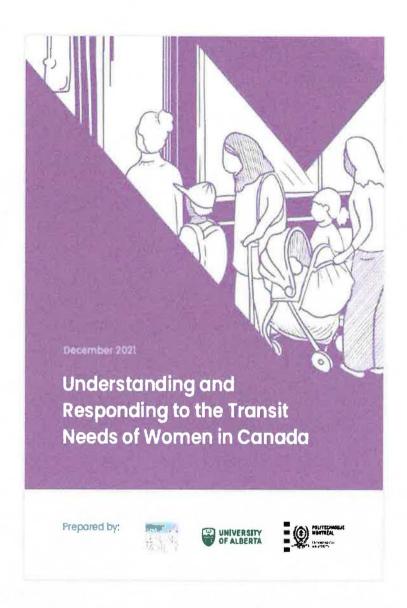

Need for a core network

City's Primary Transit Network (service every 10 mins, 15 hours a day, 7 days a week) is not currently being offered.

A 15 minute off-peak network would be a more realistic and cost effective alternative.

Off peak transit service is heavily relied on transit dependent Calgarians: Women, seniors, youth, students, newcomers, low-wage workers and members of the BIPOC community

Women take more trips in the off peak, more frequent trips, trip chain and take more localized trips

Frequent off peak core networks operate in six other Canadian cities: Vancouver, Edmonton, Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal and Halifax

Existing route structure already connect key destinations city-wide

Could be accommodated within the base budget (operating), no capital required

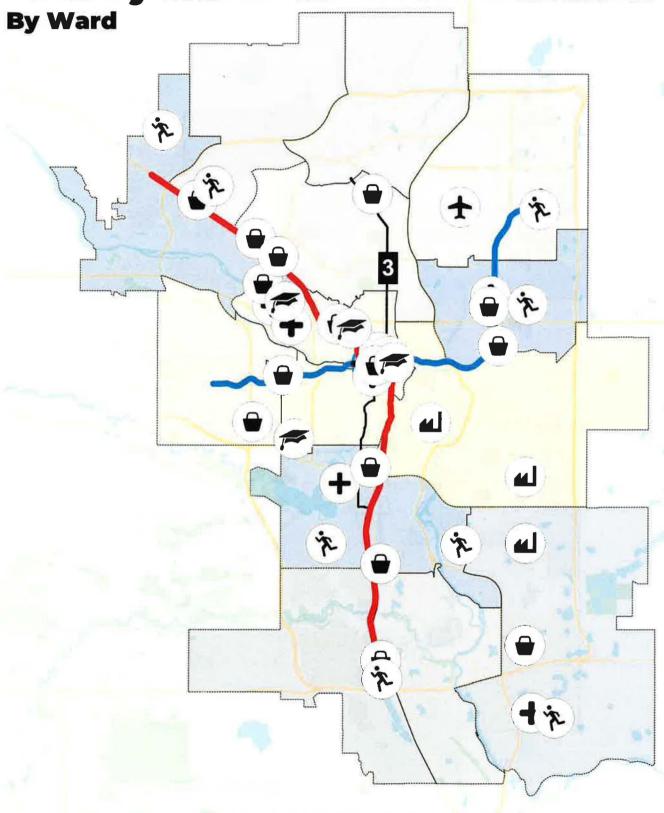

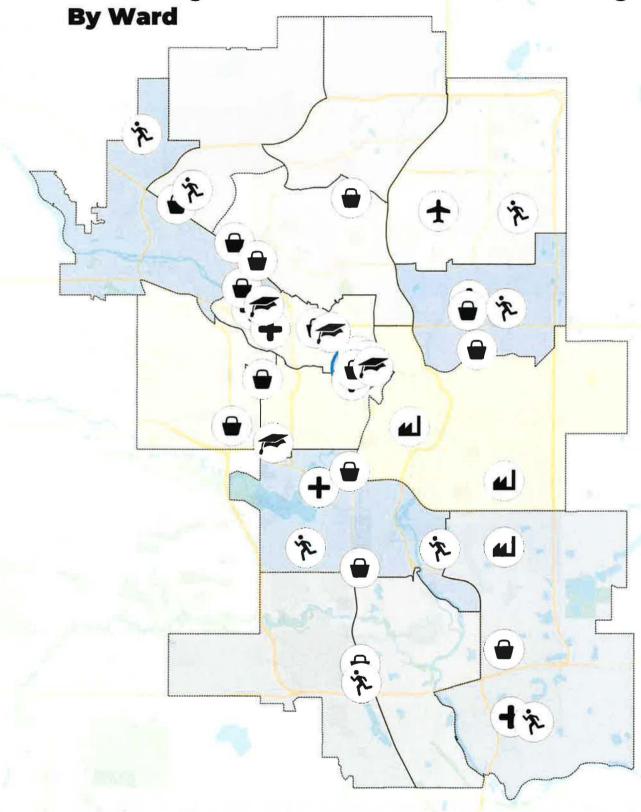

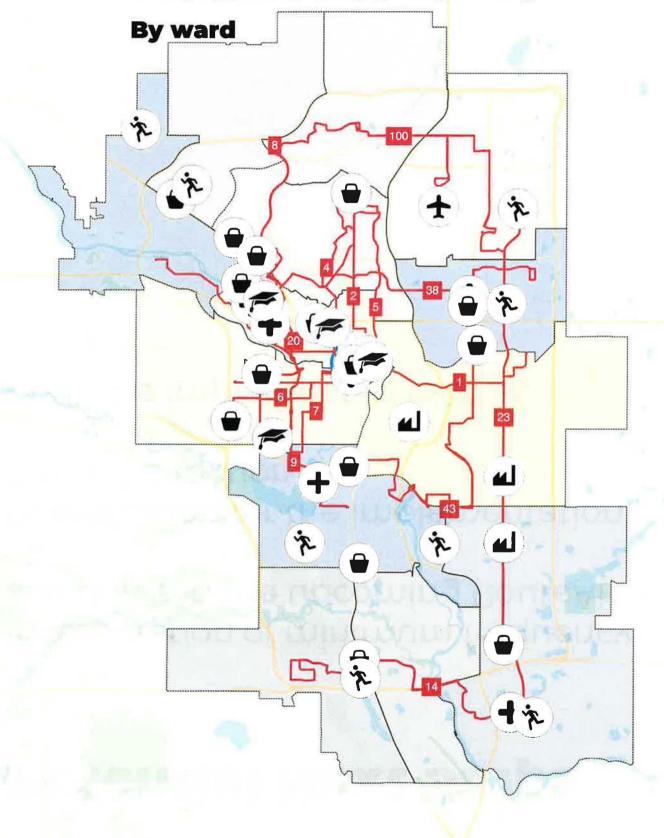
