

Dear Mayor Gondek and Members of Council,

As our region grows and looks towards adding one million more neighbours by 2048, we must accelerate our efforts to build a transportation system that values efficiency, sustainability and people as we move forward in a changing world. Municipal budgets are a reflection of the values of a community and the 2023-26 budget is no exception.

The Calgary Transportation Plan states that we should "Enable public transit, walking and wheeling as the preferred mobility choices for more people" and we at Rail For Alberta feel that regional and intercity rail is a vital component of this goal. We specifically request:

- A funded and actionable regional rail plan, developed in partnership with the Calgary Metropolitan Region Board municipalities and funded by the City and provincial and federal partners to act as the backbone for existing and future transit service in Calgary the Calgary Region.
- 2. The development and implementation of a "first mile/last mile" multimodal transport system structured around the urban rail network that includes bike storage, protected cycling and walking access.
- 3. A continued *increase* in the frequency of rail and bus service throughout the entire day to provide citizens with the flexibility and freedom to make transit their preferred mode of travel.

These requests align with our current transportation and development plans, and they will help ensure the success of these plans.

We can now clearly see the impacts our current reliance on personal vehicles have on the climate, socioeconomic inequities, and public health and safety, and remind you that electric vehicles - while a step forward in reducing tailpipe emissions - do not directly address any of these issues.

It is important that Council take the lead on planning and funding these initiatives in order to build a world-class transportation system for our world-class city. We would be more than happy to discuss in detail how the city can move towards a greener, safer, and more equitable future for everyone.

These comments are specific to Service Budget Plans for Calgary Transit, data I'm using is from the 2022 Adjusted Budget report. If I'm reading the numbers correctly, the proposed operating budget for 2023 is a 2.63% reduction from 2022; this would require \$191,145 (in 000's) to achieve a 43.2% fare/expense ratio. Unfortunately, transit ridership has been publicly reported as 83% pre-pandemic levels {I wish to use 85% for calculation purposes} and not every rider pays full fare so I'm also using 85% pre-pandemic revenues (which was reported as \$188,623 (000's) in 2019). When combined, these percentages result in a \$54,865 (000's) deficit which is passed on to the Taxpayers. I humbly request council to stop the bleeding! How? i humbly submit that Transit Employees are poorly managed. This is mainly due to abuse of work trades between Operators which results in a lack of operators available to the Employer. If this seems unbelievable, please take a look at a wage break down identifying regular/overtime/ double time amounts. Why is the City contributing to the pension of an employee NOT doing the work? A second source of reducing expenses would be to change the distribution of costs shared by the Employer and Employees; re-examine MEBAC! Currently, the City pays about 92% of health Benefits EXCEPT for on labour group that does not participate in MEBAC and with that group the City pays 70% at the most. If MEBAC participants made up that extra 22% that would result in a reduction of expenses of \$22M PER YEAR!

Introduction

The 2023-2026 budget may be the most important financial decision City Council has ever made.

Along with the rest of the world, Calgary is facing issues that threaten the stability of the economic, social, and environmental systems that we depend on. In an interconnected world of limited resources, we need to ensure that every tax dollar provides the best benefit to our residents. The public interest must not be undermined by special interests.

We need to ensure that our social systems do not leave behind those who are vulnerable or disadvantaged. Solutions that correct market failures – the primary role of government – must take precedence.

And facing insidious, sometimes catastrophic damage from a warming climate, we need to adapt the way we use energy and build the human environment to not only protect ourselves but enable more secure, prosperous ways of living.

There are various ways of creating a budget to deal with those threats while, at the same time building a better city, a better future. You, as a Council member, will hear many positive, effective ways in which the budget can and must accomplish that. In particular, we support the initiatives proposed by the Calgary Climate Hub (<u>Funding the Route to Net Zero</u>), the Calgary Alliance for the Common Good (<u>Priorities</u>), and Calgary's Future (<u>A Better Budget</u>).

For us, our views on how to build a better budget began with the issue of suburban sprawl, probably the most serious obstacle to The City's ability to control costs, deliver services, and respond to the climate crisis. As we delved into the deleterious effects of sprawl, we found that the more important issue is the diversion of money, the wealth transfer from the Established Area that has been used to subsidize new subdivisions.

In this submission, we have developed two business cases – one in favour of funding the Established Area, the other against more funding for sprawl. Those business cases are summarized on the next page, followed by the details of the two business cases. We hope you will support and encourage your Council colleagues to support the recommendations we have made.


Stop Sprawl Subsidies! Make City Hall Work for All of Us

For years taxpayers have subsidized sprawl in Calgary. Meanwhile, our established communities have suffered from inadequate funding.

Local shops struggle, neighbourhood schools close, and City services continue to decline. People, especially young families, flee to new subdivisions.

Our communities are being hollowed out. At the same time, according to the City's own estimate, sprawl is making Calgary \$16 billion more expensive to service, a cost of \$32,000 for each household, equivalent to an annual \$500 tax increase for the average home.

City Hall has forgotten to invest in our established communities to make it possible to have:

- Local shops and services instead of driving all over town, scrambling for parking to meet our daily needs
- An end to school closures and the return of schools that were closed
- Timely maintenance that fixes missing and broken sidewalks, unsafe intersections, and gets our roads cleared of snow
- More green spaces, improved recreation facilities, reliable transit service, support for the less fortunate, and decisive climate action that not only saves us money, but improves air quality where we live
- And, when we venture outside our homes, an attractive, family-friendly, safe neighborhood

By the end of November, City Council will approve a new City budget. It will include millions of dollars in sprawl subsidies, the wealth transfer that siphons off our property taxes and leaves The City with more debt for us – the taxpayers – to pay off.

We are telling City Council to end those subsidies and, instead, approve a budget to:

- Remove 80%¹ of the tax and debt support proposed for new subdivisions and reallocate it to the Established Area Investment Fund
- Aggressively lobby the federal and provincial governments to send our tax dollars back to Calgary to support the Established Area
- Right-size The City's revenue stream to support the Established Area
- Develop and make available measures, including incentives and smart regulation, to channel redevelopment interest to Main Streets and Activity Centres.

Calgarians for Sensible Growth The Business Case for Funding the Established Area

In its planning, the City of Calgary divides our city into two distinct areas:

- The Established (Developed) Area which had built out prior to 2006
- The Greenfield (Developing) Area that is still under development or being planned

Each area is planned and funded separately. This year the Planning Department attempted to evaluate development on a city-wide basis. That initial effort did not result in a unified approach to development.

The key issues to consider when funding the Established Area are represented by five numbers:

Key Issue #1

The estimated percentage of Calgarians who live in the Established Area.¹

That is the most important number for City Council to keep in mind when building its budget. If the budget doesn't meet the needs of the 80%, then it has failed.

For the 20% of Calgarians who live in the Greenfield Area, money has already been spent or promised for their communities.² This money comes from off-site levies paid by developers³ and, as currently proposed, taxes, increased debt, or other sources of funds from the Established Area.

Key Issue #2

The 50/50 split of population growth between the Established and Greenfield Areas that is to be achieved by, at the latest, 2079.⁴

Approved population growth in the Greenfield Area is almost at its 50% share of growth (Figure 1).⁵ Even under an optimistic forecast, Established Area population growth will not reach 50% by 2079 nor will it reach the 33% target that is supposed to be met in 2039 (Figure 2).





Key Issue #3 \$16 billion

The capital cost Calgary will save from developing the Established Area, along with \$390 million annually in reduced operating costs by 2076.

Building outside the Established Area is a money loser for those of us in the 80%. Development in the Greenfield Area is dispersed, rather than compact growth. It requires extensive new roads, water and sewer lines, fire stations, and other infrastructure. As well, although development in the Greenfield Area is more compact than previous ways of building subdivisions, it has moved away from the compact city model due to including jobs in the calculation of population density, an emphasis on approving "gentle," that is, lower density, and converting land previously approved for higher density to lower densities, for example, building single-family homes on land designated for multi-family apartments or condominiums.

The City has twice examined, in 2009 and 2019, the cost of dispersed growth in the Greenfield Area vs. more compact growth in the Established Area. Both times, more compact growth was, by far, the most beneficial and prudent way to spend tax dollars.⁶

The \$16 billion cost-savings from compact growth works out to a tax savings of over \$12,000 per person or just under \$32,000 per household. Conversely, dispersed growth like we have already seen means the same amount in higher taxes - equivalent to an annual \$500 tax increase for the average home.

Key Issue #4

Two priority areas

Activity Centres and Main Streets, the two areas in the city where population growth should happen.

The Municipal Development Plan makes this clear, telling planners to "direct land use change within a framework of Activity Centres and Main Streets." The haphazard, piecemeal development that planners have supported outside Activity Centres and Main Streets has been contrary to this direction as well as unnecessarily antagonizing the communities planning is supposed to serve.

Calgary's population in 2021 was 1,306,780 with 502,301 occupied households (2021 Calgary profile). Over the full life cycle, the cost of public funding for new subdivisions is not recoverable through conventional property taxes or other government revenue measures (Charles Marohn, The Growth Ponzi Scheme, Strong Towns). Under current financial arrangements, the construction, maintenance, rehabilitation, and expansion of streets and roads is the dominant factor in the funding deficit. In Canada, less than 25% of the full cost is recoverable from fuel taxes and user fees (Transport Canada, Estimates of the Full Cost of Transportation in Canada, 2008 and Draft Estimate of the Full Cost of Transportation in Canada, 2011)

Key Issue #5

Zero

The number of new water licences that would be available to The City.¹

By the middle of the next decade, The City's water licences will not be sufficient to meet peak demand.² Established Area redevelopment can keep demand within legal limits, as well as reducing the cost to taxpayers. The alternative is buying water rights in the costly, convoluted, and controversial water rights market.

All those things considered, it is essential to build a City budget that, as the top priority, puts tax dollars into supporting and improving the Established Area communities we already have. Fiscal prudence requires nothing less.

So, what do those of us in the Established Area need?

- #1 We need more local shops and services so people don't have to travel all over town to meet their daily needs. There are many ways to measure that, but it comes down to making it possible for a parent with their baby, a person with a disability, or a senior citizen to safely and easily get to the grocery store, the park, or visit a doctor in their neighbourhood. In particular, we want to reduce our dependence on the car to get around less time spent driving and being able to enjoy the cost savings from using our cars less and maybe even reducing the number of cars we need.³
- #2 We need to see an end to school closures and the return or replacement of neighbourhood schools that have been abandoned. This means providing high-quality development that families want to live in something as simple and obvious as more three- or four-bedroom apartments and condos.
- #3 We need timely, quality maintenance of infrastructure like local roads, alleys, and sidewalks. While high-speed roads serving the Greenfield Area get diligent snow-clearing, expensive interchanges, and a regular upgrade of new asphalt, we suffer with potholes, unsafe intersections, and slippery winter streets. While posh new suburbs get smooth sidewalks and extensive walking trails, we are forced to navigate broken, uneven sidewalks and a fragmented pathway system that regularly forces cyclists, especially kids, into traffic.

Not owning a car dramatically increases the number of neighbourhoods that a household can afford to live in. (Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation, <u>Action Research on Transportation Housing Affordability</u>). When the City budget results in easily accessible neighbourhood shopping areas, services, and schools, households have the choice to trade off car ownership for greater housing affordability.

- #4 We need, when we venture outside our homes, to find an attractive, family-friendly, and safe neighborhood. As they are now, Activity Centres, Main Streets, and even some local streets in the Established Area are, for the most part, dreary, unfriendly, sometimes intimidating places we endure as we go from place to place.
- #5 And, finally, we need a quality-of-life boost that improves our health, our social connections, and our economic prospects. This means more green spaces, well-maintained and improved recreation facilities, reliable transit service for those who depend on it, support for the less fortunate, and decisive climate action that not only saves us money, but improves the air quality where we live.⁴

City Council has the power to deliver those things by ensuring that the Established Area receives the civic services, public works, and private investment it deserves and the community-positive, community-friendly population growth that will follow.

How do we get that from the City budget?

To be able to meet the needs of the Established Area, City Council must allocate funds and target incentives to make those things happen. The City has been doing this in a limited way. Much more needs to be done by:

- Reallocating 80%⁵ of the tax and debt support proposed for new subdivisions to the Established Area Investment Fund
- Aggressively lobbying the federal and provincial governments to send more of our tax dollars back to Calgary and designate the money for established communities
- Increasing Established Area revenue by right-sizing The City's revenue stream based on these principles:
 - o Encourage reductions in energy use and GHG emissions
 - Equitably share the financial cost of maximizing opportunities and adapting to and managing risks
- Completing, in consultation with all communities, right-sizing of The City's revenue stream for inclusion in the November 2023 budget revisions and transferring the cost savings and additional revenue to the Established Area Investment Fund
- Determining, in consultation with Established Area communities, the projects, programs, and services that, on a priority basis, should be included in the November 2023 budget revisions

Reduced greenhouse gas emissions mean less local pollution, however small. In the "bowl" of the inner city during an inversion, that can result in a significant improvement in air quality.

- Based on those consultations, implementing a systematic program of "land value capture" to induce developers to build better, family-friendly buildings with the primary goals of
 - Construction of three- and four-bedroom apartments and condos along Main Streets and at Activity Centres
 - Maximization of affordable housing⁸ units in developments along Main Streets and at Activity Centres
 - Incentives and smart regulation to channel redevelopment interest to Main Streets and Activity Centres.

Those are the right actions, the essential actions that City Council must take to build a budget that we can live with, that is, really "live with" in family-friendly neighbourhoods with schools, convenient shopping, affordable homes, more jobs, and fewer risks from climate change and other threats.

But, that won't happen unless we move City Council away from the "old school" obsession with expanding the Greenfield Area at our expense.

In asking for better buildings, we are looking for two things:1) buildings that are more energy efficient and are or will become net-zero in terms of greenhouse gas emissions and 2) better quality control by The City of construction, especially more funding for building inspections to eliminate defects – especially hidden defects.

The City's goal for affordable housing is "housing that meets the needs of households earning 65 per cent or less of the median household income in Calgary that are spending 30 per cent or more of their gross annual household income on shelter" (<u>Municipal Development Plan</u>, p. 140. This does not include support for those who can afford housing through the private market <u>Corporate Affordable Housing Strategy – Foundations for Home</u>

The Business Case Against More Funding for New Subdivisions

There are currently 39 residential subdivisions under development on the fringe of Calgary (Figure 1). Without spending another dime, nine to twelve years of fringe land are ready for development.¹ That is well beyond the three to five years City policy requires.²

Despite hype and rosy promises, those 39 subdivisions are building out very slowly.³ More importantly, those subdivisions are failing to meet The City's goals⁴ designed to create a critical mass of population to attract and keep local businesses. This means, among other things, the subdivisions won't generate enough taxes and fees to support the expensive roads, water and sewer lines, etc. required to service them.⁵ The rest of Calgary will pay the difference.

It didn't have to be that way. In 2009, City Council approved a ground-breaking *Municipal Development Plan*.⁶ With its focus on a more compact, livable city, the *MDP* offered the most important way to keep taxes low and communities strong. Current estimates are that sticking to the *MDP* will save our city \$16.18 billion in capital costs and, by 2079, \$390 million in annual operating cost, ⁷ as well as being the most cost-effective way to lower greenhouse gas emissions.⁸

Sadly, over the last thirteen years, the *MDP* has been ignored and contradicted. Despite the requirements in the *MDP* and The City's evaluation showing that development in established communities is superior to new subdivisions (Figure 2)⁹, City planners recommended more subdivisions and Council approved them, sometimes even tacking on additional subdivisions.


Over the full life cycle, the cost of public funding for new subdivisions is not recoverable through conventional property taxes or other government revenue measures (Charles Marohn, <u>The Growth Ponzi Scheme</u>, Strong Towns). Under current financial arrangements, the construction, maintenance, rehabilitation, and expansion of streets and roads is the dominant factor in the funding deficit, with in Canada less than 25% of the full cost recoverable (Transport Canada, <u>Estimates of the Full Cost of Transportation in Canada</u>, 2008 and <u>Draft Estimate of the Full Cost of Transportation in Canada</u>, 2011)



In contrast, many people saw the benefits of the *MDP*. Responsible inner-city developers built new community-sensitive homes. Homebuyers and renters responded by choosing existing communities over new subdivisions. The trend in population growth in new subdivisions dropped after the *MDP* was approved from 94% in 2009 to 67% in 2015. The trend for new housing in subdivisions followed suit, going from 89% to 54%.¹⁰

Ignoring the trends, the Planning Department consistently overestimated the need for new subdivisions. Administration's suburban housing forecasts, on average, exceeded the trends by 15%. Suburban population forecasts were more extreme, averaging 31% above trends.¹¹

Then the recession hit. As veteran Councillor Gian-Carlo Carra remembers, City Council was afraid the development industry would collapse, even though Council was seeing the opposite happening. ¹² In response in 2018, City Council approved more subdivisions. Council was guided by the exaggerated forecasts from the Planning Department and advice from developers.

On June 27th of this year, the Planning Department's recommendation for more subdivisions came to Carra's Infrastructure and Planning Committee. Despite well-reasoned, fact-based opposition from Calgarians, ¹³ the Committee recommended and City Council eventually approved Planning's belief that more new subdivisions are needed.

The Committee's public hearing was wide-ranging with a long list of developers pressuring Committee members to bless their land investments. Answers from the planners were, for the most part, vague and aspirational. Committee members, though, managed to confirm that The City's suburban planners always try to err on the high side, the planners don't have a grasp on population change within established communities, and The City is failing to meet its *MDP* targets.

After all the anxiety and rationalizing that emerged at Committee, one issue remained. It wasn't climate – the increase in GHGs was dismissed as negligible – nor was it the burden on taxpayers – financial costs were glossed over or pushed off into the future.

The issue Committee members feared most was "development theft" – outlying communities like Airdrie, Cochrane, and Okotoks stealing people from Calgary if City Council doesn't approve more subdivisions. That is a red herring. With over nine years of serviced suburban land supply

available, Calgary can, if it wants to, easily out-compete its neighbours in a race to the bottom of sprawl.¹⁴ Instead of approving more new subdivisions, The City should use those nine plus years to reach agreement with the rest of the region on how to equitably share growth.

The ball is in Council's court. Whether it's about keeping taxes low, fighting global warming, or improving service, the choice is obvious. Just say no to more sprawl.

Unfortunately, most members of Council won't say no to sprawl unless voters tell them to. Suburban developers are rich and powerful with plenty of cash, come election time, to challenge those who cross them.

We have the chance this November to end sprawl. That is when the next four-year City budget comes to Council. It's our tax dollars that contribute to making sprawl happen by either direct subsidies or additional debt that current Calgarians will have to pay for.

More importantly, every dollar spent on sprawl means one less dollar to invest in services, affordable housing, and climate-friendly, neighbourhood-friendly development in the communities we already have, including newer communities already established on the fringe. We deserve to have our tax dollars serve us, not be squandered on developers who gambled that City Council will never say no to them.

So, call your Councillor, send an e-mail, a letter, a text, a tweet, or, even better, ask to meet. Let your Councillor know that serving the people and communities we already have is the most cost-effective, the smartest, the only way to spend our money.

Were it not for supportive family I would have become homeless - despite having savings, student loans, and working as much as possible. If there's not enough housing, it doesn't really matter how much money you have - unless you have the most. Fortunately, after dozens of applications, I've found a place.

I'll be spending more than half my income on a suburban basement suite. In order to afford this, I'm dropping my car - which is probably better for the environment, mental health, and safety, but it's still hard. I paid \$500 dollars for this car that's 23 years old and in great condition, but it still costs almost \$500 dollars a month for gas, insurance, and maintenance. This is partly due to the rising cost of living, but also because everything in the city is so spread out. So I'm going with transit.

Transit has worked pretty well for me. I get to read my textbooks, don't have to worry about maintenance, and have the odd conversation with a stranger. But I've also had to reduce my weekend hours at work because transit won't get me home after my shift is over at 10:30 PM. When I take the last bus on weekends, there're are 10 people on it. And I can't help but think of the others who might take transit if it was an actually viable option.

We need affordable housing. We need walkable areas so one doesn't HAVE to have a car - and those who can't drive can get around. We need 24/7 transit and increased frequency so it's a real option for anyone in the city.

Luckily I was knocked away from the truck and didn't go under

Background:

Inner city communities like Bridgeland, Inglewood, and Kensington are destinations for Calgarians to visit. They are also more densified neighbourhoods, with growing populations. As a result, they bear higher traffic and associated traffic noise and challenges.

Centre Ave in Bridgeland is one of the three key E<>W routes crossing through Bridgeland and is a higher-traffic residential road that is a prime location for environmental design interventions that align to the Neighbourhood Streets Policy, with a specific focus on walkability and connection.

With the construction of the Bridgeland-Riverside Continuing Care Facility and recent completion of several higher-density residential buildings near the LRT Station, there is an opportunity to create a pedestrian and cycling friendly street that enhances connections to the neighbourhood, local businesses and other modes of transportation.

Considerations:

- Centre Avenue is one of three key E<>W "connector" streets through Bridgeland. It is the only "connector" street with no traffic calming, no crosswalks, no stop signs and a missing sidewalk link that runs the entire south side of Centre from 12th Street to 9th Street (see street view attached). It's also a main entry and exit point to 12th Street, which is a primary entrance and exit to Memorial East (and the Deerfoot).
- The Bridgeland-Riverside Continuing Care Facility's <u>main entrance</u>, its primary parking lot, the proposed Bocce Ball court and playground structure <u>all front directly on to Centre Avenue</u> (between 10th and 11th street). However, there are no plans for a crosswalk or stop sign to facilitate the movement of people from the Care Facility over to 1 Ave in Bridgeland. This contravenes the proposed design of the building, which was meant to be integrated and flow into the community. (see rendering <u>here</u>).
- There is a bus stop on 12th Street at the end of Centre Ave, but currently no sidewalk to connect pedestrians via the south side of Centre Ave to either George Boyak or the Continuing Care Facility.

The Ask:

- The Council prioritize walkable streets, particularly when new, large-scale infrastructure is being constructed (such as health care facilities, schools, or apartment buildings). This would include, at a minimum, ensuring that there are sidewalks in front of these buildings.
- That Council continue to invest in creative ways to calm traffic including speed bumps, stop signs and traffic calming curbs, particularly in inner city neighbourhoods with high levels of visitors to the area.

- The Council direct the CPS to enforce residential speed limits, particularly where there are no other traffic calming measures.



While looking at the 2023-2026 Capital Budgets it became obvious the amount budgeted for 2026 (\$1.115B) is for construction of the Greenline. I recall a document that stated most of the construction will be towards the end of the project. The current projected investment of \$3.031B is allocated to 2027+ years. My guestion is: has a contingency account be created to cover cost overruns? I would imagine this contingency account should be close to \$500M. Currently, there are supply problems and shortages, so it is very conceivable that construction of the Greenline will be affected with delays. I'm quite sure that before the Province of Alberta committed to the project, the subject of cost overruns would be covered by the City, so: could a contingency account be created. I also noted that Property Tax revenues are being shown as increases for the years 2024-2026 (\$2.227B, \$2.34B, and \$2.446B respectfully to each year) and a contingency fund would throw these budgets out. Due to the pandemic, public transportation (NOT just CT) has been broken and it is time to think-outside-the-box and STOP throwing money at CT! You know the Union will be seeking more money NOT roll backs so throwing more money at CT is a vicious circle. (Maybe it's time to assert yourselves against the Union, not the employees). My Ward Councilor provided me with a property tax calculator and I am SHOCKED that more money goes towards CT than the Fire Department!

- Freeze or Lower property taxes Calgarians are suffering through a governmentcreated period period of rapid inflation and declining real incomes. Raising property taxes would be irresponsible in this environment so every effort should be made to cut expenses to avoid further financial strain on residents.
- 2. Get Real on Climate Mitigation the multi-billion dollar climate mitigation plan supported by the mayor is beyond irresponsible; it's a joke. We need to continue to shore-up our riverbanks to avoid the risk of flooding which history has shown occurs approximately once every 100 years. Beyond that, we need to get real and focus on what's important to Calgarians clean streets, safety, and community.

Utilities will not do this without a strong nudge from central governments.
- 4. Safety must be enhanced. The lack of willingness of local police to enforce basic

laws and to protect private homeowners from theft, home invasion, loitering, and property damage is tragic. Criminals, it seems, now have more rights than victims. Development - in historic communities like Inglewood, the streetscape and character of the community needs to be protected from over-development. Small mid-rises of maximum 6 stories, which blend in with the local community, are appropriate and encouraged. We need to find the right balance and city council needs top start listening to residents and community associations that have strong views on this topic.

City of Calgary 2023-2026 Service Plans and Budget Consultation: a small business perspective

Andrew Sennyah, Senior Policy Analyst, Alberta Annie Dormuth, Provincial Affairs Director, Alberta and BC

On behalf of 9,300 small and medium-sized businesses the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB) represents in Alberta including 2,028 in the City of Calgary, this submission presents the perspective of business owners on the City of Calgary's 2023-2026 Service Plans and Budgets.

Current State of Small Businesses

CFIB's latest June survey results show small businesses in the city have not fully recovered from the pandemic and face an uphill battle. According to our latest survey, 80 per cent of Calgary businesses are still carrying pandemic related debt while only 41 per cent are making normal sales¹. Furthermore, the typical Calgary business is carrying almost \$115,000 in debt because of the pandemic and are expected to take approximately two years to fully pay off this debt. Small businesses face a new set of challenges in coping with rising inflation and interest rates, this is supported by the results of CFIB's October Business Barometer notes that small business confidence in the short and long term for the province remains relatively low². With these numbers in mind, small business recovery will be a slow process and our local entrepreneurs need our support now more than ever.

Avoid Increasing Property Taxes

One of the top concerns for Alberta small businesses across the province is property taxes after utility and insurance costs. In the City of Calgary, property taxes are cited by business owners as the most harmful to the operation of business. Property taxes are profit intensive for small businesses, meaning that businesses must pay them whether or not they're bringing in any revenue. In CIFB's latest Alberta Municipal Watch Report, businesses in Calgary make up 20 per cent of the property assessment share in the city, yet they are responsible for paying nearly half

(46%) of Calgary's property taxes. At a time when inflation is high and economic recovery is not a reality, businesses and residents need cost relief, not the proposed 4.4% property tax increase for the next year or a planned 15.5% per cent increase from 2023 to 2026 over the next four years. We call on the City of Calgary to revise this budget to ensure property tax fairness and to consider the impacts of a substantial increase in property taxes on small businesses.

Construction Mitigation

In 2018, CFIB published a report titled: Paving a Smoother Road - Helping small businesses survive infrastructure work. In conjunction with graduate students from Dalhousie University we examined the best practices used by cities around the world to manage construction mitigation. Those findings led to a survey of Canadian small businesses to better understand the scope of the problem. Research showed that, between 2012 and 2017, 41 per cent of Canadian small businesses were disrupted by local construction projects. Of those, 65,000 small businesses were forced to borrow money, relocate, or close all together. We are also seeing other western municipalities start to look at construction mitigation policies. Recently, the City of Vancouver has asked city administration to "explore options on ways to provide relief to commercial properties affected in the 'cut and cover' locations along the Broadway Subway corridor." CFIB has openly supported this policy and urged Vancouver council to adopt administration's proposal to help small businesses impacted by large-scale construction projects. In the Edmonton, a draft policy on Financial Assistance for Economic Loss due to Major Construction was presented to council but was narrowly defeated by a vote of 5 to 4.

The city has committed to invest billions of dollars in public infrastructure projects across the province over the next four years, some of these large infrastructure projects can be disruptive and, in some cases, be costly enough to shut down local businesses. As such, CFIB calls on the City of Calgary to introduce a construction mitigation policy that includes:

- A compensation program to assist businesses taking major economic hits over an extended period.
- A "no surprise" rule to ensure fair warning to local business so they can properly prepare.
- A comprehensive planning or "one dig" approach to avoiding multiple disruptions.
- An improved contracting process including integrated mitigation provisions and a bonus/penalty system, especially for early/late completion of the project.
- A dedicated business liaison office with managerial authority to improve direct communication with affected businesses.

Red tape and Business Friendliness

The City of Calgary has made significant strides in reducing red tape as a result of the pandemic with changes such as accelerated patio permitting. Along with taxation, red tape continues to be a top concern for small businesses, and it is imperative for council to continue to build upon the

city's work on reducing red tape. Red tape and excessive bureaucracy can limit productivity, lower investment capacity, and leave business owners with less time to manage their business. For SMEs, red tape not only includes all the paperwork and rules they must follow but also the level of customer service provided by the government. Not being able to get answers quickly from the government website or call centre, or not being able to understand the language on forms or guidance documents, can be equally frustrating and even costly for small business owners. We commend the City of Calgary for launching the Business Experience Representative Team that assists restaurateurs and brewers owners navigate the permitting and licensing process but recommend that the program be expanded to all business sectors.

Recommendations

While we recognize municipalities are faced with tough decisions, small businesses also recognize the Alberta government has a role in helping municipalities. CFIB survey results from October 2022 show that 72% of Alberta small businesses say it is important for the Alberta government to assist with municipal issues such as, affordable housing, property damage from crime and construction mitigation. In addition, we are eager to see how the Minister of Municipal Affairs will work with municipalities to address the following outlined in the mandate letter:

- Work with the Ministers of Education and Treasury Board and Finance to review the feasibility of changes to the Education Property Tax to assist municipalities with retaining more funding for local priorities
- Work with the Minister of Service Alberta and Red Tape Reduction, who is the lead, to
 work with municipalities to benchmark, measure and reduce the time it takes to approve
 permits in order to create a more attractive business investment environment.

We encourage council to work with the government on these initiatives and explore ways for the province to help municipalities address issues such as crime, construction mitigation and property damage loss that affects all Albertans and businesses. In conclusion, we call on council to reject the proposed four-year operating budget and direct City Administration to propose a revised operating budget that:

- Prioritizes economic recovery by not increasing taxes and costs on businesses.
- Reduces non-residential property taxes and set a long-term goal for property tax fairness.
- Engages in sustainable spending practices by reducing overall local government costs and finding internal efficiencies.
- Makes a commitment to reduce red tape at the municipal level and keep the best of COVID-19 changes such as accelerated patio permitting.
- Expands the current Business Experience Representative Team to all industry sectors to help answer questions about municipal permitting, licensing, etc.

- Implements a construction mitigation plan that compensates businesses for disruptions caused by municipal construction projects and ensure businesses have fair warning so they can properly prepare.
- Creates or promote existing "shop local" campaigns to encourage everyone to support small businesses in their communities.



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Executive Summary

In August 2021, Alberta Ecotrust Foundation, the Calgary Climate Hub and Clean Energy Canada, asked 1,000 Calgarians to share their opinions on Calgary's economy, climate change, and what they would like to see from municipal candidates heading into a civic election. ZincTank was contracted by the consortium to conduct this poll.

Calgarians want investment in the economy to include environmental solutions. Overall, the data shows well over half (69 percent) of Calgary's citizens are concerned about climate change impacts and how they will impact their jobs, families, and the future of their communities.

Key findings

1. Climate solutions are good for individuals, families and the community.

Calgarians are worried about the future of their city, as 53 percent are uncertain that Calgary is on the right track to be a better city 10 years from now. Over half (57 percent) want Calgary to chart a course for a more sustainable and resilient city by investing in the transition toward clean energy.

Seven in ten believe the transition to renewable energy will ultimately improve the health and well-being of themselves and their families. If Alberta does not seriously tackle climate change, 53 percent believe that more youth will leave Calgary, which may expose the community to more social and economic risks.

2. Calgary's future economic plans need to include climate action.

Almost three quarters (73 percent) believe that investing in climate change is an investment in long-term economic sustainability and prosperity. Overall, Calgary's citizens (56 percent) agree that tackling climate change will be good for their family's economic prospects.

Individuals across all sectors need to be supported through the transition, as 70 percent of Calgarians believe addressing climate change will be a challenge for small business owners, and 73 percent believe it is important to invest in transitioning oil and gas workers to other roles in a changing energy industry.

3. Voters care about building a resilient, diversified economy.

More than 70 percent of Calgarians want candidates to have clear environmental policies that protect our natural systems and diversify the economy in their election platforms.

As we transition to a low-carbon economy, 80 percent of Calgarians believe that with the province's experience in the oil and gas industry, Calgary has the resources to become a global leader in renewable energy. After a long economic downturn, 72 percent of Calgary's citizens think it is important for candidates to have a clear environmental policy to address climate change that also focuses on diversifying Calgary's economy.

4. Calgarians support measures to get more electric vehicles on roads

A considerable majority of Calgarians support policy measures that would help grow electric vehicle adoption in the city. Three-quarters (76 percent) support more electric vehicle charging stations along major roads and shopping centres, while two-thirds (65 percent) support electric vehicle incentives. Electrifying buses is particularly popular, with 78 percent supporting updating public buses to electric or hydrogen versions, while a similar number (76 percent) favour the idea of replacing conventional school buses with electric ones.

5. Environmental impacts are affecting Calgary

With increasing extreme weather events, such as this summer's record heatwaves and wildfires, two-thirds of Calgarians (66 percent) recognize, some now more than ever, that the city needs to do more to address climate change. Some families (43 percent) say they are already being financially and emotionally affected by climate impacts.

Conclusion

Calgarians are ready to embrace a more diverse economy—an economy that addresses the realities of today and their concerns for tomorrow. While some citizens oppose climate action, their numbers are small compared to the 66 percent of Calgarians who believe any further delays in addressing climate change will be detrimental to Alberta's economic future.

The three project partners hope that the responses to this survey encourage candidates in the upcoming election to include climate action as a priority and also to inform municipal policies and programs in the months and years to come for Calgary.

Methods

In Spring 2021, the consortium of Calgary Climate Hub, Alberta Ecotrust and Clean Energy Canada contracted zinc tank to conduct a poll on climate change and what Calgarians are seeking on climate action in the October's municipal election and in City Council's agenda for the next term.

- The survey covered topics on perceptions of Calgary (using some questions from the City's Citizen Satisfaction Survey, vision for the city, economic matters, environmental concerns, actions to address climate change and what respondents were seeking in candidates on climate action related matters.
- Mode of data collection: online (Internet panel, self complete) respondents.
- 1,000 respondents:
 - Respondent quotas established to ensure data are population representative.
 - Data presented are weighted to reflect population of adults 18 years and older. Data obtained was rebalanced by age, gender and quadrant as per the 2019 City of Calgary Civic Census (the most recent available).
 - Those eligible to vote represented over 98% of respondents.
 - Internet panel was selected as a means for data collection given the length of the survey, and that 90%+ of Calgarians are online (higher than landlines).
 - Field Dates: August 5 15, 2021.
 - Incidence rate: 84%. Total contacts 1,704. Breakoff (Incomplete) 291. Termination (Out of Calgary, Under 18, Over quota) 413.
- Length of interview: Average 25 minutes, Median 22 minutes.











My name is Gary Webster, and I am a member of the Rotary Club of Calgary Centennial and past chair of our Community Service Committee. The theme of our club is to improve the mental health and wellness of vulnerable Calgarians.

I am sending this letter to support the budget recommendations for the Calgary Police Service (CPS), specifically in relation to their response to mental health and addictions in the city. I believe the CPS to be a leader in innovative crisis transformation initiatives, which include the 211/911 co-location project where citizens with mental health crises who call 911, can be deferred to 211 immediately where they are able to speak with a crisis worker from the Calgary Distress Centre. The Downtown Outreach Addictions Partnerships (DOAP) District 1 Project, where calls are being diverted from Calgary 911 to 211 so the DOAP team can be deployed. Our club has provided funds in the past to help purchase a van for the DOAP team.

This initiative is very much needed, as it meets the goal of the 211/911 Co-location to get the "right resource to the right person at the right time." An ideal outcome for the person in crisis is to refer them to community supports, and the other is to transport the person to the hospital because the situation presents as emergent. These vulnerable people require help from the community, not always the police, so I am very supportive of initiatives where the police are not the first responders in cases when vulnerable people are in crisis.

With the provision of the proposed funding, the CPS will be able to continue to work with the community on innovative ways to address mental health and addiction in the city of Calgary.

To Whom it May Concern:

The recent postponement of Green Line work North of the Bow River is the latest in more than four decades of uncertainty on Centre Street North. From its first mention in 1980 through to the latest announcement that all work north of the river must stop immediately, Centre Street N has been kept in a sort of "will-they-won't-they" limbo that has resulted in a neighbourhood left to deteriorate as developers, landowners and entrepreneurs "wait and see" what is to become of Centre Street.

Dozens of small business owners (and homeowners) in Crescent Heights who have no ability to plan for their futures. And there's no end in sight. While no one has been willing to provide a time frame, we understand it could be five years before work begins again north of the Bow. Maybe 10. Some are still unconvinced it will happen at all. Uncertainty is bad for business. And bad for business is the last thing Crescent Heights (and the entire city for that matter) needs.

Given these circumstances, Crescent Heights Village BIA formally requests a timeline and an interim plan for our community that address the following areas:

- 1. A definitive minimum time frame for Green Line construction.
- 2. Traffic and Parking
- 3. Streetscape and Public Realm

We have some concrete requests and suggestions we'd be happy to provide and discuss upon request. By giving Crescent Heights some certainty and some tools to mitigate the decades of neglect, we're confident we can create a thriving business district that not only has the strength to withstand Green Line construction if/when it arrives but also contributes to inner-city vibrancy (and tax base) while we wait.

Suggested Interim Measures for Crescent Heights Village BIA

- 1. **Commitment to a minimum time frame**: Whether it's five or 10 or 20 years, we need to know how much time we have to create a strong economic foundation for the area one that can survive the major construction disruption of the Green Line.
- 2. **Reimagining Centre Street as a pedestrian-friendly shopping area rather than a commuter artery.**Centre Street is loud, fast and dangerous for pedestrians and people parking their cars. To bring us into alignment with Calgary's other Main Streets, we suggest the following measures:
 - a. Removing the rush-hour lane reversal
 - b. Lowering the speed limit to 40 and enforcing speed and noise bylaws with cameras/decibel meters at 8th and 12th Avenues
 - c. Buffered parking spaces in front of retail businesses
 - d. Pedestrian lighting at crosswalks
 - e. Increased police presence at night
- 3. Public Realm Improvements: To make Crescent Heights Village safe and accessible to all, we request:
 - a. The replacement of all sidewalks from 7th Avenue to 16th Avenue N.W. (There are currently 50+ 3-1-1 requests in for repairs).
 - b. Pedestrian-level lighting with access to power and fixtures for pageantry and flowers.
 - c. Public seating and parklets.
 - d. The planting of trees and other greenery.
 - e. Timely and cost-effective permits for patios, public art, gathering spaces and other vibrancy-building projects by businesses, the Community Association and the BIA.
 - f. Improving the paving and lighting in the alleyways behind Centre Street businesses
- 4. **Tax incentives for new businesses:** Given the constraints the looming Green Line construction could place on businesses opening in the area, we suggest subsidizing in part the BIA levy, business tax and utilities leading up to (once the timeline has been established) and during construction of the Green Line.
- 5. Incentives for higher-density residential developments on and within walking distance of Centre St.:

 This might come in the form of density bonusing or other tools currently under discussion within the
 Established Area Growth Strategies task force.

Community strategies are radically more effective at tackling the issues that policing proposes to handle: mental health and addiction response, anti-racism, crime prevention, and many more equity and community building strategies and plans. So, quite simply, please defund the police and increase funding for community services.

Dear Mayor Gondek and City Councillors,

We would like to encourage City Council to uphold their commitments to climate and biodiversity when voting on budget items. Council declared a *Climate Emergency and Call to Action* in November 2021 and subsequently voted to approve a new *Climate Strategy – Pathways to 2050* in July 2022 to support accelerated action to respond to climate change. The mitigation and adaptation plans in the Climate Strategy identify targets that require support (both financial and political) to succeed. The decisions made now will impact the course of critical climate outcomes for the City over the next business cycle and beyond – the time is now for Council to demonstrate climate as a strategic priority in budget decisions. The decisions you make will impact biodiversity moving forward. For example, the five new communities that were approved in July 2022 and three additional communities pending approval will result in a loss of approximately 300 hectares of natural assets that support biodiversity and climate resilience.

The use of leaf-blowers and other gas-powered yard equipment result in negative consequences invisible to the naked eye: consequences to the atmosphere, ecosystem, neighbourhoods and micro-climate, e.g., cumulative emissions pollution (air pollution); reduction in quality of life; increase in life-threatening diseases; biodiversity & "Insect Armageddon".

We encourage Council to consider the following ways to support biodiversity:

- Dedicate funding for improving natural areas, habitat restoration, and expanding the urban tree canopy;
- Develop mechanisms to limit the loss of natural assets during development of new communities, including dedicating funds for acquisition of natural assets as Conservation Reserve;
- · Promote the "Leave the Leaves" campaign in support of native biodiversity; and
- Follow successful efforts by many municipalities to address biodiversity and climate change by limiting the use of gas-powered yard equipment such as leaf blowers, lawn mowers, snow blowers, etc.

The members of the BiodiverCity Advisory Committee acknowledges the advances the City has taken to promote biodiversity, such as the recent purchase of a parcel of land to be preserved for the creation of a future park on the Paskapoo Slopes. We hope that Council will approve funding for the development of the park in the upcoming budget deliberations.

An Open Letter via email and Social Media

Re: City of Calgary's 2023-2026 Service Plans and Budgets

Dear City Manager David Duckworth,

We are concerned about the 2023-2026 Service Plans and Budgets. Council has taken important first steps to support active mobility by approving the Cycling Strategy, Calgary's Transportation Plan (including the Always Available for All Ages and Abilities (5A) network and its guiding principles), and the Climate Strategy. Active mobility spending makes up a very small fraction of the City's transportation expenses, increasing investment would result in significant benefits. The benefits include improved health, long term transportation cost savings, vibrant communities, reduced traffic, fewer collisions, greater equity, reduced GHG emissions, and a more affordable cost of living. In order to meet Council's commitment to a fully realized 5A Network and transportation modes share targets by 2050 substantial work, backed by an appropriate budget, must be done annually.

According to recent studies¹, there are several key tactics that determine whether or not active mobility goals are successfully achieved by a municipality. These include:

- Prioritization of active mobility in policies by aligning with broader goals on climate, road safety, health, equity, and build back better strategies.
- Integration of 5A network infrastructure into: (i) long term transportation plans as a key element
 of integrated transport systems, (ii) standards for design for urban infrastructure, and (iii)
 financing schemes at the federal, provincial, and city levels.
- Setting a minimum percent (10-20% for example) of the transport or infrastructure budget for active mobility is the most straightforward way to fulfill active mobility goals in a sustained form.
- Establishment of a screening process for transport and road infrastructure projects to ensure adequate and appropriate inclusion of walking and cycling components.
- Undertaking capacity building to train staff on best practices for active mobility with the ultimate goal of creating a dedicated team or unit.

The proposed 2023-2026 Service Plans and Budgets generally fails to position Calgary for success in meeting our active mobility and mode share goals and fails to support most of the tactics outlined above. Our key concerns with the proposed budget are described below and we look forward to your response:



- Several programs, from previous Council budget asks and recently approved strategies, are not
 explicitly mentioned in the proposed budget, including: Pathways Missing Links, Active and Safe
 Routes to School, Safer Collector Framework, and Neighbourhood Streets Policy Why did these
 not receive dedicated funding?
 - In particular we are concerned about the absence of funding for the Active and Safe Routes to School Program. On July 26th, 2022, Council directed Administration to: "Bring an option in the 2023-26 budget for an **expanded** package that would accelerate the program's objectives for Council's consideration." (Item IP2022-0556. <u>Link to meeting minutes</u>).
- 2. Proposed capital funding for Pavement Rehabilitation is set to increase from \$53.5 million in the previous budget cycle to \$71.5 million. We believe that in accordance with the Complete Streets Policy and Calgary's aspirations to build out the 5A network, pavement rehabilitation projects should include the development of active mode corridors. When a roadway along the 5A network is repaved, will this significant budget increase be used to also provide a safe walking and wheeling route within the road right-of-way?
- 3. In contrast, a large capital funding cut is proposed for the Community Mobility Improvements program. This is one of the few programs that consistently delivered new and improved 5A network routes in the previous budget cycle. Why is this program being cut by 83% (\$27.8 million to \$4.7 million) without a replacement for these key community investments?
- 4. Bike Calgary welcomes investment in downtown revitalization, transit oriented development, and main streets corridors, and we hope to see quality walking and wheeling routes delivered as part of these programs. One of our top advocacy priorities, however, is ensuring equity in transportation choice across all areas of the City. Our assessment of this budget is that it is very city centre and established areas-centric. Which programs in this budget offer opportunities for 5A network development in the rest of the City, including North/Northeast, and Southeast Calgary?
- 5. Performance Measures (PM) in the Sidewalks and Pathways portion of the budget seem to be operational in focus and do not reflect city policy and long range plans such as the 5A principles, The Climate Strategy, and The Calgary Transportation Plan. Why have the Performance Measures changed so substantially from the 2019 budget? The Climate Implementation document PMs related to mode share appear to be decoupled from the budget PMs. Can you comment on this? (Example below)

We would like to stress that investing in active mobility is not an investment that merely benefits a handful of Calgarians who already walk or wheel to work. It is an investment which will have substantial, ongoing benefits for all Calgarians. By enabling more access to safe active mobility, Council would improve the transportation options of all Calgarians. More Calgarians using these active modes, whether to work or school or for errands and social engagements, means fewer cars on the roads, less wear and tear on infrastructure, fewer accidents, less air and noise pollution, lower GHG emissions, a healthier population, and success and wellbeing of Calgary's students. A recent study compiled the transportation costs² borne by both individuals and society within Calgary. It concluded that driving costs \$0.83 per kilometre and cycling costs just \$0.08 per kilometre (2015 dollars).

Making Calgary more safe and accessible for walking and wheeling is the equitable, economical, and climate friendly thing to do. We believe all Calgarians should have the right to active mobility options. We strongly encourage Council to make the required investment to ensure that these many benefits can be realized, all across our city.

Dear Mayor and Council,

My name is Andrea Becker, and I live in Ward 8. I have lived on and off in Calgary since 1984, and have now retired full-time to the city. I have seen it grow exponentially in that time, and it has been heartbreaking to me to see the beautiful agricultural and wildlands bordering the city become swallowed up by sprawl. Carbon sinks have turned into carbon-emitting taps. In recent years, the revitalization of the core has encouraged me, and I am glad to see some priority and funding going to making a livable, walkable and bike-friendly city center. Urban densification is such an important global strategy to deal with climate change. Based on the current rate of growth of cities around the world, studies have calculated an urban expansion of about 2.2 million square kilometers by 2050, or a 106% increase in urbanized space worldwide, global scale. However, this expansion could be divided by three, in a scenario where compactness and co-location of living, working and leisure functions were favored. In a sprawling city, a large part of the greenhouse gas emission problem lies in personal transport. Calgary's public transport system has a long way to go to be comparable to systems in other cities world wide. I propose to council that in this budget, a substantial reallocation of funding be directed away from roadways and infrastructure for automobiles and into more efficient, more AFFORDABLE, and more earth friendly public transport. Electrification of Calgary busses is a good place to start, but a big reduction in transit fares will put more people onto these busses. As a casual user of the system, I am reticent to pay \$15 dollars for my husband and I to make a one-time round trip. I have heard friends and family that the time it takes to transit to work is so much more than driving, that they naturally chose the car. So frequency of public transit service is a problem as well.

In closing, I would just like to say you will hear many concerns about climate change and many great ideas from Calgary citizens of how we can meet reduction targets. When Council first declared a Climate Emergency, I expected to see some very forward-moving policies and initiatives. I am not too encouraged with the action we've seen yet. This is such a critical budget to fund the work needed to be done to make Calgary a leader in climate strategy and an example for the rest of Canada.

RE: LETTER OF SUPPORT FOR POLICE BUDGET

My name is Karen Gosbee, and I am the Co-Chair of the Community Action on Mental Health and Addiction through the City of Calgary.

I am sending this letter to support the budget recommendations for the Calgary Police Service (CPS), specifically in relation to their response to mental health and addictions within the City of Calgary. The CPS is a leader in innovative crisis transformation initiatives. This includes the 211/911 colocation project where citizens with mental health crises who call 911, can be deferred to 211 immediately and speak with a crisis worker from the Calgary Distress Centre. The "60/90" Project connects a CPS front line officers with the Alberta Health mobile response team (MRT) prior to apprehending someone for suicidal ideations. This is another initiative where the CPS has pioneered innovative solutions to assist people with mental health crises.

The frontline Police Officer consults with an Alberta Health Service clinician that provides an assessment of the individual and referral to existing community supports or transportation to a hospital. This model enables a proficient deployment of wrap around resources and enhances the continuum of care, for the individual in need. Eighty percent of mental health calls are situations that do not require police presence. This will strengthen system navigation that provides better social, psychological, and environmental resources to achieve equitable and effective care in times of need.

Trust is achieved within the community and emergency response partnerships from co-design and coordination of existing community supports. Data can be gathered, aggregated and shared to achieve better outcomes. The outcomes below have been achieved because of the expanded partnerships:

DOAP August 2/22 to October 31/22

Diverted 1150 calls, 50% from C911 and 50% were direct communication into the 211 Centre. This has been after an effort from D1, 211, C911 and DOAP to educate the public on the best resource required for the specific crisis.

C911/211 Project February 1/22 to October 31/22

1299 calls transferred or referred, 42% unwanted guest, 25% miscellaneous, 8% check on welfare, 7% domestics, 6% mental health concerns.

PACT Doubled June/21 to October 31/22

Since doubling of PACT, 3627 calls to PACT were dispatched by police. AHS data from April 1/22 and September 30/22, there were 439 new referrals, 231 new clients engaged, 249 existing clients engaged. PACT spends an average time from referral to enrollment approximately 7.87 hours.

MRT February/22 to September/22

(New direction to call MRT), there were 2573 calls into the Consult Line.

I am supportive of partnerships initiatives with CPS and community, to provide easy access to care for individuals struggling with mental health and addiction. Although mental health crises do not always require police presence, these partnerships have strengthened the response and overall built a sense of trust.

With the proposed funding, the CPS will be able to continue to work with the community on innovative ways to address mental health and addiction in the City of Calgary.

General comments

The Mayor, Councillors and City Administration are encouraged to invest in maintaining and improving existing communities rather than spending funds on new developments at & beyond City limits. The City should plan to use vacant land (not green spaces) to increase affordable housing and density. These improvements should address the needs of all residents including parents & families, mobility challenged individuals and 55+ elders.

Several programs are not explicitly mentioned in the proposed budget such as Pathways Missing Links, Active and Safe Routes to School, Safer Collector Framework, and Neighbourhood Streets Policy. In addition, we note that there is a large capital funding reduction proposed for the Community Mobility Improvements program. This program delivered new and improved routes in many locations in the City in previous budget cycles. It contributed to quality walking and wheeling routes with improved interconnectivity in some communities. We are concerned this will cut many expected City and neighbourhood improvements. Why is this program being cut from \$27.8 million to \$4.7 million (approx. 83%)?

Specific comments & requests

The Oakridge Community Association has been requesting a range of facility improvements aligned with a safer and more viable and interconnected community within District 32. The City has responded to many residents and the OCA representatives that there were no funds in the prior Budget and in some cases did not meet City used priority criteria. We therefore explicitly request that, although we do not yet have a Local Area Plan, these priority improvements are, as a minimum, funded in the 2023-2026 Budget funds.

Re: City of Calgary Four Year Budget Plan

Mayor Gondek and Council,

Since its inception in 2014, The LRT on the Green Foundation has been an active participant in the conversation around Calgary's transit future. While we are excited about the important capital investment being made in Green Line – Stage 1, the LRT on the Green Foundation believes that City Council must work to develop a transit culture in Calgary where completing a journey by transit is as easy and convenient as driving. The proposed four year budget currently under consideration is taking baby steps in this direction but sadly does not go nearly far enough in delivering what is needed.

The LRT on the Green Foundation believes that a key funding priority of this four year budget should be the introduction of 10 minute service standards, between 6am and 11pm, 7 days per week on all LRT, Max BRT and other high priority routes such as the 301/302/3/23. We ask that the Calgary Transit operating budget be revised accordingly to achieve this goal by the end of the four year budget cycle.

In addition, the LRT on the Green Foundation believes that the four year budget must include a path forward to ensure that future phases of the Green Line can be considered shovel ready in time for the launch of the Government of Canada's new Permanent Public Transit Fund in 2026. Funding included in the City of Calgary's four year budget should include, but is not limited to design work to refine cost estimations, land acquisition, community engagement and advocacy work with other funding partners.



As is outlined in the book Human Transit by public transit network designer Jarrett Walker, high frequency is critical to building higher ridership. It reduces waiting and provides users with the basic sensation of being able to take a trip by transit when they want to go and not when they need to go. It also makes connections much easier and helps citizens begin to view transit as a network servicing multiple destinations and not just point to point service to major destinations such as to and from downtown. Last but not least, frequency serves as a back-stop to reliability and offers easier recovery for service disruptions.

The ten minute service standard has been shown to be a bare minimum when it comes to people using transit as second nature. The '10 Minute Max Network' has recently been rolled out in Montreal and similar concepts have been successfully adopted in cities such as Toronto and Seattle. The duration of frequent service has been shown to be key as well. In order to ensure transit is an appealing transportation option beyond the rush hour commute, high quality service must extend into the evening and weekend periods.

The revitalization of the greater downtown has been listed as an important priority for the City of Calgary. In order for the revitalization to be a success, attention must be paid to encouraging the tens of thousands of people who already use transit as part of their downtown commute to linger longer after work or make return visits after the end of the work day. To support this, frequent service on Calgary's primary transit network must be extended late into the evenings to reflect when major events such as concerts and hockey games let out, and continue throughout the weekends. The point must also be made that Calgary's growing transportation and logistics sector relies on shift workers who typically work evenings and weekends and deserve to be accommodated on transit just as much as the 9-5 corporate office crowd.

The construction of Green Line will address existing coverage gaps and eventually serve as the major north-south spine of a primary transit network that offers high frequency service to every quadrant of Calgary. However in order to ensure that the Green Line can stretch beyond Stage 1, the project needs to be well positioned to qualify for the next round of federal funding beginning in 2026. Not preparing now as part of this budget cycle means that Calgarians will miss out later.

As we look forward to the completion of Green Line Stage 1, our city can also use the current four year budget cycle to build on its success of having one of North America's best used LRT networks and become a transit city beyond the Monday to Friday, 9 to 5, office commute. This involves not only making sure transit services are within walking distance of as many Calgarians as possible, but also that service on the primary transit network is available in a timely fashion. Frequency is Freedom – it's long overdue for Calgarians who rely on transit to move about their city to be set free.
