Previous Council Direction



Notice of Motion EC2023-0463 (April 2023)

Council directed Administration to review opportunities to direct operating surpluses from the SNIC Reserve and the Winter Operations operating budget to be annually allocated for street repairs to improve mobility for all modes such as vehicles, bicycles, transit buses and scooters AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that Administration report back on enhancements or amendments to existing reserves through the Snow and Ice Control Policy update.

2023-2026 Budget Deliberations (November 2022)

Council approved increased trouble service response resources up to \$2 million over four years, drawing from the Snow and Ice Control reserve fund during major winter Snow and Ice Control events where a snow emergency has not been declared, and report back with an update on this enhanced service opportunity as part of the Snow and Ice Control Policy (CP2021-01) review report back to Council in Q2 2023.

Recommendation

That the Infrastructure and Planning Committee:

Recommend that Council direct Administration to present a finalized Winter Maintenance Policy and potential service enhancements by the end of Q1 2024.




Highlights

- Safe winter travel is a priority for Calgarians, and winter maintenance is an important service in their daily lives
- Following a comprehensive engagement process, Administration has developed a draft Winter Maintenance Policy (renamed from the Snow and Ice Control Policy)
- Based on previous direction, Administration has reviewed multiple options to direct surplus winter maintenance funds for Council consideration
- Related service level amendments, Bylaw updates and budget impacts will be presented to Council in conjunction with the final policy approval by Q1 2024

Proposed Policy Changes

Name change to the Winter Maintenance Policy

New sections highlighting Equity Supporting Practices and Climate / Sustainability Practices

Priority system updates and clarifications for private properties, wheeling lanes and residential clearing standards

Embedding Core Engagement Themes:

Accessibility: Moving safely in winter conditions regardless of ability level

Equity: Mobility network is available and well-connected for all travel choices and residents

Safety: Winter travel is safe and the City is responsive to safety concerns

Environment: Winter maintenance operations minimize environmental impacts



Planned Enhancements within Current Budgets

School Areas



- Snow removal at pickup areas during school break
- Clearing walkways leading to school access

New Pilots



- Priority 2 clearing in 24hrs with smaller trucks
- Blue lights on winter equipment
- More BIA clearing

Accessibility



- Reprioritizing activities after 36hrs to improve accessibility
- Standby contractors increasing for major events

Pathways



 150km of additional pathways to be cleared this winter season


Seasonal Clearing



- Catch basin clearing to avoid flooding in Spring
- Educational resources for residential properties

Opportunities for Investment / Bylaw Updates

Accessibility

- Barrier free crosswalks / bus stops (\$\$)
- Prioritized laneways crossings (\$\$\$)
- Prioritized engineered walkways (\$\$)





Transit

- Priority 2 clearing in 24hrs (\$\$\$\$)
- More bus stops cleared in 24hrs (\$)

Safety

- Prioritized 5A / snow removal (\$\$\$\$)
- Laneway crossing bylaw updates (\$)




Priority Snow Plan

Here is what our crews are focused on in the winter:




