Perform a social, economic and environmental analysis to evaluate the need for a minimum flood protection level above the 1:100 flood for land-use planning and structural protection across Calgary. | Water Resources is nearing completion of a cost-benefit assessment for raising new and retrofits of flood barriers, and on a stormwater improvement program. | Identify graduated levels of flood risk depending on the function of types of City infrastructure. The Land Use Bylaw amendments went to Council 12 May where it was tabled to 9 June 2014. City Wide Policy & Integration is preparing a scoping report for Council for Q3 that will explore: current built form in the flood hazard area; potential for moving structures from the floodway; citizens views on the long term future of the rivers; alignment with Provincial regulation developed under Bill 27 (Flood Recovery and Reconstruction Act); updates to the MDP and Land Use Bylaw based on updated mapping. | | Investigate the potential for expanding flood resiliency requirements to flood risk areas outside of the official Flood Hazard Area, to include risk from groundwater, sewer back-up, and/or surface flooding during floods larger than the 1:100 event. This was critical to success in mitigation and recovery efforts in 2013. Alternative strategies to maintain power to critical infrastructure in flood prone areas are under discussion. AESRD is making substantial progress in improving flood forecasting and information-sharing: documenting lessons learned from 2013 and best practices; assessing weather model performance during past events; and examining lead time for emergency action in areas vulnerable to rapid flooding. These studies will be complete in Q3 2014. | | Investigate the feasibility of a common forecasting platform with the Province and TransAlta to improve sharing of real-time, forecasting, and modelling outputs for faster and more accurate forecasts. | Water Resources | Information Technology CEMA |

In partnership with AESRD and TransAlta, expand the network of river and weather monitoring stations upstream of Calgary and protect stations from damage during flooding. | Water Resources has repaired or replaced monitoring stations damaged in the 2013 flood, added sensors and cameras to some stations and made some of them more flood resilient. | Install additional hydrological and weather monitoring stations upstream of Calgary on the Bow and Elbow Rivers. At least eight locations identified by Water Resources, the Province, and TransAlta. New stations could include links to GIS, and specialized technology for better real-time forecasting. | Water Resources | |

This study also looks at groundwater and stormwater implications. The City also developed a new permitting process for temporary barriers on private property. | Identify financial impacts, construction sequence and funding for new permanent protective barriers within Calgary for communities and critical infrastructure, considering the results of activities outlined for Recommendations 1a and 1b.
