2023 CSIF Allocation

Background

The Community Safety Investment Framework (CSIF) is a collaborative effort between the City of Calgary and Calgary Police Service to reallocate funding to community partners to improve support for Calgarians in crisis. CSIF addresses gaps in crisis services for individuals, their families and support networks, outreach services, and the emergency response system in Calgary – including racially and culturally appropriate services.

CSIF is guided by the following outcomes:

Crisis response: Improving service to Calgarians in crisis situations through:

Improved crisis triage: Improved call intake and triage at points of contact to ensure Calgarians get the right supports in the right place at the right time.

Integrated case management: Ensure that systems and programs are working together and communicating through a crisis response and beyond so that citizens get effective supports in the short- and medium-term.

Increased availability of 24/7 non-emergency support and outreach services: Ensure non-emergency mental health, addiction, domestic conflict, and other supports are available 24/7.

Resilience to crisis: Increasing Calgarians' ability to prevent future crises through: Increased capacity of support networks.

Increased access to community and peer support programs.

Increased access to court diversion options.

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2023 Allocation of Funding

In 2023, CPS budgeted a total of \$12 million¹ toward CSIF. CPS allocated \$10.6 million in 2023, leaving \$1.4 million carried forward into 2024. The following projects received funding from CPS in 2023:

2023 Program Highlights

1. HELP (Alpha House Calgary – formerly DOAP team)

3240 total calls for the HELP team in 2023.

Impact stories (names have been changed in the following stories to protect the individual's privacy)

Bill had been working with his housing case worker and was included in the Drop-In Centre's housing program. Bill's last step in acquiring housing was setting up a bank account so he could pay rent and receive financial aid. Because he's low mobility, the HELP team was contacted to facilitate. HELP transported Bill to and from the bank. He was thankful for the support and was sent on his way to be housed and is fully stable.

Sarah had an open referral to Triveri House; a facility for vulnerable young adults experiencing homelessness. Sarah had not been located for weeks and her intake deadline was fast approaching. The HELP team successfully located Sarah at a transit station. They shuttled her to Triveri House where she completed her intake and was housed that day.

5. Action Table Calgary

CPS is partnering in the implementation of Action Table Calgary (ATC) with the United Way of Calgary and the City of Calgary. ATC is a situation table model, which convenes a cross-sector triage table to collaboratively mobilize resources in a timely way for individuals or families with complex needs and who are at risk of harm to themselves or others. CSIF funded the United Way (via the City's allocation) for a Co-chair position in 2023, while CPS is resourcing this project internally by providing another Co-chair and an Intake Officer, as police will be primarily a referral pathway for cases at the table with the hopes of transferring care to appropriate community resources. The table launched on January 31, 2024.

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
