Background and Previous Council Direction

Background

Since 1996, Parks & Open Spaces has worked closely with community groups (including businesses and developers) who have had a desire to invest in and enhance their community. The Parks Enhanced Landscape Maintenance and Infrastructure Agreements Policy was approved in 2002, to manage community delivered enhanced levels of landscape maintenance services and the maintenance for community installed non-standard infrastructure (optional amenities) in parks and open spaces which may include medians, boulevards, and roundabouts.

This policy was in response to Council requesting that Administration develop a comprehensive Community Policy to facilitate desired levels of Park maintenance on a City-wide basis and governs the operational, financial, and legal requirements for community groups who hold these agreements with Parks. The policy currently identifies four agreement types and details specific funding, financial reporting, administrative costs, approval authority, ownership, terms and termination of agreements, management of lands, design and construction requirements, repair and maintenance responsibilities, indemnification, and insurance requirements.

In 2024, there were 125 communities, 189 community partners and 297 agreements in place under this policy managing community investments into Calgary's parks and open spaces. Most of these agreements are for non-standard infrastructure (optional amenities) while the remaining are primarily related to enhanced landscape maintenance services delivered by community organizations through the Enhanced Landscape Maintenance (ELM) program, the Special Tax Levy (STL) program and the Snow Removal and Ice Control (SNIC) program.

Enhanced Landscape Maintenance and Infrastructure Agreements Policy (CSPS007)

- This policy is a tool used for the development industry (landscape architects, engineers, consultants, Resident and Community Associations) for the management and administration of enhanced park features - Optional Amenities. More specifically addresses the issues of lifecycle, ongoing maintenance, financial concerns and legal implications.
- This policy also addresses the need for consistent administration of Maintenance Agreements and Special Tax Levies and operates as a manual for both Residents and Community Associations effected.

Parks and Pathways Bylaw #11M2019

in, on or near a public place or place that is open to the public.

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
