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Background and methodology

Background

Since 2017, The City of Calgary has conducted multiple waves of the Economic Perspectives Survey. This telephone survey provides an opportunity for The City to collect data from Calgarians on the topic of Calgary's economy, both current and future, to inform decision-making. Generally, four waves are conducted each year.

Methodology

The telephone survey was conducted by Advanis from March 18th to March 31st, 2025. A total of 508 Calgarians participated, completing the survey in an average of 15.73 minutes.

The survey was completed using numbers from both landlines (21%) and cell phones (79%) to obtain a random and statistically representative sample of Calgarians. The margin of error (MOE) for the total sample of n=508 is ±4.3 percentage points, 19 times out of 20 (though larger among subgroups of the total).

To ensure the data was gathered from a representative group of Calgarians, sample quotas were set by age, gender, and city quadrant. Data were weighted based on the latest federal census for age, gender, and city quadrant. The weighting efficiency was 81%. Although the results are weighted, sample sizes for each question represent the number of actual respondents (i.e., unweighted n).

Throughout the report, Ψ denotes a significant decrease from the previous period and \uparrow denotes a significant increase from the previous period, unless otherwise specified. Some charts and tables do not add to 100% due to rounding.

The Economic Perspectives Research has been conducted quarterly for many years. Throughout the report, the last six quarters are presented. However, all available quarterly tracking data is included in the appendices.






Survey context: Economic Indicators



Real GDP in Calgary is forecasted to grow by 2.6% in 2025. A very mild increase compared to the 2024 forecast where GDP is forecasted to grow by 2.3%. This is in-line with expectations as over one-third of Calgarians in Q1 '25 expect the economy to be about the same in six months.

CALGARY INDICATORS



Despite population growth being forecasted to slow, the unemployment rate is forecasted to remain high but unchanged in 2025. However, two-thirds of Calgarians in Q1 '25 expect unemployment to get worse in the next six months.

While the forecasted inflation rate is forecasted to decline sharply in 2025 and forecasted interest rates are also projected to decrease too, over two-thirds of Calgarians in Q4 '24 were concerned with being able to afford necessities in the next six months.

Survey context: April 2025

October 10: The City and the Province announce that an agreement had been reached to continue with some aspects of the Green Line LRT project.

October 23: The Bank of Canada cut its key interest rate from 4.25% to 3.75%, offering relief to Calgary businesses and homeowners by reducing borrowing costs. The Calgary Chamber of Commerce emphasized the potential for increased investment and hiring, though affordability challenges remain.

October 30: The OCIF Express program launched with \$5 million to help Calgary businesses hire and train talent in sectors like clean energy and digital tech. This funding is aimed at fostering economic growth in Calgary's fast-growing industries.

December 5: Eight members of the OPEC+ alliance postponed production increases (to 2.2 million barrels per day over the course of 2025) that have been scheduled to take effect on January 1st. The increases are now expected to start on April 1st.

December 11: The Bank of Canada further cut its key interest rate from 3.75% to 3.25%. The target interest rate has now decreased by 1.75%pts (from 5%) since the Spring of 2024.

December 13: The Province announces a revised Green Line proposal, including an elevated track downtown and 5 more stations, saying it would save more than \$1 billion.


December 14: The temporary (GST/HST) break, aimed to provide tax relief on various holiday essentials, starts.

February 1: President Trump threatened to impose a 25% tariff on imports from Canada, then agreed to a 30-day pause on February 3.

February 7: According to the Corporate Economics report released by Statistics Canada, Calgary Economic Region unemployment rate reached 7.4% in January 2025.

February 15: End of GST/HST holiday tax break, adding pressure on food and alcohol costs.

February 18: The January Consumer Price Index (CPI) for Calgary Census Metropolitan Area rose 2.7% year-over-year, up from 2.4% in December.



November 15: Canada Post begins strike. Calgary businesses face disruptions to their mail delivery process. The Canadian Federation of Independent Business found that 72% of small and medium enterprises declared they were negatively affected by the strike in a survey.

November 27: The Prairie Gateway Project, a joint venture between Rocky View County and The City, is approved by the Calgary Metropolitan Region Board. It aims to create over 6,750 jobs and generate \$1.6 billion in infrastructure investment.

January 29: The Bank of Canada lowered its policy interest rate by 0.25. In its January Monetary Policy Report, the BoC forecasts that CPI inflation will be 2.3% in 2025 and 2.1% in 2026.

January 29: The Bank of Canada's Monetary Policy Report states that inflation in Canada has been around 2% since August 2024. Alberta's inflation rate was 3.4%, with shelter, transportation and recreation, education and reading being the top three contributors to Alberta's inflation rate.

March 4: Trump's 25% tariff on all imports from Canada went into effect. In response, the Government of Canada released a list of 1,256 US imports (mostly food, textiles and chemicals) subject to a 25% tariff.

March 12: The Bank of Canada lowered its policy interest rate by 0.25 to 2.75%, the seventh consecutive rate cut since June 2024.

March 13: The Government of Canada released a list of 539 US imports subject to tariffs, mostly covering steel, aluminum and other targeted products. Tariffs were imposed in response to US steel and aluminum tariffs.



Key findings

Perceptions of overall quality of life in Calgary increased in the first quarter of 2025, albeit not significantly, returning to levels observed in the second and third quarters of 2024.

• Two-thirds (65%) of Calgarians currently rate their quality of life in Calgary as "good" (ratings of seven to ten on a ten-point scale), compared to 58% in the last quarter of 2024.

Positive perceptions of Calgary's economy have increased significantly since last quarter, rising 11 percentage points to 61%, the highest level in over a year (since November 2023).

- Positive perceptions of the economic situation in Alberta (54%) and Canada (39%) have remained stable since last quarter.
- Older Calgarians (aged 55+) are relatively more optimistic, with 67% and 64% viewing Calgary's and Alberta's economy positively, respectively.
- Higher-income Calgarians (earning \$150,000 or more) are also more likely to have a favorable view of Calgary's economic situation (70%).
- On the other hand, lower-income Calgarians (earning up to \$90,000) are less likely to hold positive views of Calgary's (52%) and Alberta's (46%) economic situation.

However, predictions of a weaker economy have also risen 11 percentage points, up to 41%, since last quarter.

- This coincides with an almost equivalent drop in the number of Calgarians who think the economy will be about the same 6 months from now (down to 38%), which means those who expect the economy to be stronger has remained virtually unchanged (16%).
- Interestingly, younger Calgarians (aged 18 to 34) are more likely to feel optimistic about the economy strengthening in the coming months (25%), as are those who identify as BIPOC (23%) and residents with a household income of less than \$90k (22%).



Key findings

Perceptions of The City's role in supporting economic strengthening have improved significantly since last quarter.

- Trust in The City when it comes to building projects has increased to 56%, up from from 49% in November 2024.
- Perceptions that Calgary is attracting enough investments from outside the province have risen to 51%, up from 43% last quarter.
- However, the proportion of those expecting unemployment rates to get worse than it is today has risen to 67% (from 60% last quarter).

Calgarians are concerned about the impact of U.S. tariffs, and fewer than half are confident in The City's ability to manage those effects.

- Most Calgarians are concerned about the impact of US tariffs on Calgary's economy (87%) and their personal financial situation (73%).
- Over one-half (59%) believe it is likely the tariffs will remain in place long-term, and a similar number (54%) are not confident in The City's ability to manage their impact.
- Women are more concerned about the impacts on the economy and their financial situation (93% and 81%, respectively) when compared to their male counterparts (84% and 66%, respectively).
- Women are also more likely to believe that US tariffs will remain in place long-term (64% vs. 53% of men).
- On the other hand, households with children (47% vs. 65% no children) and those earning over \$150k (48% vs. 64% under \$150k household income) are less likely than their counterparts to believe US tariffs will remain in place long-term.



Key findings

Calgarians consistently believe it is a good time for The City to invest in infrastructure

- About three-quarters (73%) of Calgarians believe now is a good time for The City to invest in new projects like roads, public transportation, and local facilities.
- Projects that create jobs are now more than ever seen as the most important (68%), followed by those that enhance economic diversity (52%), both have increased, by 8%pts and 3%pts respectively, since November 2024.

Awareness of The City of Calgary's role in collecting provincial property tax on behalf of the Provincial Government has remained stable

- Awareness of The City of Calgary's role in collecting provincial property taxes on behalf of the Provincial Government remains nominally unchanged since November 2024, currently at 59%.
- Similarly, awareness that 35% of the taxes collected by The City are transferred to the province has also remained stable, at 45%.


Quality of life



Overall quality of life in Calgary

About two-thirds (65%) of Calgarians rate their quality of life in Calgary as "good" while just a small proportion (11%) rate it as "poor".

Rating of quality of life in Calgary



Tracking overall quality of life in Calgary

Positive quality of life ratings experienced a nominal, but not statistically significant, increase from 58% in November 2024 to 65% this quarter, returning to the levels observed in the second and third quarters of 2024.


The economy and economic recovery



Current economic situation

Over one-half of Calgarians perceive the economic situation in Calgary (61%) and Alberta as "good" (54%). In contrast, a similar number (55%) have a negative perception of the economic situation in Canada.

Q6. How would you describe the current economic situation in...? Base: all respondents (n=508)



Tracking current economic situation

Those rating the economic situation in Calgary as "good" (61%) have increased significantly compared to last quarter (50%). Positive ratings of the current economic situation in Canada and Alberta remain unchanged from last quarter.



Future of the economy in Calgary

About two-in-five (41%) Calgarians anticipate that the economy will weaken in six months and a similar number (38%) anticipate it will stay about the same. Only a few (16%) expect it to be stronger.





Tracking future of the economy in Calgary

Expectations for Calgary's economy to be weaker six months from now have increased significantly (41% vs. 30% in November 2024), while expectations for Calgary's economy to remain the same have decreased almost equivalently since last quarter (38% vs. 52% in November 2024). Expectations for the economy to be stronger have remained stable since September 2024.



Perceptions of The City's role in strengthening the economy and investments

A large majority (86%) of Calgarians agree on the importance of Calgary achieving a better balance between its reliance on oil and gas and other types of businesses in its local economy. Nearly two-thirds (63%) express confidence that The City will collaborate effectively with local businesses and other levels of government to find optimal solutions to help strengthen Calgary's economy and a similar number (61%) trust The City to make the right decisions to strengthen Calgary's economy.



Perceptions of The City's role in strengthening the economy and investments (continued)

Just over one-half of Calgarians (53%) believe the municipal government is actively implementing appropriate measures to strengthen Calgary's economic and a similar number (56%) trust The City to make the right decisions regarding building projects. About one-third (36%) feel that The City is making an effort to reduce the cost of local government.



Tracking perceptions of The City's role in strengthening the economy

Calgarians' confidence that the City will collaborate effectively with local businesses and other levels of government to find optimal solutions to help strengthen Calgary's economy increased to 63%**, up from 56% last quarter. Similarly, trust in The City to make right decisions to strengthen Calgary's economy rose to 61%** compared to 47% last quarter.



Tracking perceptions of The City's role in strengthening the economy (continued)

Trust in The City's ability to make the right decisions regarding building projects have increased to 56% from 49% in November 2024. Perceptions about The City taking appropriate measures to assist in strengthening Calgary's economy and The City's effort to reduce the cost of local government have remained stable since November 2024.




Perceptions of Calgary's current economy

A majority of Calgarians (73%) think it's a good time for companies to invest in Calgary, but only just over one-third (37%) perceive now is a good time to start a new business in The City.

Two-thirds (67%) expect the unemployment rate in Calgary to worsen over the next six months, and one-half (51%) believe that Calgary is attracting sufficient out-of-province investment to support the economy.



Tracking perceptions of Calgary's current economy

The proportion of Calgarians who perceive that The City is attracting sufficient investment from outside the province has increased to 51% from 43% last quarter. At the same time, expectations that the unemployment rate will deteriorate over the next six months have increased to 67%, compared to 60% last quarter. Perceptions about now being a good time to start a new business or to be investing in Calgary remain unchanged.



Good or bad time for infastructure investment





Importance of different infrastructure investments

To measure the perceived importance of different infrastructure investments, a Best Object Scaling (BOS) approach was used:

- Survey respondents were shown various types of projects and asked to select the one they felt is most important. This process was repeated several times using different project combinations, and each time the respondent was forced to make a discriminating choice amongst them (see images below).
- Results were then aggregated across all respondents. The explicit trade-offs made by participants are used to reveal a statistically valid scale we can then use to measure relative project preference.




Importance of different infrastructure investments

Job-creating projects remain the top priority for Calgarians, with 68% rating them as most important. The gap between these and projects focused on enhancing economic diversity (52%) has widened by 16 percentage points this quarter.

Meanwhile, the perceived importance of projects with a social impact has declined significantly, dropping 15 points to 29%. In contrast, support for projects that promote trade and tourism has increased from 33% to 39%, making them the third-highest priority among Calgarians.



Perspectives on impact of US tariffs



Concerns about the impact of US tariffs

Nearly all Calgarians (87%) are concerned about the impact of US tariffs in Calgary's economy and about three-quarters (73%) are concerned about the impact on their personal financial situation.



Over one-half (59%) of Calgarians believe the US tariffs are likely to remain long-term, while just over one-third (35%) believe this to be unlikely.




Awareness of The City collecting provincial property tax

Aware 35% of taxes collected by The City are transferred to the Province





Tracking awareness of The City collecting provincitation property tax

Awareness of The City of Calgary's role in collecting provincial property tax on behalf of the Provincial Government (59%) has remained stable, increasing only nominally since September 2024. Awareness that 35% of the taxes collected by The City are transferred to the province (38%) has also increased nominally, but not significantly, since September 2024, returning to levels seen in March 2024.

Segment differences



- The tables on the next few slides show comparisons of key metrics by several sub-segments of Calgary's population.
- Any statistical differences between demographic groups are indicated with arrows to indicate where a group is statistically higher or lower than everyone else who is not part of that group.
 - To illustrate, the statistical tests performed when comparing three groups are as follows:



- This approach identifies differences between one group and everyone else who is not part of that group. To illustrate using the example below, 55+ year olds are significantly more likely to believe that the current economic situation in Calgary is good compared everyone who is not part of that group (i.e., those aged 18 to 54).
- Note that we cannot conclude that this sentiment is lower for those who are 55+ years old when compared 18-to-34-years-old or 35-to-54-years-old individually (it may not be true). Don't know, prefer not to answer, and prefer to self describe are excluded.

- Younger Calgarians (aged 18 to 34), in contrast, are less optimistic about the current economic situation in Alberta (43%) when compared to older age groups. However, they are more likely than older age groups to expect the economy to be stronger in the following six months (25%).
- Residents in the Northwest (49%) are more optimistic about the economic situation in Canada compared to other regions.




