If safety and environmental concerns are the main factor for closing this road allowance, then why are other springbank and bearspaw private residence able to use the reservoir? How do I explain/justify to my children they cannot use this reservoir for recreation when it's clearly used for other affluent families where TransAlta doesn't own the shoreline.

I've personally used ghost lake reservoir to kayak and boat which can operate water levels between 1185m to 1191m for the flood protection. That's 6m or approximately 18 feet water level fluctuation. Safety is not a concern there. And there are many families kayaking and boating on this lake all during the fluctuating water levels. What is the fluctuating water levels at Bearspaw. Why can't Transalta put up safety barriers around the dam like at Ghost?

Recently, the planning committee recommended approving new NW communities of Westview and Haskayne. More population will put more pressure on existing parks and the Bowness park lagoon. If council closes this road allowance as they deem it not appropriate access then I challenge Sonya Sharp (current ward 1 councillor) and other councillors to create a plan to then provide appropriate facility/infrastructure to allow public access. This is an opportunity to come up with a plan to provide public access as it's clear there will be more demand for this type of recreation going forward. Thank you!

Dr. Steve E. Hrudey, CM, AOE, FRSC, FSRA, IWAF, FCAE, FEC, FGC (Hon), DSc(Hon), PhD, DSc(Eng), P.Eng.

Dr. Hrudey is Professor Emeritus, Faculty of Medicine & Dentistry, University of Alberta. He chaired the 2022 Royal Society of Canada Expert Panel on Wastewater Surveillance for SARS-CoV-2 in Canada. Among 30 expert panels over his career, he served from 2000 to 2002 on the Research Advisory Panel to Justice Dennis O'Connor's Walkerton Inquiry into a fatal drinking water outbreak; on the Expert Panel for federal Minister Jim Prentice on Safe Drinking Water for First Nations in 2006; Chair of the international expert panel on bladder cancer and chlorination DBPs in 2014 – 2015 for the Water Research Foundation, Denver, Chair of an expert panel review of proposed regulatory initiatives for *Taumata Arowai* (2020), the new national drinking water regulator for New Zealand created following a 2016 fatal drinking water disease outbreak in Havelock North; Chair, Technical Advisory Committee to the BC Minister of Health, on Turbidity & Microbial Risk in Drinking Water (2007-2008); and Chair of an international expert review of drinking water quality in Edmonton (1985-1986).

His research is reflected in over 200 refereed journal publications, 12 books (4 explicitly on safe drinking water and risk) and 30 book chapters focused on public health, environmental risk and ensuring safe drinking water. He has given dozens of workshops on ensuring safe drinking water for front line personnel in Canada, Australia, the UK and the US. Among a number of professional recognitions he received the top research award of the American Water Works Association, the A.P. Black Award in 2012. Dr. Hrudey was elected as a Member of the Order of Canada in 2019 and the Alberta Order of Excellence in 2017.



Calgary has a well-conceived and justified Source Water Protection Policy CP2020-04. A fundamental axiom of risk management to ensure safe drinking water is to ensure that source water to be treated for drinking water is protected to the maximum degree possible. I have worked extensively internationally on all matters related to safe drinking water and well-informed jurisdictions will prohibit the use of drinking water reservoirs for recreational purposes. Noteworthy, I was invited to testify before the Legislative Council, Western Australian Parliamentary Review about Recreational Access to Drinking Water Catchments and Storages, Perth, Australia, in 2009. I mention this example because Australia is the driest continent on earth and there is consistent advocacy from recreational groups to access water bodies including drinking water reservoirs. That Parliamentary review accepted the considerable scientific and technical evidence that allowing human recreational access to a drinking water reservoir presents an unjustifiable risk to the consumers of drinking water.

Without wading into all of this evidence, the reality is that the greatest risk of contamination of drinking water that can adversely affect the health of consumers is from microbial pathogens (viruses, bacteria or protozoa). Humans are inevitably a primary source of such infective pathogens. Allowing human recreational access to drinking water reservoirs is simply an avoidable risk that must be avoided in the interests of protecting the health of Calgary's drinking water consumers. The fact that source water is well treated by Calgary's water treatment plants does not justify adding recreational use of source water as an avoidable risk for the benefit of those seeking recreational activities. Water treatment technology, like any technology, can suffer from technological malfunctions that justifies commitment to the so-called "multiple barrier process" that maintains sequential treatment barriers to maximize the security of the overall contaminant removal processes. Source water protection is the first barrier to be implemented for protecting the health of drinking water consumers.

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

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
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WATERBORNE DISEASE OUTBREAKS ARE UNACCEPTABLE

Ensuring Safe Drinking Water While Emerging from a Pandemic

COVID-19 has been the biggest public health disaster the world has experienced in a century. The disruptions to what is normal life have been profound. Beliefs and attitudes that we could take for granted in managing risks to drinking water may have become undermined by the growing politicisation of public health protection. Would any of us have predicted that a global pandemic that has killed more than 4 million people worldwide (as of July 2021) would coincide with any significant opposition to sensible public health measures? Yet, a substantial proportion of the public believes that the COVID-19 pandemic is a hoax and that vaccination against COVID-19, which has shown remarkable effectiveness in protecting against serious illness or death, is opposed by a consequential proportion of the population in a nation that has achieved unrestricted, free access to vaccination.1 The extent of this misinformation has prompted the US Surgeon General to issue a public health advisory warning.2

The title chosen for this feature article seems to reflect something so obvious as to be redundant for the informed audience of Health Stream. Yet, given the current popularity of misinformation about scientific evidence, readers need to prepare for the likelihood that affluent societies appear to be heading back into an information dark age, accelerated by social media. Those readers who are committed to their personal responsibility to ensure that the water they provide to consumers is safe to drink should be prepared for this "epidemic" of misinformation about scientific evidence. This epidemic may allow some individuals with personal agendas to question why resources need to be devoted to managing drinking water risks to achieve negligible likelihood of failure. Regardless of personal motivations, such advocates are effectively gambling that they will avoid experiencing a disastrous outbreak and, in any case, may not be held accountable for contributing to such a fundamental failure. Committed water professionals need to recognise such negative scenarios as a potentially growing risk to the safety of drinking water supplies.

Risk Management and Recent Experience with Waterborne Outbreaks – the Evidence

HS101 featured a review of 25 years of progress on better management of drinking water risk, an impressive record of progress and achievement that should be self-evident. Yet, given the misinformation epidemic outlined above, those achievements may no longer be something we can assume to be recognised as progress across society. Given that concern, it is worthwhile to revisit the wisdom, expressed as Guiding Principles, that was first captured in the 2004 edition of the Australian Drinking Water Guidelines (ADWG):

- 1. The greatest risks to consumers of drinking water are pathogenic microorganisms. Protection of water sources and treatment are of paramount importance and must never be compromised.
- The drinking water system must have, and continuously maintain, robust multiple barriers appropriate to the level of potential contamination facing the raw water supply.
- Any sudden or extreme change in water quality, flow or environmental conditions (e.g. extreme rainfall or flooding) should arouse suspicion that drinking water might become contaminated.
- 4. System operators must be able to respond quickly and effectively to adverse monitoring signals.
- 5. System operators must maintain a personal sense of responsibility and dedication to providing consumers with safe water, and should never ignore a consumer complaint about water quality.
- 6. Ensuring drinking water safety and quality requires the application of a considered risk management approach.

The fundamental merits of these guiding principles have withstood the test of time. Failures to honour and operationalise these principles can be demonstrated as outlined in the following review of experience with drinking water disease outbreaks over the past decade.

In August 2016 there was a fatal drinking water disease outbreak in Havelock North, New Zealand (see HS83, 84, 86, 88, 95, 100) which gained international attention, and resulted in a major Government of New Zealand Inquiry, producing two reports (Government of New Zealand 2017). The outbreak experience and the Inquiry's reports have led to major reforms to water governance in New Zealand (see News Items, HS101).

A particularly stunning revelation about the mindset of those who should have prevented this public health disaster from occurring appeared in the First Report of the Havelock North Inquiry (at p.62, para.[262]). In referring to deficiencies in addressing public health risks associated with aguifer contamination, the report notes: "the District Council in its 2008 Water Safety Plan rated the probability of the risk occurring as 'unlikely', and the consequences of such risk as 'moderate'. " This remarkable claim drawn from the 2008 Water Safety Plan (WSP) was made despite Havelock North having experienced an outbreak of campylobacteriosis in 1998 without the causes of that outbreak ever having been resolved before the 2008 WSP was prepared and signed off. Even more remarkable was the rating of the consequences of such a public health risk as being "moderate", given that any informed, rational understanding of such consequences is that they would include a waterborne outbreak, which could result in serious, and potentially fatal, illness. If the consequences of allowing a disease outbreak to occur can be judged to

be merely "moderate", what would have to happen to a drinking water system for consequences to be rated as "high" or "severe"? This revelation about the mindset of those who should have been responsible for ensuring safe drinking water to Havelock North suggests an enormous failure to comprehend the true responsibilities that rest with both drinking water providers and drinking water regulators to ensure the safety of their consumers. Confusing or misappropriating risks concerning the status of assets with risks of making consumers ill needs to be explicitly confronted and challenged. The fact that serious water supply failures keep happening in jurisdictions that do have the economic and professional resources to ensure delivery of safe drinking water indicates that serious misunderstandings about the risks of waterborne disease outbreaks still persist.

Graham (2020) summarised the main findings of the 2017 Government Inquiry about the 2016 Havelock North, New Zealand outbreak of campylobacteriosis that made 5,500 consumers ill, hospitalised 45 and caused 4 deaths. Overall, Graham (2020) noted that the raw groundwater supply was not treated, but it complied with the New Zealand drinking water standards as they existed at that time. The key failure arose with the criteria in those standards governing untreated supplies. For the New Zealand water sector as a whole, flaws exposed by the Inquiry included: too many small water suppliers, poor governance, inadequate funding, issues with staff recruitment and retention, deferred maintenance, and under investment.

Regarding the need for a multibarrier approach that is the second Guiding Principle of the ADWG, Graham (2020) summarised flaws that included: the environmental regulator did not meet legal responsibilities to protect the aquifer, the water supplier did not meet necessary standards of care, the water supplier's consultants did not accurately assess supply risks, and the drinking water regulators did not meet regulatory responsibilities. The premise of providing multiple barriers should be an easy concept to understand, yet the failure to provide

even a single effective barrier is evident in many cases documented in Table 1 which summarises 23 reported (published) drinking water disease outbreaks over the past decade in advanced economies. Anyone with experience in providing drinking water to the public should recognise that the flaws Graham (2020) lists are certainly not unique to Havelock North. Many, if not most, of these flaws could likely be found to have contributed to most, if not all, the outbreaks summarised in Table 1. Most of these certainly applied in some manner to the Walkerton, Ontario, Canada outbreak (Hrudey & Hrudey 2014) from 21 years ago that made over 2,300 consumers ill, hospitalised 65 and caused the deaths of 7.

The number of 23 outbreaks summarised in Table 1 is most certainly an underestimate of the total number of failure incidents because such incidents are likely underreported. The true extent of under-reporting cannot be known for any jurisdiction, but Majowicz et αl . (2005) estimated that in Ontario, Canada for gastrointestinal disease, the most common class of disease to be caused by waterborne pathogens, each reported case of illness represented a higher unreported total of between 105 and 1,389 cases (median = 285 cases, mean = 313 cases). Better reporting would be likely when large numbers of cases occur simultaneously as in a drinking water outbreak, but smaller outbreaks seem likely to often go undetected. Compulsory notification regulations will likely increase the reporting of waterborne disease outbreaks (Zacheus & Miettinen 2011). Regardless, for every outbreak reported, there are inevitably many more close call incidents that could be used for learning and improvement of practices, if only there was an organised program to capture the details of close call incidents and make them available, anonymously within the industry, for training purposes. The bottom line is that all drinking water disease outbreaks in developed economies are preventable, generally by the competent application of relatively simple measures like ensuring that disinfection processes are fully functional and that the integrity of the distribution of treated water is not compromised.

A few common themes are evident from a review of the outbreaks summarised in Table 1:

- Several of these outbreaks have occurred in systems providing no disinfection (i.e., chlorination or other primary disinfection process) of the delivered drinking water supplies.
- Outbreaks are caused most commonly by the microbial pathogens Campylobacter and Norovirus that are eminently manageable by disinfection, including chlorination. The few outbreaks of cryptosporidiosis can be dealt with by known management and treatment techniques, provided that the risk of contamination by Cryptosporidium are properly characterised.
- The first Guiding Principle of the ADWG clearly states
 that pathogens pose the greatest risk to drinking water
 safety. Infective pathogens (except for the emerging
 concerns about OPPPs) are found in human and animal
 faecal wastes, so they pose a risk wherever such matter
 is found, i.e., essentially everywhere! The sources of
 pathogens are a known and prevalent risk for any
 drinking water supply which needs to be appropriately
 managed.
- Failure to provide multiple barriers (or even a single functional barrier in some cases), as required by the second Guiding Principle of the ADWG, is a recurring theme in many of the outbreaks summarised in Table 1.
- Tourist resorts and camps have experienced outbreaks that should be a concern for community water providers because such failures can undermine consumer confidence in their community systems.
 The water sector should consider how it can raise the performance of such commercial systems in consultation with health regulators.
- Ignoring recurring causes of outbreaks in developed economies, based on the faulty assumption that such failures only happen within clearly inadequate systems, or accepting that repeated low-level detections of indicator organisms in treated drinking water are not

- significant, or tolerating underperforming treatment processes, are all means by which managers of systems that have any level of treatment mistakenly believe that they face no pathogen risks.
- Having effective and operational treatment and risk management systems clearly reduces the likelihood of failure, but all responsible managers need to recognise that the pathogens present in human and animal faecal wastes are an inherently pervasive risk, making pathogen contamination an ever-present challenge for any drinking water system. Any doubters of this truth need to read about the 2008 Northampton, England outbreak (HS51, Hrudey & Hrudey 2014).3

Considering the experience of the past decade that is summarised in Table 1, it is reasonable to ask whether the lessons available from these public health failures are being learned sufficiently by the water providers and regulators. Reading about the Askøy, Norway outbreak (see review in From the Literature in HS101) of June, 2019 that made more than 2,000 consumers ill, hospitalised 76 and caused 2 deaths, including a 1 yearold infant, surely raises questions about how well lessons are being learned. Notably, Norway has a GDP per capita⁴ that ranks highest among all EU member countries, and is higher than Australia and all G7 economies, including the USA, UK and Canada. Clearly, limits on financial capacity of societies to ensure safe drinking water do not provide an adequate explanation for the recurrence of such serious public health failures.

There are many complexities involved in failure to ensure safe drinking water, but a fundamental aspect appears to include ignorance of the consequences of allowing a waterborne disease outbreak to occur. Surely it should be unimaginable that any professional working as a water provider or as a regulator would knowingly wish to allow her/himself to be a party to a drinking water failure causing death or serious health injury. Apparently, the severity of the consequences of drinking water outbreaks may not yet be sufficiently understood and ingrained among all drinking water personnel from operations to the board room.

³ Anglian Water (England) operated the Pitsford Water Treatment Works serving a population of 270,000 that drew from a high water quality, low risk reservoir and provided ozone pre-oxidation, coagulation, clarification, granular media filtration, ozonation, chlorination and granular activated carbon adsorption, yet it suffered an outbreak of cryptosporidiosis causing 422 cases because a single infected rabbit had accessed a treatment tank. The epidemic was only limited to this extent because Anglian was monitoring treated water **continuously** for oocysts and management took immediate action upon the first sign of contamination.



Consequences of Drinking Water Outbreaks

Health

The illness and death that can be caused by a drinking water disease outbreak should be sufficient grounds for understanding that the consequences of such a public health failure must be regarded as severe, even if limited to a small community and a limited population of consumers. If community drinking water cannot be assured of being safe for human consumption, i.e., will not cause disease, what performance measure does a drinking water provider regard to be more important? Despite this obvious reality, there may be some who believe that a drinking water disease outbreak is a transient, short term event and fail to understand that there are also long term health consequences. Unfortunately, such long term consequences have been studied in comparatively few cases.

Before examining longer term health studies, it is worthwhile to review the short term consequences of the most recent serious drinking waterborne disease outbreak that occurred in June 2019 in Askøy, Norway (Table 1), causing more than 2,000 cases of campylobacteriosis, 76 hospitalisations and 2 deaths. Mortensen et αl. (2021) reported on 67 of those who were hospitalised, summarising their study cohort as 50 adults and 17 children with 14 below the age of 4. Two additional adults and one child were not included because they withdrew informed consent to participate in the study. Diarrhoea

was the most commonly reported symptom (99%), with 9% of patients reporting bloody diarrhoea. Adults had a high proportion (68%) of co-morbidities including cardiovascular disease, pre-existing gastrointestinal disease or chronic renal failure, and they experienced greater severity than children, including longer duration of hospitalisation. Among children, 47% had co-morbidities that were dominated by pulmonary and gastrointestinal diseases. These findings reveal the reality that drinking water consumers who have existing health conditions are likely to be vulnerable to more serious consequences of a drinking water disease outbreak.

An economic impact study commissioned by New Zealand Health (Moore et al 2017) for the Government Inquiry also provided some summary comments on health impacts of campylobacteriosis. They reported that New Zealand research on campylobacteriosis from all causes indicates that only 0.77% of cases require hospitalisation, and the fatality rate is only 0.001%, although those with compromised immune systems may experience a serious life-threatening condition if the infection spreads to the blood. A small fraction of cases (2.86% of cases, 95% CI: 1.40% to 5.61%) develops reactive arthritis which causes joint pain. Higher proportions of serious consequences from campylobacteriosis have been observed in drinking water outbreaks. Among the North Havelock outbreak victims who participated in a telephone survey, 82 reported one or more symptoms consistent with reactive

arthritis. Estimates of those who experienced reactive arthritis ranged from 6.8% to 23.2% among confirmed cases. There is also a rare occurrence of Guillan-Barré syndrome, an auto-immune response that results in paralysis that lasts several weeks and normally requires intensive care. Three cases of Guillan-Barré syndrome, one severe, were identified from those infected in the outbreak. Ultimately, all cases recovered and were discharged from hospital.

Because of the severity of the waterborne outbreak for the Walkerton community, the Ontario government funded a long term follow-up study, the Walkerton Health Study (WHS), to determine the presence of lasting adverse health impacts from the May 2000 outbreak (Garg et al. 2005a, 2006). Garg et al. (2005b) reported on a cohort of 1958 adults with no known history of hypertension or kidney disease before the outbreak. Of these, 675 were asymptomatic during the outbreak, 909 had moderate symptoms and 374 had severe symptoms needing medical attention. The follow-up study (mean period of 3.7 years) diagnosed hypertension in 27.0% of asymptomatic individuals, 32.3 % of individuals who had experienced moderate disease symptoms during the outbreak and 35.9% of individuals who had experienced severe disease symptoms during the outbreak. These findings showed a significant relative risk of hypertension of 1.28 (95% CI: 1.04 to 1.56). Clark et al. (2010) reported on the eight-year follow-up of an eligible population of 1977 participants and found that the adjusted hazard ratios⁵ among those who had experienced acute gastroenteritis for measured hypertension was 1.33 (95% CI: 1.14 to 1.54). For self-reported physician-diagnosed cardiovascular disease, the finding was 2.13 (95% CI: 1.03 to 4.43). The adjusted hazard ratio for the presence of either of two indicators of renal impairment was 1.15 (95% CI: 0.97 to1.35), but was 3.41 (95% CI: 1.51 to 7.71) for the presence of both indicators.

Reactive arthritis is known to be caused by *Campylobacter* spp. and to a much lesser extent by *E. coli* O157:H7. Garg et al. (2008) in a 4.5 year WHS follow-up, analysed a cohort of 2299 participants for evidence of reactive arthritis, consisting of 788 who were asymptomatic during the outbreak, 1034 who had moderate gastroenteritis

symptoms and 477 who had symptoms severe enough to seek medical attention. This study relied on self-reporting of a medical diagnosis, consistent across two interviews, of arthritis since the outbreak. With the asymptomatic patients as the reference group, those with moderate and severe symptoms of gastroenteritis had an adjusted relative risk of arthritis of 1.19 [95% CI: 0.99–1.43] and 1.33 (95% CI: 1.07–1.66), respectively.

Among the adverse health impacts of this outbreak, 19 Walkerton children who had recovered from haemolytic uremic syndrome (HUS), a serious kidney ailment that can lead to kidney failure and is caused by *E. coli* O157:H7, one of the faecal pathogens contributing to the Walkerton outbreak, were studied with an age and sex-matched control group of 38 healthy children (Garg et al. 2005c). These children were among 27 diagnosed cases of HUS caused by the outbreak. A three-year follow-up of the WHS, comparing with the control group those patients with HUS, demonstrated more microalbuminuria⁶, 32% vs. 5%, relative risk 4.8 (95% CI: 1.1 to 22.0). The longer term health implications of this finding were difficult to assess with the population under study, but continued health monitoring was indicated.

Ford et al. (2010) reported for the 8 year follow-up of the WHS that of 2597 eligible subjects, 1088 provided data useable for analysis, of which 706 had experienced acute gastroenteritis during the outbreak, the odd ratios for recurring indigestion (dyspepsia) at 8 years in exposed individuals using both a British and an American clinical definition were 2.09 (95% CI: 1.58-2.78) and 2.30 (95% CI: 1.63–3.26), respectively. Marshall et al. (2009) reported an evaluation of irritable bowel syndrome (IBS), which is related to indigestion, for the WHS analysing 2451 participants who returned for the 8 year followup, out of the original 4561 eligible WHS participants. Of these, 1166 were eligible for the IBS study cohort. The prevalence of IBS among 742 eligible subjects who had suffered acute gastroenteritis during the outbreak declined from 28.3% 2–3 years after the outbreak to 15.4% after 8 years. IBS remained significantly increased compared with controls who did not have acute gastroenteritis (OR 3.12; 95% CI: 1.99 to 5.04), indicating

that the Walkerton outbreak had triggered irritable bowel syndrome that had persisted for 8 years post-outbreak.

The WHS results all have interpretive limitations because many of the reported recurring conditions are subjective and some of these conditions are acknowledged to potentially be caused by psychosomatic factors. Regardless, the WHS did establish that there were symptomatic health impacts on community residents for years after the outbreak.

Gargano et al. (2017) studied 13 pathogens or syndromes that can be transmitted by waterborne routes to estimate resulting mortality in the US for the period from 2003 to 2009. Of the pathogens they considered, Campylobacter, Cryptosporidium and E. coli are pathogens that have been implicated in drinking waterborne disease outbreaks. They estimated that 7% (493 deaths) of total waterborne attributed deaths were transmitted by the conventional faecal-oral route that is associated with drinking water outbreaks. The majority of deaths estimated for this study were attributed to water system biofilm pathogens, including Legionella, nontuberculous Mycobacteria and Pseudomonas, suggesting that these topics are inevitably going to be a growing concern for the water industry. Collier et al. (2021) updated and expanded these illness estimates to 2014 for the US and added estimates for waterborne Norovirus infections. Their expanded estimates for annual waterborne infections, hospitalisations and deaths for campylobacteriosis were 171,000; 2,150; 27, cryptosporidiosis 322,000; 1,120; 24 and norovirus gastroenteritis 1,330,000; 4,780; 54, respectively. Unfortunately, Collier et al. (2021) made these estimates for all waterborne exposures, drinking water, recreational water and environment overall, but did not provide any breakdown among these categories.

Economic costs

Historically, the massive Milwaukee outbreak in 1993 has been among the most influential in drawing attention to the vulnerability of drinking water systems, even those with multiple treatment barriers, to allow severe waterborne disease outbreaks. Corso et αl. (2003) estimated the total cost (in 1993 US\$ with cost estimates inflated to [2021US\$] according to the Consumer Price Index) at US\$96.2 million [US\$182 million] with US\$31.7 million [US\$60 million] in medical costs and US\$64.6

million [US\$122 million] in lost productivity. They estimated that the personal costs per individual for mild, moderate or severe illness at US\$116 [US\$219] for mild, US\$475 [\$898] for moderate and US\$7,808 [\$14,757] for severe illness.

The Walkerton Inquiry commissioned a study (Livernois 2002) to estimate the costs of that outbreak and it estimated total direct costs in 2000 at CAD\$64.5 million [2021 CAD\$96 million], including costs to Walkerton (population 4,800) households of CAD\$6.9 million [CAD\$10 million], to the municipality that operated the water system of CAD\$6.5 million [CAD\$9.7 million], to long term health care of CAD\$2.5 million [CAD\$3.7 million] and costs for water system remediation and repair CAD\$9.2 million [CAD\$13.7 million].

In February 2007, Galway, Ireland experienced an outbreak of cryptosporidiosis with 242 lab-confirmed cases, with a very conservative estimate that there were 498 additional unreported cases (Chyzheuskaya et al. 2017). This report estimated the 2007 economic costs [updated to 2021] for this outbreak were €19 million [€21 million], including: household costs of €4 million [€4.5 million] and local authority costs of €5.9 million [€6.5 million]. In November 2010, Ostersund, Sweden experienced the largest recorded European outbreak of cryptosporidiosis with an estimated 27,000 cases (Hrudey & Hrudey 2014, Widerström et al. 2014). Ridderstadt et αl . (2018) estimated the total number of sick leave days was 50,000 for adults and 20,700 for children, with an estimated direct 2010 cost [updated to 2021] of €7 million [€7.8 million] for employers. Sinclair and Hayes (2012, Health Stream 65) recounted a Swedish government agency report that had estimated the overall societal costs of this outbreak at about 220 million Swedish kroner (SEK) or about €22 million [€24 million].

The economic impact study commissioned for the Havelock North Government Inquiry (Moore et αl . 2017) reported a total economic cost of NZD\$21 million, with NZD\$4.1 million assigned to local government and NZD\$12.4 million to individual households, a financial cost of NZD\$2,440 per affected household. The various estimates of economic costs of outbreaks reported in this section have each considered different elements of cost, but none of these studies have likely captured the entire economic consequences that have occurred in each outbreak.

Trust and reputation

Some skeptics may view the health and economic impacts listed above as comparatively small in relation to other tragedies in society. After the Walkerton outbreak in May 2000, some reports suggested that 7 deaths might only be equal to the death toll from motor vehicle fatalities from a bad long weekend in Ontario. While the absolute numbers of deaths could be comparable, the realities of these two tragedies are not equivalent. Consumers pay their local water utility to deliver water that is safe to drink, certainly not water that could kill them. Delivering water that makes consumers ill and, in the extreme, kills them, is surely the worst failure a water utility can allow. Consumers of unsafe water will inevitably lose trust in their water utility. They will be justified in being outraged about such a betrayal of trust as delivering unsafe drinking water. Trust is always challenging to build over time, but once trust is betrayed, it may never be regained. Water utilities need to be concerned about preventing such failures, even by others, because serious failures by any water utility will damage the reputation of all. There is a compelling case for water utilities to collaborate on ensuring the best risk management performance across the water sector that leaders should pursue as a priority. A tangible means to pursue effective collaboration would be a sector-wide cooperative to share anonymised close call case studies for personnel training purposes.

In closing, professional discussions about drinking water outbreaks may be too easy to review as technical failures without fully appreciating the human costs as they impact those affected. Justice Dennis O'Connor who served as Commissioner of the Walkerton Inquiry was awarded the 2003 American Water Works Association Award of Merit⁷ for his landmark reports from the Inquiry (O'Connor 2002a,b). In addition to substantial, insightful analysis of what happened and numerous recommendations for preventing future failures Justice O'Connor provided an effective, insightful human face to this tragedy in Chapter 2 of the Volume 1 report (O'Connor 2002a). Following is an excerpt of a quote from Walkerton mother, Tracy

Hammell, whose 2 year old son Kody was inflicted with the kidney ailment HUS caused by the drinking water contamination. Kody nearly died from becoming infected:

"Mrs. Hammell took Kody to the hospital, which was extremely busy. The Hammells persisted, however, and a hospital bed was found in Owen Sound. Kody was given a blood test, which confirmed that he was infected with E. coli O157:H7. One doctor told the family there was no treatment. 'All we can do is wait for him to get better,' he said, as recollected by Mrs. Hammell.

Eventually they were airlifted to London. In the helicopter, Mrs. Hammell asked the doctor whether her son might die. 'Yes, he could', the doctor replied. 'We hope to get him there in time.' Fortunately, Kody survived the trip and arrived at the hospital in London, where he was to be put on dialysis the following morning. Again, Mrs. Hammell was told there was a chance Kody wasn't going to make it. That night, he started to have heart failure and was put on dialysis. While at the hospital, he underwent surgery twice. Finally, Mrs. Hammell said, the doctors told her: 'We're sorry, but we've done all we can do ... It's up to prayer and the child's body to do the rest...'

The dialysis had at last taken hold. According to the doctors, Mrs. Hammell said, it was a 'pure miracle' that Kody had turned himself around and survived. Throughout the endeavour, Mrs. Hammell surprised herself at how strong she could be. But since then, she has occasionally come to the point where she has thought: 'Oh my goodness, why am I so depressed and how come I can't stop crying? ... It's scary just not knowing what's going to happen to him next.' She said she worries constantly for her son:

'I guess for the rest of his life I'm going to be scared if he gets a cold, and I hope it doesn't affect the fluid on his lungs and I hope it doesn't affect his heart ... Just every little virus I don't want him to get because, you know, it's harder on the rest of his organs.'"

Concluding Thoughts

Although the messages that keep emerging from inquiries into major public health incidents about failing to deliver safe drinking water should now be clear enough, the recurring nature of these failures in jurisdictions that have the resources to prevent such failures should be a cause for concern for anyone engaged in delivering drinking water to consumers. This has been characterised as complacency, which seems like a logical explanation. However, an even greater concern, which cannot be overcome simply by communicating about the disastrous experiences of waterborne outbreaks, is indifference.

The most reliable self-test for all water professionals about whether they take the risk of an outbreak seriously enough is for them to ask whether they are willing to believe that such a failure could occur within their system. If they do not accept this possibility, given the many common factors documented as contributing to outbreaks, they are more vulnerable to failure than they need to be.

If Health Stream readers can recognise any relevance of the evidence summarised in this feature to their role for providing safe drinking water, asking the following questions may offer some understanding of where their own vulnerabilities may lie.

 Does your organisation have sufficiently robust governance and operational policies and processes in place to effectively prevent a waterborne disease outbreak?

- Does your health regulator have the expertise and capability to oversee drinking water providers in a constructive, preventive, not just a reactive manner?
- Do you and your immediate colleagues have sufficient expertise to foresee vulnerability to failures that can lead to a waterborne disease outbreak?
- If you recognise any deficiencies of expertise or lack of relevant knowledge, what means could be provided to overcome those deficiencies?
- Are you confident that all key decision-makers in your organisation fully understand the consequences of allowing a waterborne disease outbreak?
- Have you and your colleagues imagined yourselves being called to give evidence under oath at an inquiry into a drinking water contamination episode that causes serious illness?

If readers find, after considering this feature, that the evidence for preventing waterborne disease outbreaks is not compelling, before ultimately adopting that view, they should commit to speaking directly with survivors of a fatal waterborne disease outbreak who can recount personal experiences like those detailed by Mrs. Hammell.

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

I strongly oppose the proposed closure of the road allowance. This closure would eliminate the only legal, public route to the water and force the shutdown of the Bearspaw Marina, which is a community asset that offers non-motorized recreation opportunities to Calgarians.

The justification for this closure, citing "safety" and "environmental concerns," does not hold up to scrutiny. The reservoir has been used safely for decades by residents, including nearby landowners who continue to boat and swim without incident. If the City genuinely cared about safety and water quality, it would support reasonable access infrastructure like sanitation facilities, instead of trying to cut the public off entirely.

Bearspaw Marina operates well within federal guidelines, and no credible evidence has been presented to suggest it poses any measurable risk to public safety or environmental integrity. This appears to be more about restricting public access and liability avoidance than protecting the land or water.

Haskayne Legacy Park was established with the intent of increasing public access to natural areas. Closing the road allowance undermines that goal, disregards community input, and damages trust in the City's stewardship of public land.

Please preserve public access to the reservoir by keeping the road allowance open.





I support the City of Calgary closing two road allowances in Haskayne Legacy Park to ensure public safety and drinking water quality of the Bearspaw Reservoir and to protect the natural environment at Haskayne Legacy Park and undeveloped City of Calgary park land on the opposite shore.

This reservoir is susceptible to sudden high winds. Non-motorized boaters may start out in calm waters, then find themselves in strong winds and whitecaps, struggling to complete their journey or return to shore. Rockview County refers aquatic rescue to the City of Calgary Fire Department which acknowledged in their recent annual report that they have difficulty meeting the needs of the perimeter neighbourhoods in Calgary itself.

Also, the summer of 2024 water main break and restrictions in Calgary has highlighted the importance of water quality and access to both residents and businesses. I am concerned about the escalation of the Bearspaw Marina business which dramatically altered City of Calgary and Trans Alta land to access the reservoir without permits, licenses or authorization. The marina business has expanded from a non-motorized operation to motorized with use of a power boat, e-bike rentals and the intention to shuttle clients from Cochrane to the marina. Is there risk of more motorized rentals being at this business such as jet-skis or powerboats?

Bearspaw Marina signage at Haskayne Legacy Park in 2024 mimicked the appearance of the City of Calgary Parks information signage but promoted the marina business. This misled the public and created confusion with conflicting information. Also, native grassland had been mowed from the marina to the park pathway to create a more direct access over public land which had been signed by the park since it opened, discouraging the public to step off the pathway.

More reservoir users may further disturb City of Calgary park land that has no services or infrastructure that's across the reservoir from Haskayne Legacy Park. Shoreline access would risk more environmental impact, accumulation of garbage and disturbance of owls nesting there.

There's risk of the marina fundamentally changing the character of Haskayne LEGACY Park and the Bearspaw reservoir without authorization or environmental mitigation. I support the Planning Commission's and Trans Alta's recommendations to close the road allowances to protect the reservoir, City of Calgary property and park lands.




Figure 2: Land Use Designations

A parcel designated as Special Purpose – Future Urban Development (S-FUD) District is located to the southeast. Figure 2

Closing the subject road rights-of-way and redesignation to Special Purpose – Urban Nature (S-UN) District will discourage informal and unsafe access to Bearspaw Reservoir and limit disturbances to native grasslands.

Calgary River Users Alliance (CRUA) and our member organizations represent 18 Bow River recreational user groups. CRUA opposes the proposed redesignation of road allowance to Special Purpose Urban Nature (S-UN) until further public engagement on the future development of Calgary's Haskayne Legacy Park.



The Rationale for CRUA's Opposition to the Redesignation:

The original conceptual design of the Haskayne Area Structure Plan (ASP) CPC2015-126 (June 2015) was prepared without public consultation of the vision for the future development of Haskayne Legacy Park as a focal point for both land-based and river recreation activities. Rather, the concept design aimed to develop the park as an extension of Glenmore Ranch Provincial Park, preserving the natural beauty and ecological diversity of the property. The Calgary Planning Commission (CPC) Report and Land Use Amendment of the ASP to Calgary City Council (July 2016) addressed the shortfall in public engagement of the development of the property, but recommended approval of the amendment without further public engagement.

The Calgary River Access Strategy (CRAS) was approved by the Calgary City Council in 2016 to develop a framework for river access infrastructure while protecting the ecology of each site within the city's jurisdiction. A total of 8 upgrades and new river access sites have been installed. Haskayne Legacy Park was designated for future development under CRAS, but river access considerations have not been discussed with stakeholders. It has been impossible to get any input into the future development plans for this Calgary Regional Park.

The development of Haskayne Legacy Park as a designated river/reservoir access site fits into the vision of the City of Calgary to enhance a rapidly expanding river recreation community, estimated to contribute more than \$ 120 million to the region's economy. The proposed redesignation of a road allowance across the park should not be undertaken until a full City public engagement has been completed on the future development priorities for the park.





Members of Calgary City Council,

I am writing to you as the Canada Research Chair in Water Science, Technology & Policy. I have worked on water security, water treatment, public health risk, and emergency response issues in Alberta for over 20 years. My family and I also effectively live in Alberta part-time. A significant amount of that time, both professionally and personally, is spent in Calgary.

I am writing to you to urge your approval of the proposed road closure and land use amendment in Haskayne. While I recognize that discussion on this issue has largely focused on public safety, I would like to also draw your attention to the critical role of the Bearspaw Reservoir in ensuring water security—and associated public health, growth, and prosperity—in Calgary now and in the future.

As you well know, the Bow River provides Calgary with exceptionally high-quality water that is subsequently treated at the Bearspaw Water Treatment Plant (WTP) so that it is safe for consumption. The Bow River (and the regions in or near the reservoir) will also provide water to the new WTP that will be built to sustain Calgary's growth. Thus, as the Elbow River is limited in the amount of water it can provide to the City, the Bow River is increasingly critical for ensuring reliable access to adequate amounts of safe water for the protection of public health, growth, and prosperity in Calgary.

A recent study demonstrated that although Bow River water quality remains high, it is changing across the watershed. Even without human-caused disturbances, increases in weather extremes that lead to conditions such as heavy rains and associated erosion are key factors contributing to drinking water source quality changes that are undeniably being observed across North America and globally. Additional disturbances associated with all types of unmanaged access can substantially deteriorate water quality and *significantly* increase the cost of required treatment—this is also globally recognized. Scientific community consensus also overwhelmingly indicates that once water quality deteriorates in a watershed as a result of multiple land uses, this deterioration cannot be readily remediated at this scale.

As detailed in Calgary's Source Water Protection Plan (City of Calgary, 2018), maintaining high quality source water by limiting releases of contaminants like nutrients associated with soil erosion (that can promote harmful algal blooms), personal care products (e.g., pharmaceuticals, lotions containing microplastics and other contaminants, etc.), and other water quality contaminants like perfluorinated "forever chemicals" is critical because some of these compounds are not effectively removed by conventional drinking water treatment processes. I would like to underscore that potable standards for drinking water do *not* require it to be free from contaminants such as many of these known and suspected carcinogens. Fortunately, many of these compounds are not found in Calgary's water supply at present. Unmanaged access and use of the Bearspaw Reservoir in the immediate or nearby vicinity of current and future intakes to the City's water supply will almost certainly lead to deteriorated drinking water source quality and associated increases in treatment costs—it's not a question of "if," but "when".

While the technology to treat increasingly deteriorated source water quality to potable standards is available and would not preclude Calgary's ability to provide safe water, increased unmanaged access can and most likely would eventually eliminate Calgary's ability to describe Bow River water as a "high quality" source and significantly increase the cost of providing safe drinking water. I would like to underscore that potable standards for drinking water do not require it to be free from contaminants such as many of the known and suspected carcinogens that are not found in Calgary's source water at present. It is for these reasons that the proposed road closure and land use amendment in Haskayne represents a proactive protection of public health, growth, and prosperity in Calgary. This approach is not novel and directly aligns with globally recognized best practices in drinking water source protection (i.e., "source water protection"). It also directly reflects City of Calgary policy detailed in Calgary's Source Water Protection Plan (City of Calgary, 2018).

Given the issues raised above, I strongly recommend that City Administration approve the proposed road closure and land use amendment in Haskayne and in doing so, make a commitment to reducing the potential for unintentional—and likely costly or even irreversible—contamination of the City of Calgary's water supply.

The City of Calgary's attempt to close the historic road allowance through Haskayne Park is nothing more than a thinly veiled effort to cut off public access to Bearspaw Reservoir under the guise of "safety" and "environmental protection." The justifications provided are weak, misleading, and completely fail to stand up to scrutiny.

The City should abandon this ill-conceived plan for the following reasons:

1. The City's Safety Claims Are Baseless

- The City claims the reservoir has strong currents, fluctuating water levels, cold temperatures, and steep banks—yet boaters have safely used it for 70 years without issue.
- Despite the City's claims, there are no strong currents, and fluctuating water levels pose little to no safety risks.
- Cold water temperatures are no different from the volatile Bow River in the City of Calgary, where people kayak and raft daily.
- The few steep banks that do exist are not on the road allowance—so what exactly is the City trying to "protect" here?

2. Emergency Response Excuses Are a Smokescreen

- The City says it has no on-water emergency response capability, but it never needed one—because the reservoir isn't in Calgary.
- Rocky View County, where the reservoir is actually located, doesn't provide on-water response either, but that hasn't stopped people from responsibly enjoying the reservoir for decades.
- The truth? This isn't about safety—it's about control.

3. The City's Water Quality Argument Is Laughable

- Yes, the reservoir supplies 60% of Calgary's drinking water—but that hasn't stopped decades of recreational use on the
 reservoir.
- Those accessing the reservoir via the existing road allowance- patrons of Bearspaw Marina and the estimated other 50% of people using their own watercraft operate without gas-powered boats, not affecting water quality.
- If the City actually cared about water cleanliness, why did it refuse the Marina's request to provide a paid for portable washroom? Instead, it left up to 400 people a day with no choice but to relieve themselves in the very reservoir whose water quality they claim to be concerned with. That's not just negligence—that's hypocrisy.

4. TransAlta Has No Authority Over This Issue

- TransAlta, the reservoir's operator, pushed the City to close the road allowance. However;
 - o TransAlta has zero responsibility for public safety on the road allowance.
 - o TransAlta has zero authority over environmental policies—that falls under Alberta Environment.
 - o The road allowance is outside of TransAlta's jurisdiction. Why is the City blindly doing TransAlta's bidding?

5. The City's Environmental Excuse Doesn't Hold Up

- The City has already destroyed far more native grasslands than this small road allowance—paving over vast areas for parking lots, roads, and bike paths—all to make Haskayne Park accessible for the public to enjoy. This road serves the same purpose, and the City knows water access has made the park more desirable for residents. Claiming this tiny patch of grassland now needs "saving" after the damage they've already done to native grasslands is pure hypocrisy.
- The City argues that public access is damaging the native grasslands—but this access road has been in place for over 70 years
- If environmental protection is truly the goal, why not implement responsible access policies instead of banning people altogether?

6. The City Is Shutting Down Public Access to the reservoir for No Good Reason

- The road allowance is the only legal public access to the reservoir, and the City knows it.
- TransAlta isn't offering an alternative route, meaning once this access is gone, it's gone for good.
- The City just spent \$50 million on Haskayne Park which includes a 2-km bike path, but now it wants to prevent people from enjoying the lake—a much greater recreational asset.

What kind of City bans people from the very body of water the park was built around?

7. The City Deceived Bearspaw Treefarm

- The City knew Bearspaw Treefarm had an agreement allowing it to access its land via an access road and from there could use the road allowance to get to the Marina, yet conveniently "forgot" to mention it in their notice.
- The City ignored Bearspaw Treefarm's requests for information about improving the road allowance while secretly filing an application to close it.
- The City's shady tactics meant Bearspaw Treefarm only had 17 days to respond instead of the full 30-day comment period. This is nothing short of an underhanded maneuver to limit public opposition.

8. The Closure Will Kill a Local Business and Rip Off the Public

- If the City succeeds, Bearspaw Marina—an affordable, family-friendly recreation spot—will be forced out of business.
- Rentals at the Marina cost less than what the City charges at Bowness Park, making water recreation affordable to more Calgarians.
- Apparently, the City is fine with families getting priced out of enjoying the outdoors.

9. The Haskaynes Oppose This Plan and The Park is Named After Them

- Dick and Lois Haskayne, who dedicated millions of dollars to create this park, oppose closing the road allowance.
- They did not invest in this park just to see kids banned from the reservoir.
- The City's actions completely undermine the spirit of the park's creation.

Final Thoughts

If the proposed closure of the road allowance proceeds, public access to the river will be entirely dependent on the city's discretion. As shown on the map, the road allowance does not terminate directly at the river, meaning the city would retain control over granting access to the reservoir. However, this would strip the public of its current, guaranteed right to access the waterway, replacing it with uncertain, conditional permission. This is an unequivocally worse outcome than simply keeping the road allowance open to the water.

The City's reasoning for closing this road allowance is weak, misleading, and clearly driven by an agenda that has nothing to do with public safety or environmental protection. The real objective is clear: keep the public off Bearspaw Reservoir, regardless of whether it makes sense. The real impact? Making outdoor recreation less accessible for Calgarians.

I strongly urge the City to abandon this ill-conceived plan. The public deserves better.
