





## The story behind the numbers

- Contributions to The Parks Foundation in 2024 reached a record \$15.1 million donated by 1,007 donors. Funds were used for programs, park projects and sport amenities.
- The Parks Foundation supported over 100 new and ongoing community and sport organization-led projects.
- Satisfaction rates with The Parks Foundation's programs and services remains consistently high.

#### **Benchmarks**

To support continuous improvement including upgrading programs, The Parks Foundation measures its performance in a number of areas including program satisfaction, number of new community project supported and value of contributions including donations and grants.

# Looking ahead: 2025 highlights

- The bicycle pump track and skatepark in George Moss Park will begin construction in 2025. The revitalization project will offer a gathering space for families and community members and feature a basketball court and playgrounds.
- Construction will begin on Canada's first public park designed for people with dementia and their caregivers in Dover. This park will serve as a valuable resource and support system with an estimated 20,000 Calgarians currently living with dementia.

**Mission:** We exist so all Calgarians can enjoy a healthy lifestyle by providing easily accessible and unique, sport and green spaces.

1. What 3-5 key results did your organization achieve in 2024 that contributed to:

a) One or more <u>Council Strategic Directions</u>- economic resilience, social resilience, climate resilience?

In collaboration with The City of Calgary and local communities, the Parks Foundation completed park and sport projects with inclusivity in mind. This involved ensuring that park amenities and facilities were accessible to people of all abilities and backgrounds. By creating spaces where everyone feels welcome and valued, the Parks Foundation contributed to building a vibrant and inclusive city where people can come together to live, work, and play. In 2024, 127 community-led projects were supported through our Project Support Program, 58 sport and community organizations received grants to complete their work and 21 new community spaces were created in our city.

Inclusivity and social resilience were showcased at the **Forest Lawn Community Park**, where we partnered with the Forest Lawn Community Association (FLCA) to complete a sport court, gathering space and inclusive playground next to their community hall. The FLCA serves over 150 at-risk youth in the area who attend after school programs at the community centre and access services. The FLCA shared with us that they had no outdoor community space to gather and build a sense of pride in their community or encourage the youth to participate in physical activity and that this project effectively changed that story. This revitalized space not only provides a home away from home, but also provides access to free recreational amenities where youth and residents can develop their social resilience and well-being through being active and creating community connections.

Inclusivity and social resilience were also exemplified at the **Sunalta Community Hub** project, a project we supported in partnership with the Sunalta Community Association (SCA). This purpose-built facility includes a commercial kitchen, coffee shop and programming spaces designed to create community connections and build capacity for residents. The Hub is a social enterprise, with the income it generates going back into the community and allowing the SCA to facilitate meaningful events, programs and services for the community. Largely due in part to the success of this project, in 2026 the Parks Foundation is positioned to work with the SCA and other funding partners on a potential expansion of their outdoor community hub, the second phase of this project.

A notable project worth highlighting is the revitalization of **George Moss Park** in Ogden, which was completed in 2024. Situated in an equity-seeking area, we collaborated closely with local groups, such as the Youth Centres of Calgary (YCC), and the Millican-Ogden Community Association to develop an inclusive sport, play, and gathering area with artistic elements. The impact of this project

for the community created the momentum for a second phase of this project, which will include Calgary's first combined pump track and skatepark amenity, slated to open in 2025.

# b) Your own organization's strategy?

The Parks Foundation's strategic focus is to play a key role in leveraging financial and volunteer resources to support the park and sport sectors. The organization channels its resources to bolster support for projects that are both innovative and inclusive and address social inequity. In 2024, notable progress was achieved in advancing projects and fundraising efforts, particularly focusing on equity-seeking communities, generating a noteworthy \$10M in donations for equity-seeking projects. Improving equity in the development of park and sport spaces is crucial for enhancing the overall quality of life for all Calgary residents. Our experience is that communities with lower socioeconomic status or fewer privileges often encounter significant challenges in fundraising and project completion and as such, the Parks Foundation focuses efforts to provide support to these communities and facilitate the successful completion of their projects.

Thanks to generous one-time funding from The City of Calgary, we've been able to allocate additional staff resources to support equity-seeking communities and provide enhanced services. Our emphasis lies in directing resources towards enhancing capacity in areas of Calgary that frequently face prolonged timelines or lack the necessary resources to manage or fundraise for projects effectively. We extended our support for these communities by offering fundraising assistance, including grant writing and budget development, and have dedicated extra project management services to underserved areas and target groups. In 2024 56 projects supported by the Parks Foundation aimed to address equity disparities.

The Parks Foundation takes great pride in seeing projects that we support come to fruition and ask our community partners to share their stories about the impact the project makes in their community. # Vivo "Kapwa" Community Mural - completed in 2024

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# St. Alphonsus School Playground & Inclusive Play Space - completed in 2024

"The St. Alphonsus Playground Society is truly thrilled about what the new playground means for our school and the surrounding community. This playground serves a play space for after-school care groups, day homes and students alike. It is a welcoming play space for families on the weekend and serves the community of Renfrew that has a population over 5,500. - 4. Does your organization use benchmarks to evaluate and improve performance and operations, and increase your organization's impact?
  - a) Examples of benchmarks:

Parks Foundation has historically benchmarked performance in several areas:

- Satisfaction Rate with Parks Foundation's Programs:
  - This information is used to gain valuable insights into how programs can be improved.
     Feedback has led Parks Foundation to revise its website, change communication processes and upgrade granting forms.
- Number of community projects helped by the Project Support Program:
  - This information is used to ensure that a target number of communities are being helped with Parks Foundation's support services and grants. By tracking this information, we can understand the obstacles facing communities, and how to help address issues.
- Value of Contributions to Parks Foundation (grants, donations, etc.):
  - This information is used to understand the current fundraising landscape, to track success with fundraising efforts, and to revise our methods and practices.

## c) How this information is being used to support continuous improvement?

Information gathered from the survey is used to upgrade programs and evaluate the efficacy of our service levels. For example, we heard that communities wanted to receive more information on available funding they could be seeking. As a result, we implemented a monthly newsletter that highlights upcoming grants and other funding sources available to community projects. This will be a valued resource for groups fundraising for parks, playgrounds, and sport amenities. The number of new community projects and value of contributions are predictive indicators that ensure we are supporting projects at a sufficient level to deliver continued impact.

5. How does your organization address equity, diversity or inclusion, or support racial equity? Enhancing equity in the development of park and sport spaces is key to enhancing the overall quality of life for all residents of Calgary. In our experience, communities with lower socioeconomic status or fewer privileges encounter greater challenges in fundraising and completing projects. Thanks to generous one-time funding from The City of Calgary, we have been able to allocate additional staff resources to support equity-seeking communities. Our focus lies in directing resources towards bolstering capacity in areas of Calgary that often face prolonged timelines or lack the necessary resources to fundraise and manage projects effectively.

For instance, we have expanded our support by providing fundraising assistance, such as grant writing and budget completion, and have dedicated extra project management services to these underserved areas. In 2024, Parks Foundation was able to raise \$10M in support of projects from equity-seeking communities, further speaking to our commitment to address equity disparities.

To ensure we are supporting the communities that need it the most, the Parks Foundation actively seeks to support projects in areas that hit equity markers as highlighted in the Calgary Equity Index. These include areas that carry a higher overall burden of inequities, areas that fall below the benchmarks of access to greenspace and community space, and areas that have a high percentage of people with low income after tax. Parks Foundation also has a keen interest supporting underserved groups, including persons with disabilities, racialized people, women and girls, Indigenous Peoples and the 2SLGBTQIA+ community.

We often build inclusive projects and are committed to promoting the idea that Calgarians should have equitable access to parks, regardless of differing abilities, socioeconomic status or backgrounds. In 2024 we completed inclusive playgrounds at the Forest Lawn Community Park and St. Alphonsus School and in 2025 we will break ground on a first-of-its-kind ambitious project to support persons living with a disability – the Dementia Inclusive Park.

6. How is your organization advancing Indigenous Truth and Reconciliation? (For example addressing specific calls to action in the <u>Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada: Calls to Action</u> report or <u>The City's White Goose Flying Report</u>)

Parks Foundation's Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Plan included recommendations related to Indigenous Peoples, including making land acknowledgement a standard practice, engaging with Indigenous Peoples on community projects, and working towards projects with Nations surrounding Calgary in Treaty 7 territory.

# 9. Did your organization receive any awards or recognition in 2024, or have any client or participant feedback that you want to highlight?

In 2024 the Parks Foundation garnered significant media attention for its impactful projects and initiatives. Notably, the "Place Matters" project, a collaborative effort with VIVO, was featured in both Global News and CTV News. This project focused on enhancing parks infrastructure in North Central Calgary, aiming to improve access to public parks and green spaces in underserved communities.

We also announced a pioneering Dementia Inclusive Park designed specifically for those impacted by dementia, their families and caregivers, receiving coverage from multiple media outlets. Slated to break ground in 2025 in the equity-deserving Dover, this park will feature unique amenities to ensure the safety and engagement of individuals with dementia, while also enriching local community connections.

These media highlights underscore the Parks Foundation's commitment to enhancing community well-being through innovative park developments and inclusive recreational spaces.

Parks Foundation also conducts an annual Program Evaluation Survey with the communities we serve. The survey revealed that 97% of projects that Parks Foundation supported in 2024 addressed a key community need and 87% of community volunteers learned new skills. 83% reported that the completion of their project improved public spaces or provided opportunities for Calgarians to connect, providing them with an opportunity to be active close to home.

Our reputation for supporting community-led projects precedes us and as such we consistently attract community groups who are interested in partnering with us to access our support services and effectively deliver their projects. The best forms of referral for Parks Foundation are via word of mouth from community members, or come directly from The City of Calgary.

10. How did your organization address climate change in 2024, for example, operational or program changes that reduced green house gas emissions (GHG), air/water pollution, or waste that aligned with <a href="https://doi.org/10.1007/jhc.nc.">The City's Climate Change Program</a> including Council's Climate Emergency Declaration?

Parks Foundation's mandate involves creating sustainable outdoor landscapes. Park designs include biodiversity of plant materials, storm water management, tree planting, and making efforts to utilize native species that adapt well to our local environment. We encourage and support communities to follow best practices in sustainable landscape design.

11. Are there any projects, initiatives or plans for 2025 that you want to briefly highlight?

The Parks Foundation plays a crucial role in supporting community development through its diverse range of programs, which we deliver on an ongoing basis. We help create park and sport projects by helping communities at every stage of the process. These projects encompass various amenities such as playgrounds, pathways, community gardens, ice rinks, bicycle pump tracks, and more.

The comprehensive support offered by the Parks Foundation through the **Project Support Program** (PSP) is instrumental in driving community-building projects forward. This support often proves pivotal in determining whether projects proceed or stall. Successful initiatives like playgrounds, parks, and pathways ensure that Calgarians have access to nature and opportunities for healthy, active lifestyles. In 2024 we provided 127 community-led projects with ongoing support services, including project development and management advice, grant writing and fundraising guidance, accounting services volunteer management guidelines.

In collaboration with The City of Calgary and the Saddledome Foundation, the Parks Foundation's **Amateur Sport Grant Program** allocates grants to local amateur sport organizations. These grants contribute to the enhancement of non-profit sport organizations by funding capital elements, thereby improving equipment and supplies. This initiative facilitates increased participation in healthy sporting activities among residents. In 2024, a total of \$774,161 was granted to 15 different sports organizations through this grant stream.

The **Building Communities Program** stands as a cornerstone of the Parks Foundation's commitment to fostering community cohesion and resilience. Through this initiative, the Foundation provides funding, resources, and support to create much needed park projects such as playgrounds, community gardens and naturalizations. In 2024, a total of \$474,500 was granted to 11 different community and school organizations through this grant stream.

The **Stella Conceptual Drawing Grant Program** supports community organizations by providing \$5,000 in seed money to complete professional project drawings for innovative projects. These drawings aim to enhance Calgary's park spaces and foster community engagement by offering opportunities for volunteer groups to improve their surroundings. In 2024, a total of \$26,250 was granted to 5 different community organizations through this grant stream.

Supported with funding from The City of Calgary, the **Embrace the Outdoors Program** provides grants of up to \$5,000 to support capital costs associated with activating outdoor spaces during the winter. Projects funded under this program include outdoor space enhancements, art installations like

murals, and the purchase of winter equipment that is beneficial to the community. The program aims to encourage outdoor activities during colder months and welcomes applications from local non-profit organizations. In 2024, a total of \$120,121 was granted to 27 different community organizations through this grant stream.

Looking ahead to 2025, the Parks Foundation is pleased to highlight several projects that have been fundraised for and are slated for construction. These projects include a pump track and skatepark amenity at George Moss Park in Ogden, and the groundbreaking of the Dementia Inclusive Park in Dover.

The bicycle **pump track and skatepark in George Moss Park** is the first instance of these amenities being combined in Calgary and will begin construction in 2025. A gathering space will be created for families and community members who want to spend time at the park and access this amenity, along with the basketball court and tot lot playgrounds completed with the initial phase of the project, which opened in 2024. The City has committed a \$1.12M capital contribution to this project, to revitalize the softball diamonds on site and enhance the overall optimization of the park.

The **Dementia Inclusive Park** in Dover will be the first-of-its kind in Canada, designed specifically for people impacted by dementia and their caregivers and is a testament to effective fundraising and meaningful community partnerships. This park will serve as a valuable resource and support system with an estimated 20,000 Calgarians currently living with dementia – a number expected to rise to 34,000 by 2030. The park aims to combat stigma and provide a safe, inclusive environment for both individuals with dementia and their caregivers. The City of Calgary has committed a \$1M capital contribution to this project and the Parks Foundation was able to leverage this funding to secure an additional \$3.25M in support of the nearly 4-acre project, which will begin construction in 2025.
